The museum was established in 1923 by American Legion Post #25 as the American Legion Memorial Museum of Virginia. The museum has collections of artifacts, weapons, vehicles, uniforms, posters and more which trace the evolution of the U.S. military from the Revolutionary War period through present times. Want to see a section of the Berlin Wall and a section of the outer wall from the Dachau Concentration Camp? Come join us! The museum offers many different exhibits including

Women at War and Marches Toward Freedom, examining the roles of women and African-Americans in the military, and Visions of War, the museum's impressive propaganda poster collection. If the shopping bug hits you, shop for unique gifts in the "Duffle Bag" gift shop. Parking is free. This is a selfguided tour. The group rate of 20 or more persons is \$6/person which is 25% off the regular \$8 admission rate. After the museum tour, lunch is planned for 1:00 PM at the Crab Shack Seafood Restaurant just behind the museum. From the Driver's Seat

In case you haven't been at the last few dinner meetings or haven't read the minutes from the region's board meetings the last few months, we've sold the club's old car trailer and have ordered a new, smaller cargo trailer. The old trailer was a 28-ft-long car hauler, which the club purchased in 2010 for \$6,192 (including delivery from Georgia). It was probably larger than we needed then, and definitely was way too large for what we needed now after getting rid of the old cooking equipment (that we used to use at our annual Swap Meet) and the cement bases for the vehicle class marker signs (used at our Annual Meet). We don't use the cooking equipment anymore now that we don't cook & sell food at our annual Swap Meet (and wasn't in the best of condition), and we disposed of all of it several years ago. The concrete bases were heavy to move when setting them up and removing them from the show field, many were broken, and they've been replaced with new stick-in-the-ground aluminum plate bases (initially built by Sam Kern and then mass produced by Jerry Adams) for shows on grass and soon to be made wooden bases for any future shows we hold in parking lots.

The old trailer was a beast—it was long, heavy, and not easily towed without the proper tow vehicle. It was also beginning to have some issues (e.g., the wood in the doors was beginning to rot). We sold it for \$4,500 and ordered a new 18-ft-long, 8.5-ft-wide, 6.5-ft-high V-nose trailer from USA Cargo in Georgia. We were good stewards of the club's money and didn't go nuts on options—the new trailer is pewter in color, has 3,500-lb torsion axles and radial tires, 1 spare tire & spare tire mount, a 36-in side RV door with bar lock, standard tongue jack with sand pad, non-powered roof vent, and 1-piece aluminum roof. Price with these options came to \$5,721 (plus tax) and includes delivery from Georgia. It will easily hold everything we need, plus has

room for more stuff in the future. It will also be considerably easier to store & tow. Come check it out at the Annual Meet.

Speaking of the Annual Meet, it's not that far off—Saturday, 22 September (a little over a month and a half away by the time you're reading this issue of *The Mudflap*). Please register and bring your antique vehicle. This is our 45th Annual Meet, and we'd like to have a great turnout of members with their cars, trucks, and motorcycles. We'd like to see as many vehicles as possible and share them with all the non-TRAACA participants and spectators. We have almost 500 antique vehicles in our region—we easily should be able to have at least 100 of them on the show field.

We also need your help to prepare for and hold the meet. I know, I know, I know—we're all busy—but our Annual Meet is our biggest activity of the year and we can't hold it without everyone pitching in. Please contact our Meet Co-Chairs Barry Basnight & Marion McAlpine (hey, I know her!) to volunteer even if only for a few hours. I guarantee they can use your help in some area either before the show or at it, and you'll still have plenty of time to enjoy the show.

We also need your help in advertising the show. Please give a flyer to anyone you know with a car 25-years old or older. We have two shows going—the "Preserving the Past" show for AACA-eligible vehicles and the "Mods & Rods" show for modified and custom vehicles 25-years old or older. We're also allowing any year Chevy truck in the special display commemorating the 100th Anniversary of Chevrolet trucks. (The AACA Library's 1955 Chevrolet Bookmobile will be there as the centerpiece of the display.)

Please also help advertise our Annual Meet by picking up some color flyers for the show at the August dinner meeting and take them to your local auto parts store or car dealership and ask them to post the flyers somewhere visible to their customers. Grab some black & white flyers and drop them in some cars at the next car show or cruise in you attend.

We'd like this year's Annual Meet to be our largest show ever, so bring your family, friends, and antique vehicles to the Military Aviation Museum on Saturday, 22 September—you'll have fun and see some neat old cars & warbirds.

Why would you want to go to Gettysburg, PA, in the middle of the summer? To participate in the AACA Eastern Spring The Chesapeake Region of the AACA Meet, of course. (CRAACA) hosted this year's AACA Eastern Spring Meet in Gettysburg, PA, on July 11-14, 2018. You would think holding a meet in the middle of the summer in Gettysburg, where the weather can be hot and humid, would end up being a bust, but there were about 530 vehicles registered for the meet, and most of them were on the show field on Saturday.

