Once again the Auburn Meet was tied in with Auctions America's Auburn Spring Auction. Auctions America is very generous in supplying the AACA space for show cars, members' trailers, judges' parking, Judges School & breakfast, and the awards banquet and ceremony. The auction house also gives AACA members free spectator admission to the auction and free bidder registration. Tom and Tammy Cox signed up as bidders and took home a 1983 Dodge Shelby Charger IMSA race car. (Maybe Tammy is looking at a new career.)

62nd Annual ODMA Meet Staunton, VA May 22-23, 2015

The weather and traffic were mostly cooperative during the drive to Staunton, VA, on Friday May 22, for the 2015 Old Dominion Meet Association (ODMA) Meet. (There was a 15-minute delay on Hwy 58 while a road crew repaired potholes, closing 2 of 3 lanes. Who schedules this on a holiday weekend?) Several TRAACA members met in Waverly, VA, for breakfast, and then we took mostly back roads to Staunton.

After checking into the hotel, we set our goals on dinner. At a suggestion from the Halls and Parrishes, we made a reservation for dinner and then, with a little time to kill, we drove to a small nearby car museum—Eavers' Classic Cars & Collectibles Museum. The building housed 20+ collectible cars, including the last car purchased by Elvis Presley-a 1975 Cadillac Eldorado Biarritz. There was also a 1957 Chevrolet Bel Air drag racer owned and raced by the museum's owner, Petie Eavers. Next to it was a 1965 Plymouth AFX drag racer previously owned by legendary racer Ronnie Sox, which was willed to Mr. Eavers because Petie was one of the few people to beat Ronnie Sox in a match race (on Easter Sunday 1965), edging Ronnie's 426-ci hemi-powered Plymouth with his small block (and "juiced") 327-ci-powered Chevy. The museum also has a period-correct Mercantile Store with all its amenities.

A total of 21 TRAACA members ate dinner at Mrs. Rowe's Restaurant—a locally owned, family eatery. Of course during dinner the conversation turned to cars. It was discussed that Bruce Elder, a local car enthusiast, was opening his car restoration/museum/sales shop Friday evening in honor of the ODMA Meet, so many of us rounded out the evening by going to downtown Staunton to visit Bruce Elder's shop. Bruce and his assistant Brian shared some great stories behind some of the unique vehicles Bruce had on display.

Saturday was a beautiful day. Despite a few minor hiccups (like at every show), the show went on and participants and spectators enjoyed themselves. After judging was over, many TRAACA members visited a nearby large antiques mall. We went back to the show field for the awards ceremony and barbecue buffet dinner. For TRAACA members the awards ceremony ended especially well, when the club again took home the Old Dominion Trophy for club participation—the fourth year in a row and the 12th time in the last 16 years.

The National Auto & Truck Museum

Auburn, Indiana

When visiting Auburn, IN, for the AACA Special Spring Meet in April, we visited the National Automobile and Truck Museum (NATMUS). The NATMUS is located behind the Auburn Cord Duesenberg (ACD) Museum in former factory buildings of the Auburn Automobile Company. There are about 190 vehicles currently on display in NATMUS's 104,500 square feet of display space.

There are two large buildings that house the majority of the NATMUS:

- The Service Building was built in 1923 and used for test-driving automobiles, automobile factory service, and parts distribution. Apparently, Cord 810s & 812s were tuned in the building and then test-driven, guaranteed to go over 100 MPH. (The tested cars came with an engraved dash plaque signed by race car driver Ab Jenkins, indicating the fastest obtained speed.)
- The L-29 Experimental Building was built in 1928-29. The lower level was used for experimental cars and constructing prototype vehicles. The upper level was used to prepare Cord L-29 carSs for shipment after they were assembled on the line.

The NATMUS exhibits cars "that have been built in the tradition of the Auburn Automobile Company." There are many examples of pre- & postwar cars on display. Also on display are numerous trucks, from 1907 to modern concept trucks, from companies such as Acme, McIntyre, and International Harvester.

