TRAACA Spring Road-Trip to Elizabeth City, NC Saturday, April 15, 2017

Trees are budding, flowers are blooming, and snow is falling—it must be spring in Hampton Roads! According to the calendar, winter is behind us, so join your TRAACA family for a leisurely drive to Elizabeth City, NC. We'll depart from the Dismal Swamp Canal Welcome Center (located at 2356 Highway 17 N, South Mills, NC—approximately 3 miles south of the Virginia border) at 9:30 AM. However, you're encouraged to arrive early and enjoy the Dismal Swamp Park Visitor Center located just behind & to the left of the rest area. It opens at 8:00 AM and contains exhibits from history to habitat to plants & wildlife within the Swamp. Admission is free, and the facility houses a collection of wildlife mounts including a 400-pound black bear struck by a car outside the park.

From the Welcome Center, we'll caravan south on Highway 17 to Elizabeth City, NC, where we'll tour the Museum of the Albemarle (501 S. Water Street). The museum is located on the Elizabeth City waterfront and showcases the rich history of the Albemarle Region.

After a leisurely tour of the museum, we'll cross the street for lunch at Grouper's Waterfront Restaurant. After lunch, you're free to explore the area or enjoy the views along the water. Water Street borders the historic commercial district of Elizabeth City, which is home to some interesting architecture from the past. For example, at the corner of Water Street & E. Main Street is the former Colonial Oil Filling Station. The Walking Tour pamphlet states, "With its signature blue tile roof, this unusually intact Tudor Revival-style gas station was nationally identified with the Pure Oil Company. Built in 1931, and first known as The Auto Fountain . . .'

Please join us for a tour of the Museum of the Albemarle and lunch in Elizabeth City, NC, on Sat, April 15. From the Driver's Seat

Anyone who belongs to the TRAACA knows the primary benefits of membership: the camaraderie, the friendship, the shared appreciation of antique vehicles, and the fun. But there are some "hidden" benefits that I think some of our members are either unaware of or take for granted. The first is the "bang for the buck" you receive for your \$25 annual dues. Every year our club subsidizes three special meals to ensure they're affordable for club members and to encourage—we hope—participation: our Annual Awards Banquet in January, usually our St. Patrick's Day dinner (or lunch as in some previous years at Westminster-Canterbury), and our annual Holiday dinner or brunch. subsidizes the Awards Banquet by \$15 for every member and spouse/significant other; the Holiday Brunch by \$10, and this year the St. Patrick's dinner by \$5. That means if a single member attended these three meals last year, they received \$30 in subsidies for their \$25 membership dues. Couples who attended all three meals received \$60 in subsidies for their \$25 in dues. Not a bad deal at all.

In addition to the meals the club subsidizes, it also subsidizes the cost of some activities each year by paying some or all of the admission fees for places the club visits on At the recommendation of our its official activities. Activities Committee, this year the Board voted to "give back" even more to members by subsidizing more activities. Our plan may vary a bit depending on the number of members who participate in each activity and the actual costs incurred for the event, but right now we subsidized the Annual Awards Banquet in January, the St. Patrick's Day dinner in March, paid for members' lunches at the tour of Abacus in March, and we're planning on making a donation to the Museum of the Albemarle to provide a guide for our tour of the museum in April, a donation to the Brock Environmental Center when we visit it in June, to treat

everyone to ice cream when we go to Doumar's Barbecue in Norfolk in August, and to subsidize our Holiday Dinner or Brunch this December. Depending how the year goes, we may vote to subsidize additional activities.

Why am I writing about this? First, because I'm not sure that everyone realizes what a great deal they receive for their membership dues. Second, because I want everyone to be aware of these activities and take advantage of them—we're subsidizing them because we want more of you to come out and enjoy our club's activities.

