Hollywood Cars Museum Las Vegas, NV Story and photos by Mark McAlpine

near McCarran Airport in Las Vegas, NV, is a car museum with an eclectic collection of vehicles seen in some of the most popular movies and television shows of the last sixty years: the Hollywood Cars Museum. (The museum also in the 1960s, 1970s, and 1980s such as Batman, The houses the Liberace Garage-the subject of a future article-a collection of cars owned by the late famed pianist and entertainer Liberace.) The museum is part of Michael Dezer's collection, who also has car museums in Fort Lauderdale and Miami, FL. Many of the vehicles in the museum are stunt cars used for action scenes in the movie and television shows; some are reproduction cars used by the studios for promotional appearances; and some are tributes to the original cars. The museum also houses some original vehicles such as a 1928 Nash 340 Special Six sedan, a 1953 Triumph Mayflower, a 1956 Hudson

Off the beaten track, in an industrial warehouse complex Wasp 4-door sedan, a 1959 Edsel Villager station wagon, a 1963 Sabra Sport, several microcars, and a collection of vintage Vespa scooters.

> Most of the television vehicles are from shows popular Beverly Hillbillies Starsky and Hutch, The Dukes of Hazzard, and Knight Rider. Similarly, the movie cars are from popular movies of the same era including The Love Bug, Bonnie and Clyde, Back to the Future, Batman, and several James Bond movies. Others are from shows or movies I've never heard of (e.g., a 1963 Francis-Barnett Falcon motorcycle from the British television police show *Heartbeat* that ran from 1992-2000).

> If you want a flashback of vehicles you saw in movies and TV shows years ago, the next time you're in Las Vegas, visit the Hollywood Cars Museum.



STILL COLLECTING—Puzzles By Terry Bond



After a month off to allow for more in-depth reporting of our Grand National, it's good to be back – but I've been collecting, making use of the time away. Stay tuned for another article on recent finds. Meantime, I'll share something that I find quite "puzzling."

Puzzles – Do you enjoy jig-saw puzzles? I know a lot of folks who have one permanently spread out on a table somewhere, waiting for the next late night or rainy afternoon to add a few more pieces in the right places.

Nothing is new! Back in the 1800s they were known as "Scroll Puzzles" since they were cut using a scroll saw. Of course that terminology changed to "jig-saw" when they became motor operated.

At the turn of the century, puzzles in all varieties could be found. When the automobile was introduced, it didn't take long for motoring-the latest craze, to get onto puzzles.

The great puzzle in the above photo was published by McLoughlin a well-known New York publishing firm that pioneered in color printing technology. Their lavishly illustrated children's books are well-known among collectors. They ceased operating in 1920.



The box covers were amazing and of course served as a reference when assembling the pieces. They were not terribly complicated anyway. Finding complete puzzles though is always a challenge, and finding good quality box lids is even more difficult. These puzzles were literally works of art and are quite valuable today. I continue to search for excellent examples for my own collection, but auction prices for prime examples are usually well-beyond reasonable!

McLoughlin Brothers were not the only game in town however. Parker Brothers soon began publishing puzzles of their own. While not as lavishly printed, they were still fun. Parker Brothers was already producing many different games, so branching off into puzzles was only natural. They pioneered many novel ideas including multi-sided puzzles. One puzzle could produce different scenes, front and back.

In Europe, the publisher Raphel Tuck began in London in 1866. It was a husband-wife team and their primary product was postcards. They pioneered the use of heavy embossing and glossy inks. The company was completely destroyed during bombing during WWII, but was rebuilt and enjoyed many additional years of success. The company became the British Printing Corporation, then later, Maxwell Communications. It's interesting to note their "scroll puzzles" were called "Zag Zaw."

Another type of automobile puzzle is the "dexterity puzzle." These small hand-held puzzles were real tests of a steady hand. Under the glass cover, there were two or three small ball bearings, or glass beads. The object is to get them to rest in small depressions in the back so they would appear to be resting in the headlamps or hubcaps of the automobile depicted.

These were usually about 1 ¹/₄ inches in diameter. The backs were made of cardboard and the glass cover was held in place with a metal band of brass that was sometimes nickel or silver plated. These were popular gifts at Christmas time for children. As a result, they were not usually treated gently and survival was poor. I have managed to find a variety of them over the years and have never paid more than \$50 for a nice one, although prices have been on the rise over the last few years. I don't know how many different versions there are and it seems a new previously unknown version surfaces every-so-often.

Automobile racing was a popular theme and many puzzles were produced showing race cars. One of my favorites however is this great square boxed dexterity puzzle from England. It was a souvenir of the famed Brooklands race track. As you can see, the object was to get the white circles (representing tires) into their proper position on the automobile. Ohh-that' spelled "tyre" of course!

