TRAACA Tour to Charlottesville Friday-Sunday, July 27-29, 2018

Plan to join your TRAACA family for the TRAACA's July activity, a tour to Charlottesville, VA, on Friday-Sunday, July 27-29. All activities planned for the tour are optional.

We will meet at the Hardee's on Route 460 in Waverly at 10:00 AM on Friday. Our first stop will be lunch and then we'll drive to Cunningham Creek Winery in Palmyra for a winery tour and private tasting with the winemaker. After our tour we will drive to Charlottesville and check into our hotels. After dinner we will visit the McCormick Observatory. Per its website, visitors can view celestial objects through the historic 26-inch McCormick Refractor and other smaller telescopes (weather permitting), tour the observatory, hear a presentation by an astronomer, and see the exhibits.

After breakfast on Saturday we will travel to Monticello for a "Behind the Scenes House Tour" at 10:00 AM. This exclusive pass takes you behind the scenes through the first floor of

Monticello and up the narrow staircase to explore the private quarters on the second and third floors, including the iconic Dome Room. You will see unique architectural features and visit newly restored spaces that reveal the complexities of family life at Monticello.

After Monticello we'll have lunch followed by a drive to Keswick, VA, to tour Castle Hill Cider, which is nestled on 600 beautiful acres in the historic Virginia countryside just outside Charlottesville. The cidery, which opened in 2011, resides on the land that belonged to the Castle Hill estate, which was established in 1764 and hosted seven U.S. presidents and many other dignitaries. We will have dinner in Charlottesville, followed by a guided walking Ghost & History Tour.

On Sunday there will be a trip to Ash Lawn Highlands to tour the residence of President James Monroe and his wife, Elizabeth Kortright Monroe, from 1799

From the Driver's Seat

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On Saturday, September 22nd, the TRAACA will hold our largest event of the year—our 45th Annual Meet (or, as it has become known, our “Wings & Wheels” Car Show). As you read this message, September may seem a long way off, but the summer is going to fly by and September will be here before we know it. Our Meet Co-Chairpersons—Barry Basnight & Marion McAlpine—and the Board of Directors have already begun planning and coordinating the many aspects of our annual meet, but there is still a lot of work that needs to be done before September 22nd and on the day of the meet for it to be a success. We need your help to do it.

This year's meet will be held again at the Military Aviation Museum in Virginia Beach. Our annual meet continues to be basically two car shows in one: our “Preserving the Past” show for antique vehicles 25-years-old or older in original or restored “as-built” condition (so basically AACA-eligible vehicles), and our “Mods & Rods” show for modified and customized vehicles 25 years old or older. Jerry & Ellen Adams have taken over as Registration Co-Chairpersons for the entire show. Jim Elliott returns as our Chief Judge.

Barry and Marion are expanding on the success of last year's Meet Chairman Tony Scarpelli and have a number of new, fun things planned for this year's show. Besides the two car shows side-by-side, we're also going to have a special display commemorating the 100th anniversary of Chevrolet trucks. All Chevrolet trucks are welcome—and we hope we get a number of classic Chevy trucks to participate—but the highlight of the display will be the AACA Library & Research Center's freshly restored 1955 Chevrolet 3600 Bookmobile, which is traveling all the way from Hershey, Pennsylvania, to be at our show.

We're also going to incorporate some youth activities in this year's meet. The highlight of this will be children

between the ages of 6-14 participating in the Hagerty Youth Judging Program. (Hagerty suggests we have a team of 15 children judging six, prearranged vehicles representing different eras of automobiles so the kids can see how automotive design and technology progressed. If we have enough children, we'd like to have two teams of kids—one to judge the “Preserving the Past” cars and one to judge “Mods & Rods.”) We're open to other suggestions for youth activities—we've already received suggestions for valve cover races or Hot Wheels toy car races. If you have other ideas, please let Barry or Marion (or me) know. Also, please contact Barry or Marion if you'd like to volunteer to help conduct any of the youth activities we have planned. (We need a team leader and at least two other volunteers to lead and herd each Youth Judging Teams.)