Inside the NATMUS is the National Automobile & Truck Model & Toy Museum (NATMATMUS). This "museum within a museum" features toy & model cars and trucks ranging from 1894 to present. Some of these "toys" were extremely detailed petal cars in excellent condition. Toys and models are also exhibited in showcases throughout the museum. There is also a small library with numerous books and magazines devoted to the automotive and truck industry. A vintage 1948 diner, while not operational, is part of the permanent display.

The Eckhart Buggy Building is where Eckhart buggies and surreys were made. When buggies transitioned to cars, the early Auburn cars were painted in this building.

FYI: The 1940 General Motors Futurliner No. 10 (of 12 built) was restored by NATMUS volunteers and is owned by the museum. According to the NATMUS, in January 2015 the Historic Vehicle Association announced that Futurliner No. 10 will become the first truck to be recorded under the U.S. Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Heritage Documentation.

If you visit Auburn, IN, the ACD Museum & NATMUS should definitely be on your list of things to do. [Most of the information in this article is taken from the NATMUS website. For more info, go to http://natmus.org.]

Still Collecting Stuff — More on Watch Fobs By Terry Bond

I thought I'd expand a little on what seems to be a fast growing area of collecting for me—watch fobs. These first got a mention in one of the articles I wrote for *The Mudflap* back in 2013.

In the early 1900s, a well-dressed gentleman carried a nice pocket watch. They were carried in a vest pocket and usually attached to a chain anchored to a buttonhole. A nice watch chain draped across a gentleman's waist was an attractive and high-class addition to the wardrobe. Sometimes a decorative attachment provided added "class" to one's attire. Thus, the chance to "show-off" your favorite sport or even the fact you owned a certain brand of car, attended a certain event, or merely enjoyed motoring. Watch fobs were a natural thing to collect, even

way back then.

Automobile-related watch fobs were given away and sold at dealerships, garages, repair shops, auto parts dealers, by product salesmen, and were available at trade stands at automobile shows. Fobs were nice souvenirs at sporting events and many showed race cars in ac-Post-race, they were available to honor the victor. When a new car model came out, a watch fob was produced miniaturizing the auto's radiator emblem or company logo. They were literally made to collect, and people did just that. Chances are that Grandpa's dresser drawer had a few fobs in it.

I must begin with the usual caution—in fact, more so than usual. Watch fobs have been and continue to be reproduced. Flea markets and

the Internet are filled with them. Before you begin searching for fobs to add to (or begin) your collection, take some time and learn to know the "real deal."

There is a watch fob collector's organization—the International Watch Fob Association, Inc. (www.watchfob.com)—which is worth taking a look at. They publish regular information including details on fake and reproduction fobs. There are also collector's guides available that show known variations. These wonderful guides tell you which manufacturers were involved in producing fobs originally, as well as later reissues and reproductions.

As a rule of thumb, I look for a maker's name on the reverse of the fob. One of the most prolific makers was Grammes in Allentown, PA. Whitehead and Hoag was another prolific manufacturer. Other smaller companies also issued fobs in Boston, Detroit, and Philadelphia, but they always marked them on the reverse.

It can be difficult to tell original fobs from later restrikes using original dies. There are some fobs that are total fantasy items, and still others intentionally made to deceive. There are lots of novelty fobs around that use old logos, such as Oldsmobile. Some were produced by Olds dealerships in very modern times using the old logos. A Stanley Steamer fob is currently available from a company reproducing early steam car parts. Price differences can be astronomical. True original fobs produced during the era of the car they advertise are worth the most, some in the hundreds of dollars depending on rarity and condition. Modern restrikes or novelty pieces are worth but a few dollars.

Although I prefer fobs mounted on their original straps, ribbons or chains, they are not easily found like that. When buying from other collectors I find that frayed or damaged original leather straps are sometimes replaced with modern reproductions. (They are readily available.) It's sometimes hard to determine if a strap is an old original or just an aged reproduction, so I leave them alone and just enjoy them as they are. As my good friend Andy Ott says about restoration and tinkering with things like these-"do no harm." So I seldom clean them and never swap straps or ribbons around. "As-is" is my motto.