Advertising using automobile images appeared at quite an early age as can be seen in this wonderful puzzle depicting early cars racing on a country lane. It came in a box labeled "The Auto Race." It was advertising for Hood's Sarsaparilla. To get this game you had to send in the trademark from one of their products along with ten one cent stamps. You could make two puzzles from this "kit" – the automobile race and the trademark Hood's owl. I was fortunate enough to find a complete boxed set recently.

Another great advertising puzzle is this fantastic curved-dash Oldsmobile. It's one of the best known automobile advertising puzzles. There were four different puzzles that could be made from a boxed set. Two puzzles were printed on paper glued to two thin sheets of cardboard. Only one of the prints featured the automobile however. To make life easier when assembling the puzzle, individual small prints of each scene were included as a "guide."

This little puzzle is a combination dexterity and wordgame. Versions of this have been around a long time and this is not a particularly rare or difficult item to find. The letters can be moved around and rearranged to spell out the word "automobile." It's more difficult

than it actually looks! Examples can be found for less than \$50 in nice condition.



As you can see, collecting automobilia can be quite "puzzling" at times, but it certainly adds another dimension to your hobby.

Enjoy collecting – stay tuned for more! I've discovered some new antique shops on our way home from the recent AACA Meet in Beckley and have a few discoveries to share.

More Cars from the 2022 AACA Grand National at Founder's Inn in Virginia Beach, Va.

I wanted to showcase more of my favorite cars from the Grand National we just hosted at Founder's Inn. On three of the cars, I had time to talk with the owner's and learn about their stories with the cars

they own. This month I am going to focus on the first car that I really liked and the story I was able to gather while talking with the owner of the car. The car is a 1939 Packard 120 Convertible in Class 20 E owned by Bob Goldstein from Cherry Hill, New Jersey. I met Mr. Goldstein and his wife Friday evening as I was walking to my car in the parking lot at Founder's Inn after having eaten at the BBQ dinner.

Mr. Goldstein was cleaning bug residue off of the car, while his wife (I regret not asking her name) sat in the front seat of the car resting. Mr. Goldstein did not want the bug residue staying on the car even though he planned a complete cleaning the next day. They has just arrived from Cherry Hill after driving the car all the way to Virginia Beach. Of course that

day was in the 90's for a high temperature and 1939 Packards do not have air conditioning. His wife said they stopped multiple times because they were so hot on the drive down. She told me it was too hot to drive with the convertible roof down on Route 13 to Virginia Beach.

Mr. Goldstein said that it has always been his practice to drive the Packard to all the shows that it has competed or was shown in.

Mrs. Goldstein said that they have owned the car since 1971 and have a picture of her on the running board with their 4 month old daughter after they brought the car home. This would be his third Grand National as he was trying to win the cars 1st Grand National Award.

As we talked I learned that Mrs. Goldstein had been the newsletter editor for their region in the past and we discussed our mutual efforts at creating a newsletter. She was surprised when I told her we published monthly and really shocked at the size of the Mudflap.

Returning from overseas duty in 1971 with two years active duty remaining to serve in the military, we needed a car that was reliable and economical to operate. The new Volkswagen "Super Beetle" was introduced that year and added some features that seemed to fit our needs so it was decided this was the right car for us to purchase.

One of the deciding factors was the increased storage area in the trunk. The newly designed Macpherson strut front suspension and "bubble" trunk hood increased the storage space to nine cubic feet....an amazing 86% increase over the standard Beetle! That, among many other improvements in the defroster/heating system, storage behind the seat and the dual port heads boosted the 1600 CC engine to a whopping 60 HP.

We intended to buy the standard sedan. However, with demand being high for the new model our dealer only had two choices available. We could only get a bright yellow convertible or a Karmann Ghia from stock. We decided to spring for the extra \$200 and bought the convertible. The convertible body was produced by Karmann.

What fun we had with that car! We owned it for eight years. Putting the top down on a summer day, enjoying rides through the country, bringing friends and family for tours through the Washington DC area were all enjoyable and bring back many fond memories. As each of our three children were born, all were driven home the first time in that car. But as our fifth family member was added it became evident that our beloved super beetle no longer fit our needs. Having paid \$2400 new, it sold for \$1800 eight years later. Not bad depreciation by today's standards.

Fast forward 45 years. Driving through town, there beside the road was a nearly identical 1976 bright yellow super beetle convertible with a for sale sign in the window. With a little negotiation we now have our beloved bright yellow super beetle back to drive and enjoy. Now we are making new memories and look forward to seeing you on a National AACA Tour. Look for the bright yellow Super Beetle Convertible. See you down the road!








INSURING YOUR VEHICLES FOR OVER 50 YEARS