Part of the attraction of our show—besides the wide variety of great vehicles—is the opportunity for participants, volunteers, and spectators to visit the Military Aviation Museum, which is truly a treasure in the area that many of us take for granted. In addition to being able to see the world's largest collection of flyable WWI and WWII military aircraft, as usual the museum will also be offering rides, for a reasonable fee, in vintage aircraft (weather permitting). A special treat this year will be a flight demo at 1 PM by the museum's Me-262 German jet aircraft. Between our annual meet and annual swap meet, and teaching at the Joint Forces Staff College, I've been going to the Military Aviation Museum at least six times a year for the last eight years and I've never even seen the museum's Me-262 because it's housed at the Suffolk Airport (because the FAA won't allow it to land on the museum's grass runway).

As I stated up front, we need everyone's help for our meet to be a success. Please volunteer to help however you can. The more people who volunteer, the less work it will be for everyone. Whether it's before the show or the day of the show, even if you can only help for an hour or two, every effort helps. Please contact Barry or Marion if you can volunteer some time. Thank you very much! I look forward to seeing each of your and your cars at this year's show.

Oh, yeah—Happy 4th of July!

AACA Grand National Meet Greensburg, PA May 31—June 2, 2018

The 2018 AACA Annual Grand National Meet (AGNM) was held in Greensburg, PA, hosted by the Western Pennsylvania Region AACA (WPRAACA), on May 31st to June 2nd. The site for the meet was the campus of the University of Pittsburgh at Greensburg, and it was a beautiful setting for the meet. There were over 500 vehicles registered for the meet.

Some of the participants arrived in Greensburg on Thursday, May 31. For those who arrived early enough on Thursday, the WPRAACA had arranged for meet participants to view a couple of private car collections.

Although the weather was hot on Friday, many participants spent time doing last minute cleaning of their vehicles before the show on Saturday. Some people enjoyed a tour of the Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater house and a visit to the small village of Ohiopyle, which sits on the Youghiogheny River and has some picturesque falls.

One of the highlights on Friday was viewing 16 of the 17 candidate vehicles for the 2nd Annual Zenith Award. (One vehicle was not present.) The Zenith Award is given to the vehicle considered the most magnificent "Restoration of the Year," and the finalists were selected from all the vehicles show at AACA Meets in 2017. One of the finalists this year was a 1958 Cadillac Eldorado Biarritz owned by TRAACA members Reggie & Cindi Nash. The winning vehicle was a 1935 Packard 1204 Super 8 owned by Gregory & Cheri Haack of Freeport, IL.

Friday night, 21 TRAACA members & friends went to dinner

at a local restaurant called Rizzo's Italian Restaurant. John Kuhns, the 2018 AGNM Chairman, is well known by Rizzo's owners and staff and helped me set up the reservation. The chef and staff treated our group like royalty. They gave our group free platters of appetizers before the meal and desserts after the meal. The food was great, and our group had a wonderful time.

Shortly after we returned to the hotel Friday evening, it began to rain in Greensburg. Thankfully the rain stopped before Saturday morning and the roads were fairly dry when meet participants drove their vehicles to the show field. Getting to the field was fairly painless. The meet volunteers were well-organized & friendly. Temperatures were warm, but there was a breeze and some clouds which made it bearable while judging.

The banquet on Saturday evening was held at the Ramada Inn, the host hotel. The food was very good and the staff was very quick serving our meals. However, because of the number of vehicles receiving awards, it ended up being a late night.

Still Collecting Stuff — Recent Discoveries

Periodically, I'll interrupt the regular flow of collecting topics to include my recent important discoveries. This is such an opportunity.

People often ask if I have a "plan" to my collecting. The answer is of course—*NO*, I am completely open to anything interesting that falls off the shelf into my hands! There are, however, items that I'm aware of from my research and that exist in other collections that are high on my "want list." I've been searching for some for a long time.