Speaking of activities, we have a major one coming up in three weeks: the 2017 Old Dominion Meet on Friday-Saturday, 21-22 April, at The Founders Inn in Virginia Beach. For newer members who may not be familiar with the Old Dominion Meet Association (ODMA), it's an official, non-geographic region of the AACA comprised of 14 of the 17 AACA regions in Virginia. (I don't know what's going on with the other three regions.) Every year ODMA hosts an annual meet, rotated among the member regions. This year our region is hosting it.

I encourage every TRAACA member to come to the Old Dominion Meet whether you enter a car or not. However, if you have an AACA-eligible car, you need to register it and bring it to the meet. This is the closest the ODMA Meet will be for years—we won't host it again for at least another 10 years. Whether you're trying to get your vehicle its first ODMA award—its First Junior Award, HPOF Award, or DPC Award—or going for its Senior Award or Preservation, register and bring your car. Earn an ODMA grille/radiator badge and proudly display it on your classic vehicle.

With over 160 memberships and 300 vehicles in the TRAACA, we should easily be able to display at least 100 TRAACA cars at the meet. However, as of 1 April, we only have 70 vehicles registered and, of those, only 36 are TRAACA vehicles (registered by 24 owners). This is well below average for an ODMA Meet hosted by a major region. PLEASE SUPPORT YOUR CLUB & REGISTER YOUR CAR FOR THE ODMA MEET! (Stop procrastinating-registrations must be postmarked by April 8th.)

TRAACA Tour of Abacus Machine and Automotive Services March 18, 2017

Saturday, March 18, 2017, was a cold and damp morning in southeast Virginia. Despite the weather, over 55 TRAACA members signed up for the TRAACA March activity to tour Abacus Machine & Automotive Services and fellow TRAACA member Bill Thumel's vintage car collection.

We started the morning at 9:00 AM at the Abacus Machine & Automotive Services facility in Virginia Beach. We were greeted with coffee & donuts generously supplied by the Abacus Machine shop team. Because of our large group, we were split into groups of about ten people, giving us more individualized attention. The groups worked their way from one area of the shop to another, receiving excellent care from our tour guides: Chuck, John, Freddy, Rob, and Tim.

For over twenty years Abacus Racing has been building motors for British Sports cars participating in Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) and Sportscar Vintage Racing Association events. The machine shop & repair facility services and repairs exotic and foreign automobiles such as Rolls-Royce, Jaguar, Porsche, Ferrari, Aston Martin, and even Hondas.

As we were guided through the facility, the Abacus team expertly demonstrated the various machines, describing how precise the machines could cut and hone, and explaining the projects the machines might be used on. (It was interesting to find out how old some of the machines were because there hasn't been anything better to replace them.) Although the

Dynojet chassis dynamometer could not be demonstrated, it was still very interesting to learn how the machine works and when it would be used to tune and test the engines. Other areas of the facility included the paint shop, the body repair shop, and the final prep areas, to name a few.

After about an hour and a half at the machine shop, we drove over to Bill Thumel's vintage car collection. Bill and Allen entertained the group with stories about the great collection of cars and experiences on the race tracks. To our amazement, Bill started up his Lola T70 race car, filling the building (and our ear drums) with the sounds of the car's powerful engine! Mark was thrilled when, after most of the group had left, Bill invited him to sit in his 1971 Lola T252 Formula Super B race car.

It wouldn't be a TRAACA event if it didn't involve food. Firehouse Subs delivered several trays of sandwiches to accompany the chips, cookies, and soft drinks the club had purchased. Bill and Allen set up tables and chairs among the vehicles for people to sit at. The TRAACA group was pleasantly surprised to find their lunch was free. Still Collecting Stuff — Signs By Terry Bond

In the wonderful world of automobilia collecting, signs lead the way among hot collectibles.




World records continue to be set at high end auctions. We could fill an entire newsletter with market info, theorizing about where the spiral will end, what happens next in this volatile market filled with investors, private collectors whose only thought sometimes is what the signs will bring at the next auction.

I'm sure we'll get there in the conversation, but, needless to say, rising prices on the top end have opened the floodgates to reproductions and fakes. We'll certainly discuss those in due course, but first a little history about signs and sign collecting.