I find fobs in several ways. Ebay is a good source, but rare stuff brings top dollarsometimes even beyond Word of reasonable. mouth, networking, antique shows and flea markets, and, of course, good Hershey, are sources. I always ask everyone if they have fobs. This year while antique hunting at Renninger's Antique Market in Pennsylvania, I asked a coin dealer if he had any fobs and he produced a box of unsorted "stuff" that contained three good ones-and they were cheap!

Here are a couple of things to watch for. Early fobs were very finely done with sharp engraving & beautifully colored porcelain on them. Chipped or scratched porcelain devalues the fob significantly. Many were done in silver, nickel (also known as "German silver") and, of course, bronze. Some gold-plated. were Chrome did not appear on anything until the late 1920s, so it should not be on an automobile watch fob for a vehicle made before then. Fobs will have some natural wear on them, particularly where they were attached to a leather strap,

ribbon, chain, etc.

Ebay provides a free education. You can see both original and fake fobs there. It's amazing how many unscrupulous dealers there are out there, peddling clearly fake fobs as "original." once carried on a discussion with a vendor at Hershey who just knew what he had was old because it came out of an old estate—the man who collected these things was 97 years old when he died! Well, maybe he didn't start collecting until he was 88 years old, and it gave him great joy to receive all those nice gifts from his sons. He was certainly not an expert and there was no reason to think what he left behind was "guaranteed old and original." So, just because it was found in an old trunk in an old house doesn't mean it's genuine or A beautiful Cole 8 cylinder fob even old!



My collection is not enormous, but, like a lot of things, I've tried to collect quality. When I find fobs on original ribbons or straps, they are worth a premium to me. I hope you enjoy the pictures and the learning experience they might provide. As always, enjoy collecting!

Caught in the Headlights—TRAACA Members & Their Cars Adam & Sandy Graham's 1977 Chevrolet Corvette

Adam Graham doesn't restore cars. He preserves a favorite—a 1977 Chevrolet Corvette—in an attached garage

made over into a mini-museum.

As spotlessly clean as an art gallery and as quietly refined, the garage's gray carpet, white plaster walls and ceiling provide background to the central feature— Corvettes. The only clue that this is a garage is the broad doors that allow Adam to remove the dominating image here, his orange 1977 Corvette. With just over 9,500 miles on it, it's clear this car doesn't see the highway often.

The 1977 Corvette has a lot of awards: it's a six-time winner of the National Corvette Restorers Society (NCRS) Top Flight Award and has been recognized with the NCRS McLellan Mark of Excellence Award (for the restoration and preservation of 1975-1992 Corvettes—per the NCRS website, only 115 Corvettes have received this award) and NCRS Bow Tie Award [which recognizes unrestored Corvettes at least 20 years old—per the NCRS website, only 287 Corvettes have received this award]. Adam's car received Bloomington Gold certification in 2007, an AACA First Junior Award in 2006 [at the national meet hosted by the TRAACA], and an ODMA Junior Award at the ODMA 50th Annual Meet in 2005 in Richmond & its Senior Award at the 2007 Meet in Portsmouth.

Adam and his wife Sandy created the Corvette sanctuary in their Virginia Beach home about 36 years ago to display a collection he began amassing nearly 50 years ago. "It's a hobby," says Adam. "I play with these cars instead of hunting or fishing."

There can't be much ever written about this car or ever inscribed with its name that Adam doesn't own. He has one of every Corvette sales brochure from 1953 on, postcards from every model year, complete sets of Vette Views and Corvette News, as well as an uncut sheet of Corvette collector cards. More than 290 Corvette modelsincluding Franklin Mint and Danbury Mint reproductions.

promotional models made by Chevrolet, Matchbox cars, and a replica of the trailer that hauled the one millionth Corvette on tour—fill glass cases. His recent acquisitions include the promotional models and a numbered medallion from the grand opening of the National Corvette Museum [in September 1994] in Bowling Green, Kentucky, of which Adam is a founding member.