I must admit that occasionally the opportunity to acquire a rare piece presents itself, but too often at a price that I just cannot justify. Sometimes an item appears at a high-end European auction and I'm just not a player because of the logistics and the potential for budget damage. Big buyer's premiums at auctions are also a turn-off that can quickly escalate the cost of collecting. Then there is always the guy who beats me to it at Hershey!

Occasionally, however, there is a second chance to acquire a prize. Just such an occasion presented itself earlier this year in a Fredericksburg, Virginia, antique shop.

The item is a wonderful bisque porcelain figurine of a lady driving a fancy allegorical automobile. It's a mantelpiece flower vase. It's one of a pair; the companion is a well-attired gentleman driving a similar automobile headed the opposite direction.

The pair is well known among advanced collectors and is pictured in a major reference work on early automobile artwork. They are German in origin, and were hand-decorated probably in France at the turn of the century when the motoring craze was in its infancy.

I found the figurine of the gentleman driving the car many years ago in an antique shop in Louisville, KY. It was in a high end shop dealing with European imports. It was not inexpensive, but, I considered myself quite fortunate to have been able to acquire it and gladly added it to my collection. Of

course, now I had to think about someday finding the companion piece to complete the "set."

Years went by and the only other one I'd seen was sold in an auction in Germany and the price was beyond realistic. I never thought I'd own one.

This spring, while on a tour with the Tidewater MG Classics Car Club, we had some free time in Fredericksburg, and naturally we had to catch a few of the many antique shops there. The second shop we visited was filled with nice higher-caliber merchandise.

In the fourth booth on the first aisle, there it was: on a lower shelf, squeezed to the back by some antique glassware. My heart jumped! It was the long-missing mate to my figurine of the gentleman driving a car! I first snapped a photo of it resting in place so I could savor the moment long after purchase!

I gently moved things away and carefully lifted it out into the light. It was beautiful! Best of all, the price tag read "\$42."

I gingerly carried it up front for safe-keeping while I continued to look. The clerk told me “this dealer is having a sale and the price on this will be \$10.” What I had thought was \$42 was actually \$12—the figure 1 was written stylishly and looked like a 4!!!! So, for a mere \$10 I added an item to my collection that had eluded my grasp for nearly 20 years.

Years ago I had done the same thing in reverse order buying the smaller version of the same figurines. These figurines were available in two different sizes: large for the mantel and small for the knick-knack shelf.

The small lady figurine was acquired first in a Pennsylvania antique mall. The gentleman driving figurine was an Internet purchase, and both were acquired at only a fraction of their actual value. So, the “set” is now complete!

I do have some “techniques” I use to “find” things, and one of my favorites is ferreting out hidden gems on the Internet. In this case, I happened to be casually pursuing an interest in Scottish grandfather clocks. We have one and for many years I’ve looked trying to find another from the same maker.

I spotted a listing on the Internet for one that was freshly imported in a “container just arrived from the UK.” The seller had a link to his antique shop in the listing, so I visited the shop (on-line) just to see what else he might have imported. Although I wasn’t looking for anything specific, I knew that sometimes these container loads get filled with odd “filler” items like porcelain signs, prints, paintings, Doulton plates, and who knows what else.

It didn’t take long to find a

prize in my searching. It was a rare Edwardian-era Shell Gasoline (Motor Spirit) advertising mirror. Still in its original frame, it was in superb condition.

Three versions of this mirror are known to exist. One I already have in my collection was acquired in London in a Portobello Road antique shop while we lived in Scotland. It is the earliest version and does not have a gas can depicted, only the notation “By His Majesty the King of England”—I guess that’s like the Good Housekeeping seal of approval.

This version, showing a red gasoline can is the second oldest variety and I have only ever seen one other—in a museum in England.

I immediately contacted the shop owner and made a nice offer on the mirror, and it was accepted. The mirror arrived carefully packaged for a nominal extra charge and it now resides on a wall in our house.