Just prior to the turn of the twentieth century, the art of sign making began to blossom. The rise of literacy in this country and in Europe helped propel simple graphic images to printed words. Much early advertising was of a temporary nature and early signage was in the form of paper posters. More durable advertising was sought, and soon we began to see hand-painted signs on wood or tin backgrounds. As the use of colored lithography enabled printing on sheets of tin, advertising signs began to appear. Still, many early signs were hand-painted by traveling sign-painters or by production studios like Ithaca Sign Works in Ithaca, New York. Durability was always an issue until porcelain signs began to appear.

We'll talk first about those wonderful porcelain signs that are so sought after today. Later, Part 2 of this series (in a future issue of *The Mudflap*) will explore the wonderful worlds of tin and cardboard signs, and we'll conclude with some collecting tips and details on reproduction and fake signs.

Enameling, as it was known, is the process of firing glass onto a metal surface. The process of porcelain enameling on iron first appeared in Europe. Later, when sheet iron manufacturing began to appear about the 1850s, production of decorative panels began to appear. The Patent Enamel Company was formed in Birmingham, England, in 1859, and by the 1880s widespread production of advertising signs was well underway.

The first signs advertised products like soap, tea, tobacco, beer, chocolate, and many food products. Ads for pianos and other commodities soon appeared. Businesses began using this durable form of advertising because it was virtually indestructible. I have personally removed outdoor signs that have survived in their original setting for over 100 years. A favorite place to display signs was in railroad depots and along public roadways.

A quick look at the manufacturing process will help you understand what you are looking for when contemplating a purchase. The process involves the fusing of layers of colored glass on a metal surface. The metal plates used were vitreousquality cast iron. The first coat was a sort of "slurry" applied to the sand-blasted cast iron plate. This was a cream-like mix of powdered glass, clay, and a water suspension. When dried, it was fired at up to 900 degrees, forming the base or "grip" coating. The back side of these early signs will be covered with drips, runs, sags, and swipes where the slurry mix and subsequent applications of color were fired.

The front of the hot plate was then dusted with powdered glass in a silk-screen style operation and, as the glass melted, the sign was created. Subsequent additions of more colored glass would produce different patterns, lettering, or even fancy artwork. It often took multiple re-firings to create a sign with multiple colors. By the early 1920s, sheet steel was being produced in high enough quality that it began to be used for sign production. Production techniques continued to be refined and eventually transfer-printed images and intricate design work became possible.

The true heyday of the porcelain sign was pre-World War I. After that time, manufacturing supplies began to dwindle. In the 1920s there was a resurgence in production; however, faster and cheaper production methods made for cheaper signs.

For collectors, the early cast iron signs will have those

distinctive swirl patterns on the backs of them often showing the different colors as they were applied to the surface. Drips, runs, sags, etc., will be evident. Later signs will have smooth, evenly coated backs, but the fronts will still clearly show the multi-layered process as different colors were applied separately.

With the advent of the automobile, and the increase in travel, porcelain advertising signs took a quantum leap. Advertising for cars, tires, oil, gasoline, spark plugs, repair shops, garages, even attractions and road direction signs began to appear. These are the types of signs that make our hearts beat faster, and they are what every auto enthusiast covets to decorate their garage.

There are many ways to collect, and most enjoy a theme of some sort. Maybe it's a particular type of car you love (Chevrolet, Ford, Packard, etc.). Perhaps you are a collector of gasoline and motor oil-related things. Maybe its tires or even old road signs that excite you. I know of one collector who specializes in hotel signs, and another who loves anything bus related. Perhaps you are like Richard Hall and I, and have amassed an eclectic accumulation of the best of what we've been able to find over the years.

Today, collecting signs can be very expensive. So the message is to collect the best you can afford. Be cautious and learn—the market is filled with junk and carefully aged fakes. I don't mind a little honest wear (patina) on my signs.