What's more, this is not the half of it. Adam probably has as much again Corvette collectibles stored in the attic. One of his prized possessions—a billboard advertising the Corvette—simply won't fit in the garage.

Adam is an early member (#72) of the NCRS, and was on hand at the Corvette factory in July 1992 to celebrate the one millionth Corvette coming off the assembly line. He has owned 9 Corvettes over the years: 2 C1s, 2 C2s, 2 C3s, 2 C4s, and 1 C5. His current daily driver is a 2004 C5 Corvette coupe, machine silver in color and with a black interior.



Three Major Issues for the AACA

I enjoy reading the many newsletters received from AACA Regions and Chapters in the Eastern Division. They communicate a sense of the diverse views of the antique car hobby that we all enjoy-the media presented varies from hard-copy to email with a creative flair.

We are vitally interested in three major issues: AACA Membership Growth; Driving AACA Vehicles; and the influence of social media on our AACA future.

Membership growth is essential to our on-going existence as a major force in the preservation of vehicles twenty-five years old or older. We must continually seek folks for AACA membership who share our passion for original vehicles.

AACA vehicles are "allowed" for touring, shows and Meets as they attain the age of twenty-five years old and remain original. We must be tolerant of this aspect of our hobby. Some may view a twenty-five year old car as a "used car." Some have told me that at one time only "brass cars" were considered AACA cars. If you were born in 1990—perhaps you perceive a 1990 car as an "old car" or a "collector car."

Social Media. Many of us may struggle to embrace the idea of Facebook, Twitter and You Tube. Some may look back and remember a first introduction to the computer in our business world-it took a while to embrace that! Today the computer is indispensable to our everyday use. At some point in the near future, we may find that Facebook, Twitter and YouTube are more a part of our everyday activity—and they possibly already are for some of us!



Judges' CornerBy Marion McAlpine

There have been some clarifications to the AACA Judging Guidelines that you may not be aware of if you haven't judged at a national meet this year. Recent AACA Team Captains Schools emphasized notifying vehicle owners about any major deductions noted by the judging team on the field. (Per the AACA Official Judging Guidelines: "Items of major deduction on a vehicle will be discussed with an owner by the Team Captain.") Judging Team Captains were told that "major deductions" now include all items which receive a maximum or mandatory deduction.

Maximum deduction can be defined as the maximum number of points each item can lose when being judged. This number can be found in the "MAX DED" column located on the individual judging Category Worksheet (Section 2 - Appendix) and individual Automobile Judging Form (Section 3 - Appendix 3-5). For example: on the Engine Judging Worksheet, hose clamps are worth 1 point each up to a maximum of 10 points (up to a maximum deduction of 10 points even if the vehicle has more than 10 incorrect clamps). On the Exterior or Interior Judging Worksheets, mirrors are a maximum of 3 points. (Remember, a maximum deduction is taken only if the item is either 1) nonauthentic, 2) missing or 3) no longer fit for the purpose it was intended.)

Mandatory deduction is defined as the required deduction taken for certain nonauthentic/incorrect items. Mandatory deductions are circled numbers found under the "MAX DED" column on the judging sheets. If assigning a mandatory deduction to an item, the deduction taken must match the circled number. For example: if the upholstery in a vehicle is incorrect, the mandatory 10 points are deducted (no more, no less).

Of course if an item is present, authentic, and fit for use, the maximum or mandatory deductions are not applicable. On authentic items, the points deducted, if any, will be determined by the condition (workmanship or maintenance) of the item.

So please note, items that receive a mandatory or maximum deduction—even if that number is small (e.g., 3 points for a mirror or 10 points for hose clamps)—should be discussed with the vehicle owner by the Team Captain.







Enjoy the summer! I hope to see you on Saturday, June 13th, at the TRAACA Dolphin Watching boat cruise that Linda Pellerin has organized.

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
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
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