The third version, showing a green gasoline can is equally difficult to find—so I will keep looking and perhaps someday I’ll complete that set as well.

Last up, I’ll leave you with a photo of a recently acquired matchbook cover—another vesta! [Editor’s Note: See Terry’s article on vestas in the May issue of *The Mudflap*.] This one has a wonderful miniature enamel radiator emblem on the front for the Flint Automobile.

No sooner did I complete my last column on vestas when one turned up for sale in an Internet auction. I was watching it carefully and, before leaving for the AACA National Meet in Auburn, I placed a bid on it. I bid quite strongly, hopeful that I could add it to my collection. While in an Auburn, Indiana, antique mall walking around with Mark & Marion McAlpine, I glanced into a small display case filled with little pins and some chauffeurs badges. The price tag said “Your choice \$15 each.” There it was—a Flint Automobile advertising matchbook cover! For \$15 I snagged it quickly, and just as fast cancelled my pending bid on the Internet auction item. The one in my hand was in better condition anyway.

As an interesting side note, I had been through that antique mall a day earlier and had either not noticed the vesta or it had been placed into that case after my earlier visit.

The lesson here is sometimes you find different stuff in a place you looked at yesterday. Susan often tells me that if you go back through an antique shop from the opposite direction, you’ll see different things.

So, happy collecting. (And yes, the money I saved on my latest “discoveries” will most likely be rolled forward towards some much more extravagant purchase!) May the thrill of the hunt and the excitement of discovery fuel your collecting, too.

Franklin

Franklin Auto Museum

Franklin

TRAACA members who own Franklin automobiles (such as Marty & Neil Sugermeyer) have told us about the Franklin Auto Museum in Tucson, AZ, and encouraged us to visit. We finally had the opportunity to do so when we attended the AACA Western Spring Meet in Tucson last April. All those Franklin owners were correct—the Franklin Auto Museum is great.

The Franklin Auto Museum is located in a residential area of Tucson and the final stretch of the journey to get there requires driving on a dirt road. The museum was founded over 40 years ago by Thomas “Tom” Hill Hubbard. Tom bought his first Franklin in 1950 and went on to become one of—arguably the—premier restorer of Franklin automobiles. He founded the H.H. Franklin Club in 1951, restored over 70 cars for the late Bill Harrah, wrote what’s considered the definitive book on Franklin automobiles, and most of the cars and memorabilia in the museum are from Tom’s personal collection and are housed in large garages on the property of his former home and restoration business. Tom passed away in 1993 but endowed a foundation to maintain the museum and preserve this impressive collection of automotive history.

Admission to the museum is a bargain at \$10 (\$8 for senior citizens) and includes a guided tour, which was outstanding. Our guide has been associated with the collection since he was a 12-years old (he’s probably in his 70s now), grew up helping out and then working there, and told us of learning to drive (before he had a driver’s license) in a Franklin and flying down the dirt roads around Tom’s house (and being cautioned by Tom to slow down a bit). He also knew and shared with us the history behind every car in the display and pointed out some neat memorabilia.

We really appreciated the guided tour—unless you’re a Franklin expert—visiting the museum would not have been the same. (Even if you are an expert, you probably wouldn’t know the history of each car and what went into its restoration.)

Each vehicle in the museum is unique and somewhat rare since only approximately 150,000 Franklins were produced between 1902-1934 and only 3,700 are estimated to remain. The highlights of the collection are an unrestored, original 1910 Franklin Model G Touring Car with only 6,300 miles, H.H. Franklin’s personal car a 1931 Franklin Model 153 Deluxe Touring Car (which began as a 1929, but was refreshed in 1930 and 1931 with the newer features and new serial numbers), a one-off 1931 Franklin Model 153 Sport Phaeton (built for Stillman F. Kelley, II for his wedding trip), a 1932 Franklin Model 1600 V-12 Sport Phaeton (which was never produced, but was built from the original factory blueprints—the prototype is in the Northeast Classic Car Museum in Norwich, New York). The collection is not stagnant—the museum continues to add select vehicles. The most recent are a 1905 Franklin Model A runabout with rear entrance tonneau and a 1924 Packard 143 touring car owned formerly by the late Isabella Greenway King, founder of the historic Arizona Inn (which opened in 1930) and Arizona’s first Congresswoman.

