The TRAACA's 17th Annual Square Car Tour is on Saturday, May 5th. The tour was started as a way to honor and enjoy our old-fashioned "square cars." There's a large number of square cars in our region; unfortunately, we don't see them on the roads very often. It is hard for them to keep pace with today's modern traffic, avoid large trucks & SUVs, or try to share the road with today's driver who just doesn't understand how things used to be.

Saturday, May 5th, is your day to enjoy a nice drive in your square car! Plan to join us for a leisurely and scenic drive through rural Chesapeake and Virginia Beach, among farms and pastures, and over roads less travelled. Matt & Vickie Doscher have prepared and tested a route perfect for a square car.

One common concern I hear voiced by almost every antique car club and enthusiast is "How do we attract more people—in particular, young people—into our hobby and into our club?" This is a valid concern—just look at any local car show or cruise in, any AACA event, any national marque club show or concours, and most participants you see tend to be on the older side of the age scale. There's nothing wrong with this and plenty of reasons why—as we get older, we tend to make more money & have more time and disposable income (especially after the kids depart home and finish college), so we can better afford to purchase, restore, and enjoy those classic cars we always wanted.

The TRAACA and AACA face the same challenges. (After suffering through two medical appointments today—physical therapy on a shoulder and injections in both knees—I better understand the thrills & agony of getting older that I didn't appreciate as a young man. It's a bear growing older—but it sure beats the alternative!) We're fortunate that we have a number of middle-aged adults continuing to join our region. We also have young adult members who have grown up in the club (I'm talking about you Tyler and Kaylan!) or are growing up in it now. However, we need to continually attract new members to thrive as a club and hobby. New members not only replace members we've lost through age or relocation, they bring new ideas and energy (and different cars, trucks, and motorcycles!) to the club.

So how do we attract new members, especially younger members? I don't have the perfect answer, and I'm not sure one even exists. People have different interests, as do, in general, different generations. We gain some new members to our hobby and club because they're born into it—kids grow up around old cars and are dragged to car shows because their parents are "car people." Some of these children develop a love for old cars. Others don't. There's

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no rhyme or reason for it any more that there is for kids liking or not liking their parents' other interests, hobbies, or professions. Sometimes the "car bug" skips generations—our kids aren't "into" old cars (or even new cars), but our grandchildren are.

I think one key to attracting people to our hobby and club is personal engagement: talk to them, let them (especially children) sit in your car at a car show and have their photo taken in it, give them rides in your classic car, invite them to one of the TRAACA's activities. Let people know they don't have to own an antique car, they just have to like them. Heck, they don't even have to like old cars—maybe they'd just enjoy participating in some of our fun activities and making new friends. (I bet, if they're honest, some of our spouses would admit they aren't as enthusiastic about old cars and car shows as we are, they just go along because we enjoy it and because they want to spend time with friends in the club). If you can get people involved in the club, maybe after some time they'll contract a love for old cars.

Another key is to be respectful of and open to people's different interests in cars. Believe or not, not everyone wants (or even likes) Brass-eras car, Tri-Five Chevys, muscle cars, etc.—fill in the blank. Not everyone wants a "trailer queen" show car (or can afford it). When you meet someone with a car or interest in cars different than yours, or someone with a car in rough shape, don't turn up your nose at the vehicle or insult it. (Not that any TRAAA members would do that.) Talk to the person and find out what cars they are interested in, why and how they obtained the car they have, what they've done to it. Educate them about your car and learn about theirs. In most cases you'll find that you're both "car people" with more commonalities than differences.

Finally, when you find someone with an interest in cars—especially antique cars—invite them to a club activity. If they're interested, ask them to join the club. Find out if they're a military veteran and, if so, offer them one of the AACA's & TRAACA's Military Sponsorship Program free memberships. They can try us out for a year with no risk—we'd love to have them as members, and I think most will have fun and stay once they get to know us.

We started off the evening at the Azalea Inn restaurant in Norfolk. Club members filled up half the restaurant, and the staff did a great job accommodating such a large group. After dinning on delicious pizza, Italian, and Greek fares, we filed out.

Around 7:00 PM we headed out to the nearby Norfolk Botanical Garden for the Lantern Asia display. We had a beautiful spring evening to take in the lights and displays. This is the second time the Lantern Asia Display has been at the Norfolk Botanical Garden, the first being in 2016. Unlike the drive-thru Christmas lights at the gardens, this was a walking tour. We strolled along the mile-long path of lighted artwork, marveling at the intricate designs. This year some local flavor was added with the addition of multiple larger-than-life underwater and coastal Virginia scenes. Also new this year were live performances by traditional Chinese dancers. One of the returning displays was an enormous Chinese Dragon the size of a school bus. The dragon is said to have the power to bring good luck and Club members marveled at the ward off calamities. magnificent Porcelain Tower, a pagoda made of more than

one million porcelain plates, cups, bowls, and spoons. We walked under lighted canopies of clouds and corridors of illuminated lotus flowers. Amazing carp and jellyfish created in an authentic Chinese style floated overhead. Some of the many displays we saw included a color-changing frog and chameleon, a forest of flowers, and a flock of egrets. In conclusion, a wonderful night was enjoyed by all, and we look forward to the next time Lantern Asia comes to town.





There were various pieces of automobilia hanging on the walls throughout the warehouse, including several automobile hoods. The Tucson Region had arranged for a local eatery to cater in sandwich wraps, chips, drinks, and flavored frozen ice.