In England, two serious early collectors—Christopher Baglee and Andrew Morley—worked with a local museum to open the first-ever public gallery style exhibit of signs. It was so popular the exhibit was taken on the road all over England. They ended up publishing two wonderful books—"Street Jewellery" (sic) and "More Street Jewellery" (sic). They were subsequently reprinted and copies are still available on the Internet. Although the books are heavy with British signage, there also are a lot of American product advertising signs shown.

For me, my interest in signs developed together with my interest in early cars. I admired many of them in their original locations on garage walls. My first acquisition, however, was while in Scotland in the 1970s. We were on a rally driving our 1935 Morris Eight, along with other members of the Strathmore Vintage Vehicle Club, when we stopped at a corner to try and figure out if a left turn or right turn would be appropriate, when I spotted an old porcelain sign hanging on the wall of a dilapidated garage. It was simply the most beautiful early sign I'd ever seen—"Wakefield Castrol Motor Oil"— and, in smaller print, words that clearly gave away its age—"By Appointment to His Majesty the King"—which clearly placed it in the Edwardian era.

I simply had to get a picture of our car with that sign in the background. As I began to fumble around moving the car into just the right position, a gentleman came out of the house next door to watch what I was doing. It was his place and his sign,



and he was quite amazed that a crazy Yank and his wife were wandering around Scotland in a 1935 Morris and had taken a liking to his sign. After I snapped a few photos, he pulled out some wire cutters and began to remove the sign, insisting I should have it. A far better souvenir than just a photo! I did not refuse the chance, and together we tied the sign to the roof of our car, anchored at all four corners to the ends of the bumpers.

When we stopped at the pub at the conclusion of the day's drive, everyone was amazed at my discovery. In fact, I learned that many of them had tried numerous times to purchase the sign, only to be told it was not for sale! Yes—I still have the sign!

More signs soon followed, and I learned quickly that signs made excellent patches for leaking roofs, could prevent vermin from digging into garden plots, and were quite useful in making terraced lawns. The collection grew. Soon, there were other sign collectors and we horse-traded, explored together, and sometimes it seemed two of us created some sort of invincible master sign magnet. We discovered signs that had not seen daylight in a hundred years. We acquired signs that were "not for sale," and sometimes, in the dead-of-night, we were able to save a few from impending doom at construction sites.

Each of our signs has a story, but none as wonderful as the time we were showing Sue's brother Brian around the highlands near Inverness, Scotland. We rounded a country road and there at the peak of a gable-ended barn was a beautiful round EssoLube sign. It was literally in the middle of nowhere. After a half-hour search we found the property owner and he gave his permission for us to remove the sign.

From the road, it was a straight-across reach, but between there and the sign was a 30-foot chasm. Down at barn-level, the sign was about 25 feet up in the air. So, with a rickety wooden ladder we found placed carefully on the roof of our Volkswagen, Brian was able to climb up onto the roof of the barn and work his way to the gable's peak. I left him stranded there, leaning well over the edge of the roof while he manipulated the only (small) screwdriver we had, as I stood below, prepared to catch the sign when it finally let go.

We got the sign with no problems, and I still have it along with the little wooden-handled screwdriver used to save it. There have been many more great sign tales over the years that I'll save for future articles or, perhaps, a book someday.

There are a few signs that I personally consider "top of the heap." These, sadly, are not in my collection. I had the chance to acquire them, but even in the 1970s they were beyond my reach. In retrospect, perhaps I should have "invested."

The 22nd Amelia Island Concours d'Elegance 2017, scheduled for Sunday, March 12th, featured the best of Speed and Streamlining, with racing cars and Airflows. Al Unser, Sr., was the featured Honoree, along with an impressive selection of performance vehicles from his career. There was also a wide selection of other recordbreaking performance cars and drivers, and other notables such as Peter Brock with his stable of Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) race cars.