Tucson is a beautiful city, and the 2018 AACA Western Spring Meet was great, but if you love old cars the Franklin Auto Museum is worth the trip out west on its own. The museum is only open on Wednesdays to Saturdays from mid-October to Memorial Day (or by special appointment in advance), so plan your visit accordingly.

Caught in the Headlights—TRAACA Members & Their Cars

Fellow TRAACA member Chris Hunt is very proud of her 1973 Plymouth Scamp. Chris has owned the car for a little over 3 years, having purchased the Scamp on April 29, 2015. Since then she has enjoyed driving it as much as possible.

Chris had been in the market for a classic car and was looking for a Dodge Dart or Plymouth Duster (because she liked the body style) when she was given a lead on the Scamp by a friend. Chris is the third owner of the Scamp. The first owner was a woman who bought the vehicle when she was in her fifties and lived in Florida. The automobile was in her possession for 20 years, until her death in 1993, when the car went to its second owner—her nephew—who brought the car to Virginia. The nephew kept the car garaged for the 22 years he owned it, only driving it once weekly around the back roads of Windsor to keep it in good running order.

Chris's 1973 Plymouth Scamp is a Chrysler A-Body vehicle and is part of the third-generation of the Plymouth Valiant, which was produced from 1967 to 1973. The Scamp models were only produced from 1971 to 1976. Chris's Scamp is a 2-door, hardtop coupe with a 225-ci, 105-HP, "Slant Six" engine with a Holley single-barrel carburetor (which is stock).

Chris has a large collection of documentation on the vehicle, including an original Chrysler Broadcast Sheet. The vehicle has its numbers-matching engine, original gold

interior, original spare tire, power steering, power brakes, AM radio, and hand-crank sunroof. The exterior color is Alpine White and was repainted once in the original color in 1999.

Since owning the car, Chris has had its engine cleaned and repainted. She also had correct hoses and hose clamps installed. Chris appreciates the power brakes she had added, which were an option on the 1973 Scamp. On the appearance side, Chris added the black trunk stripe and rallye road wheels.

Chris enjoys driving her Scamp to car shows and cruise-ins. She states she will drive it anywhere with roads. When Chris bought the Scamp in 2015, it had 35,000 original miles; it's now pushing 43,000 miles. Chris drove the Scamp to New Bern, NC, for the AACA Southeastern Fall Meet in 2016 and was awarded its Driver Participation Class (DPC) badge. Chris also has two chips (for 2,000 miles and 5,000 miles) on her AACA Mileage Award Program (MAP) Badge.

When you ask Chris what she likes best about her Scamp, she replies "It's a MOPAR." She states her dream car would be a 1970 Plymouth Hemi 'cuda in the color Plum Crazy. Chris likes that her Scamp is not a "trailer queen." She reports, "I like being able to drive it and not being afraid to drive it." It won't be long before Chris adds the next chip to the MAP Badge.

Judging Results

I am often asked “How do I get a copy of my judging sheet?” A simple letter to the Vice President of Judging can get you the information you desire.

The letter is to be mailed to the current Vice President of Judging at the address provided in the *Antique Automobile* magazine or the club website [501 W Governor Rd, Hershey, PA 17033] and should include the following:

1. Your name and address;
2. The year, make and model of your show vehicle;
3. The judging class for your vehicle;
4. The meet you attended;
5. A self-addressed stamped envelope for the return of your results.

It is the policy of the AACA to provide a summary of the deductions received and not an exact score. As a result, you will receive a highlighted judging sheet disclosing the areas in which deductions were made.

You can use this information to inspect your vehicle and possibly improve it for the next meet or next level of competition. It is often helpful to have another judge or a member of your Region review the vehicle with you.