After the Tucson Auto Museum open house, Mark & I joined some old friends at a local cruise-in at a shopping center on the west side of Tucson. Despite the strong winds and cool temperatures Thursday evening, there were about 100 vehicles at the cruise-in. Most of the people stayed until

The museum docent who gave us a guided tour of the museum was excellent. He had worked/volunteered for the museum since he was 12 years old. (He is probably in his early 70s He was very knowledgeable about the Franklin automobile in general and on each of the cars on display. Look for an article on the museum in a future *Mudflap*.

On Friday evening, 20 people enjoyed dinner at El Charro Café, a local eatery which boasts it is the oldest, continually running Mexican restaurant in the country. After dinner most of the group went to the Gaslight Theater, a small theater showcasing local talent and encouraging audience participation during the performance. Still Collecting Stuff— Vestas **By Terry Bond**

Ok, what the heck is a "vesta?" When the little wooden match stick was first invented it was known as a "vesta." That terminology carried over to include the case they were

Those wonderful little boxes were something that any gentleman carried in his waist-coat in the early 1900s. The well-to-do members of society carried fancy ones—often embossed with fancy designs and images. Later, it became a convenient source of early advertising for all types of things. If you owned an automobile in the early 1900s, you carried a "vesta" embossed with an early motoring scene.



Some were quite simple while others depicted elaborate scenes of early automobiles driving down dusty country roads. Advertising for tires, gasoline and motor oil, even different automobiles themselves, could be found.

Some were shaped like radiators, and others were made in the shape of early cars.

When Safety Matches contained in their own box with a striking pad on the edge began to appear, the fully enclosed vesta became just a cover for the matchbox. Still though, it was an ideal object for advertising, and the automobile and automobile-related things were prolifically promoted on them. Even automobile dealerships and small-town garages

got into the act with their own advertising on give-away souvenirs for their customers. As the nation's motorists began to travel, gas stations began to advertise on them.

Eventually, the box of matches was replaced with a lighter, and the more familiar matchbook and the vesta began to rapidly disappear.

Today vestas represent wonderful collectibles. There is big crossover interest in them from people who collect just vestas of all kinds and don't specialize particularly in automobilia. We compete with some very enthusiastic collectors and automobile-related vestas often seem to be worth a lot more than any other form of advertising.

The best vestas were made of silver or at least were Elaborate scenes are often embossed or silver-plated. engraved on them. Less expensive plated brass vestas can be found, and, of course, later versions of the simple matchbox with a celluloid cover are to be found.

My favorite sources have been antique shops and, of course, the Internet. Keeping an eye on Internet offerings will soon give you a feel for what's common and what's not. There can be hundreds of dollars difference between them.

Beware, however: there is one nicely embossed vesta out there that is produced overseas and is readily available at



\$75.00. around found It's either plain silver plate or the enameled version shown to the left. Original pieces are thin, plated brass, while the reproductions are heavier brass.

Like everything else, the condition of these collectable pieces is everything, and items with damaged or missing pieces, lots of wear on high-

lighted areas, worn plating, or damaged celluloid will have great impact on their value. The examples shown in this article are from my own collection, and a few from other collectors will give you an idea of the wonderful variety that can be found. The earlier items, of course, will always command the strongest prices. Items advertising specific automobiles will also be quite valuable, with one notable exception. There is a simple silver-plated matchbook holder advertising the White Steam Car that seems to be fairly common. It's early and not being reproduced, but because it's fairly common \$150 or less should buy a nice example if you are interested. Some of the better illustrated items, particularly if enameled, will command prices in excess of \$1,000, but you've got a lot of collecting to do before you need to start paying those prices.

Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum Philadelphia, PA

While attending the AACA's Meeting in Philadelphia last February, Marion & I arrived a day early just to visit the Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum located near the Philadelphia airport. What a special place! Friends who had visited the museum recommended it to us, and they were right. Dr. Fred Simeone, an avid automobile enthusiast, has amassed an amazing collection of historically significant sports racing cars, preserving these important pieces of automotive history.

Dr. Simeone started collecting sports racing cars as a young man. (On the museum's website, Dr. Simeone distinguishes between race cars and sports racing cars, noting that "From a collector's point of view . . . the open-wheeled machines are not drivable under ordinary circumstances. They cannot be taken on the road, they are always unmuffled, and the singleseater does not even allow enjoyment with a partner at one's side, consequently they get little use. . . . the pure race car often does not offer the practical excitement provided by the sports car.") Dr. Simeone's first car was a "dilapidated Alfa Romeo 6C 2500," which he acknowledges never ran properly (and he believes was given to him by his father to delay him from driving while he worked on repairing the car). His impressive collection was assembled over 50 years and now includes over 65 vehicles. Originally displayed in a nondescript garage building in downtown Philadelphia and not open to the public, Dr. Simeone relocated his collection to its current location and opened it to the public in June 2008, establishing a foundation to ensure it lives on to educate and

amaze future generations.

Dr. Simeone's father was also an automobile enthusiast and collector, but apparently he enjoyed restoring cars to concours condition, whereas Fred believes in preservation of vehicles in original condition. "I soon developed latent observations that restoration in many cases was a form of degradation and that original finishes, trim, and preservation of cars in an as-found condition certainly supervened over glorious perfection and replacement in the name of restoration." This is evident by the beautiful racing machines on display in his museum—they look like they just came off the road course, then cleaned and prepped for the next race.

The cars in Dr. Simeone's collection are displayed accordingly to racing eras: from "The Endurance Era" (long distance races during the early days of cars) and "Pre-World War I Racing," to "Timed Trials" and "Hill Climbs Trials," to "Le Mans" "and "Watkins Glen." Most of the vehicles are unrestored, and—the best part—they're all maintained in running condition. On the second and fourth Saturdays of the month several cars are brought outside, started, and driven around the large parking lot so visitors can enjoy the sights, sounds, and smells of these exciting historic machines.