Meet Vice Chair Mark Becker, who is the owner of two Airflows, envisioned an Airflow class for the first time at the Amelia Island Concours. As a result, some of the best Airflows from around the country were invited and many showed, creating an impressive class of ten cars. Featured cars included the exotic Custom Imperial CW 8-passenger sedan with 147-inch wheelbase and rare Imperial coupes from 1934, 1935, and 1936, as well as a 1937 C-17 coupe, which may have been the first time 129-inch wheelbase coupes from each year of Chrysler Airflow production were together at one event. There were also two DeSoto Airflows on the field, including a rare 1936 S-2 coupe, which was also an AACA Grand National winner.

In an unusual move, while facing a predicted Nor'easter storm on Sunday—the scheduled day for the Concours, on Thursday Founder and Meet Chair Bill Warner moved the event up one day. This was a remarkable undertaking, and a tough but praised decision, but a good call because the weather on Saturday ended up being beautiful.

On Friday, Reliable Carriers featured the "Eight Flags Road Tour" of Amelia Island and the town of Fernandina Beach. A record 55 cars participated, with three Airflows making the trip, along with everything from original racing cars to the finest Rolls-Royces, Bentleys, and Mercedes. We found ourselves following a full-race-prepped Datsun 240Z with straight pipes. It was tough to

hear our engine, and I had to watch the oil pressure gauge just to be sure the engine had started! But it was great fun visiting the island's two park sites and rolling into the city of Fernandina Beach with spectators waving and cheering for several blocks. For lunch, we were treated to a catered buffet featuring specialties from local restaurants.

We returned to the transport, but due to the compressed schedule, we decided to park our car on the show field overnight since the morning promised to be busy as Jerry Seinfeld was leading "Cars & Coffee at the Concours" at the same time Werks was sponsoring a meet with about 1,000 Porsches as well as the Concours. It turned out to be a good move, and Saturday, March 11th, dawned as a perfect day for a car show and remained beautiful all day.

Lynn & I were honored to receive a Blue Ribbon [Best in Class] for our 1935 Chrysler C-2 Imperial Coupe. Four other cars in the Airflow Class also received Amelia Island Awards, as well as a Corporate Award. All in all, the time "flowed" by so quickly we were back in Virginia before we knew it!

AACA National Meets In Auburn, Indiana

In May 2013, AACA hosted a National meet in Auburn, Indiana, on the ground of and in conjunction with a major auction by Auctions America. It was such a success that AACA National Meets have been held in conjunction with these auctions in 2014, 2015, and 2016. Another is planned for May 11 to 13, 2017. There is also an auto-related flea market and, while not very large, it has grown nicely each year. Within a few miles of the auction site is the world-famous Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Museum, the National Truck Museum, the Early Ford V-8 Museum, the National

Military Museum, the Hoosier Air Museum, the Kruse Automotive and Carriage Museum, and a large automobile-related indoor flea market. I always like to take in as much as possible while on the road and in 2014 stopped at the Gilmore Museum in Hickory Corners, MI, and in 2015 the Air Force Museum in Dayton, OH, both of which are less than a two-hour detour depending on the direction you are coming from.

Plan on getting to this event early Friday morning and you will have a good opportunity to look at the cars being auctioned over the weekend. If you go to this meet and judge, Auctions America provides you with a bidder number and paddle for free and preferred free parking. The auction begins around noon on Friday and runs through the weekend. When we see large auctions on television the cars auctioned almost all appear to be expensive muscle cars, sports cars, classic cars, etc. The mix of cars at Auburn include many lower priced cars and when the gavel goes down it is in the \$3,000 to \$10,000 range. Keep in mind that you are sort of in the middle of America and things are less expensive. This past May there was a really nice 1978 Lincoln Mark V with 20,000 miles that went for \$11,000, a 1967 low mileage Thunderbird that went for \$12,000, and the list of reasonably priced cars went on. It is not often that you see Canadian-built cars in the U.S. but each year there is a nice selection of Canadian-built cars like the Pontiac Parisienne and Mercury Meteor which have different trim and engines than their U.S.-built counterparts.

If you have not been to Auburn put the meet on your calendar for May 11 to 13, 2017. It is an enjoyable meet with plenty to do.