The AACA standard of judging is to present your car as it was delivered to the original owner from the dealer. Items that are not period correct receive deductions, as well as items that no longer appear new.

While the AACA promotes competition, remember that this is a hobby. Have fun at the meets and enjoy your historic vehicle.

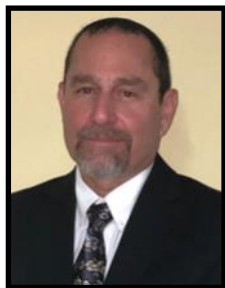


Give ‘Em a Ride

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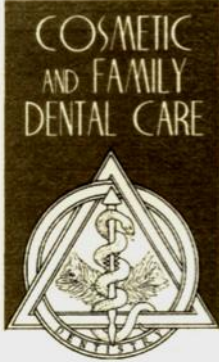
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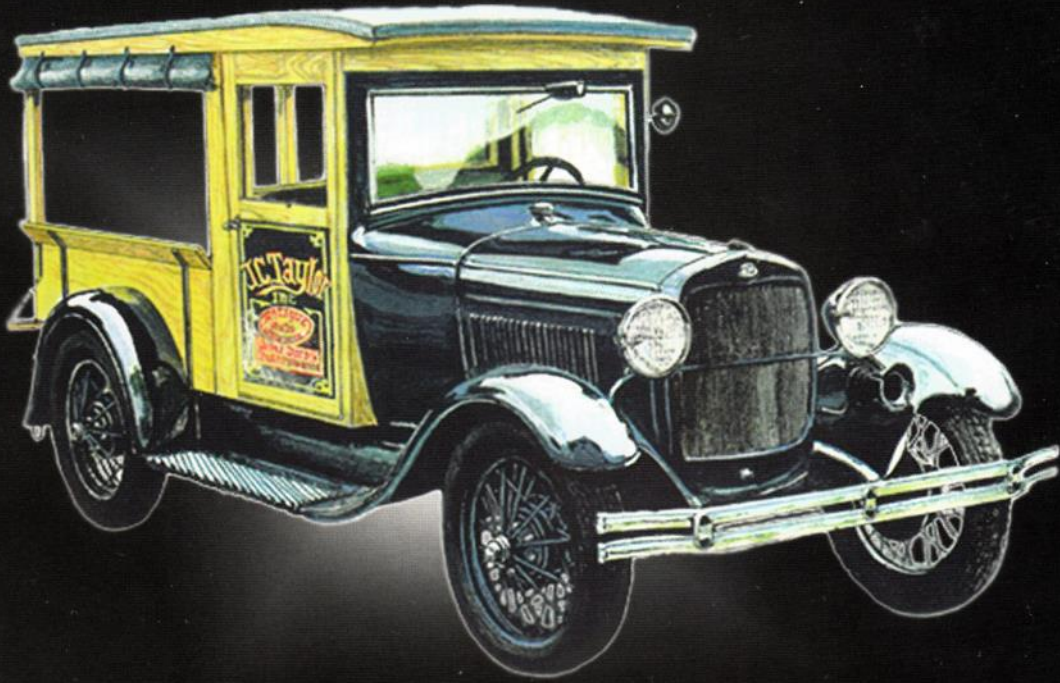
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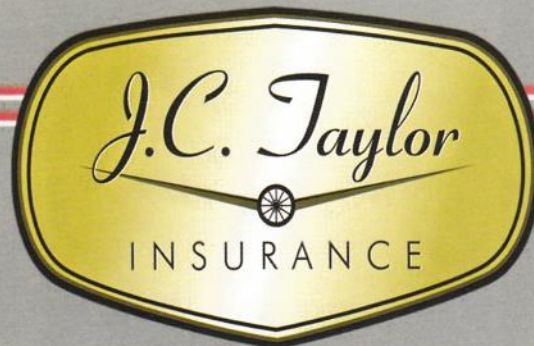