The CRAACA did a terrific job putting the meet together, with events set up every day. Mark & I arrived on Wednesday afternoon, ready to check out the scheduled tour of the Prueitt Restoration shop. We almost did not get to see the shop because there had been a change in the schedule with the tour for the Prueitt Restoration shop taking place in the morning. Luckily, someone from the CRAACA suggested we go anyway. So, we drove 1.5 hours to the shop, and we were not disappointed. The staff and owner Dave Prueitt were gracious hosts showing us around the shop and talking to us about the types of vehicles currently at the shop and the restoration work they were performing on them. Thursday's tour was to the Antietam Battlefield and the Don Bowman Collection. 

Smithfield Olden Days Car Show Saturday, June 30, 2018

Every year for the past 30+ years, on the fourth weekend in June the City of Smithfield, VA holds its *Smithfield Olden Days Festival*. The two-day festival is a big deal for the city and definitely a family-oriented event. Most of the activities are free to the public.


The festival kicks off on Friday with an outdoor flea market. You can find baked goods, vintage items, garage sale items, etc. In the evening there is a car cruise-in on Main Street, consisting of antique vehicles both classic and modified. There is a free concert in the evening at the town's gazebo, and, to complete the night, you can sign up for one of the Historic Ghost Walks.

On Saturday, the Farmers Market opens early in the morning in a large parking area off Main Street. Main Street is closed off for the Toys for Tots Car Show. Antique classic and modified cars and some modified modern vehicles line the street on both sides. The registration fee for the show goes to the Toys for Tots program which supplies toys to local children at Christmas. Free lunch is given to all car show registered participants. Trophies are awarded in the afternoon.

Another highlight on Saturday includes the Kids, Bike, and Pet Parade. The parade contains decorated bikes, tricycles, wagons, scooters, golf carts, and costumed people and pets. The parade travels up Main Street and ends in the middle of town, where prizes are awarded to the parade participants.

On Saturday afternoon you can walk or drive down to the Pagan River, on the east end of town, to watch or participate in the Pagan River Raft Race. Participants in the Pagan River Raft Race use homemade rafts or modified rafts (former watercraft hulls disguised as rafts) to run a course using only human power as quickly as they can. Trophies are awarded to the fastest rafts that don't sink.

The weather for this year's *Smithfield Olden Days Festival* was sunny and hot. There were over 125 vehicles registered for the car show. Several TRAACA members attended the car show including Lynn & John Heimerl, Missy Hespenhide & Tom Norris, Chris Hunt, Marion & Mark McAlpine, Tina & Ron Pack, and Leslie & Tony Scarpelli. (Charlie Daniels, who is one of the show sponsors, was ill that day.)

Hilton Village 100th Anniversary Car Show Saturday, July 7 2018

Anyone who drives down Warwick Blvd in Newport News knows about the speed trap in Hilton Village, but have you ever stopped to walk around the shops there or taken the time to learn about the history of the area? The Hilton Village Centennial Celebration on Saturday, July 7, 2018, offered the perfect opportunity to do both.

Hilton Village was built by the Newport News Shipbuilding between 1918 and 1920 to house the thousands of workers hired to build ships after the United States' entry into World War I. Over 500 homes were built to house the ship workers and their families, "sold to the men at cost and the price will be about 66 per cent of the cost of similar houses built on the commercial plan." Each house had electricity, running water, and was connected to the city sewer system. The new town was officially opened on July 7, 1918, with over 100 houses under construction at the time. Hilton Village was a planned community with lots set aside for four churches, a school, an 8-10-acre park on the river, 16 stores, and a Chesapeake & Ohio railroad station. Although the war ended before Hilton Village was completed, construction continued through 1920.

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of historic Hilton Village, the City of Newport News held a grand celebration, blocking off Main Street for concerts, a car

show, food trucks, and historic displays complete with volunteers dressing in period correct costumes to provide ambiance. Volunteers acted as World War I soldiers, nurses, a Salvation Army comfort station, suffragettes, and even included boys pulling a wagon to collect scrap metal "for the war effort" and paperboys handing out souvenir reproductions of the front page of the Newport News Daily Press newspaper from Saturday, July 7, 1918, announcing the official opening of Hilton Village that day. (And the police took a day off from manning the speed trap to mingle with the people strolling the streets and enjoying the celebration displays and activities.)

Hilton Village contacted the TRAACA and other local car clubs to request antique cars from the 1910s and 1920s to line Main Street during the centennial celebration. When they couldn't obtain enough of these generations of vehicles, they opened participation to newer cars up to the 1960s. Over 30 antique vehicles participated, including cars owned by TRAACA members including Al Becker and his 1929 Packard 640 Phaeton 8, Terry Bond and his 1914 Ford Model T, Keith Colonna and his 1956 Lincoln Continental MK II, Sam Kern and his 1925 Franklin, Alfonso & Patrizia Ludovici and their 1956 DeSoto Fireflight, and Tony & Leslie Scarpelli and their 1956 Chrysler New Yorker.

Still Collecting Stuff— Steins & Flasks By Terry Bond

I can't think of anything better on a hot July day than a cold drink from a suitable container! The beverage of choice can be quite varied, and the idea of sipping your favorite is an ancient tradition. The containers utilized also vary considerably.

Early motoring enthusiasts just had to use suitable drinking vessels. Pubs and inns of the day had special racks where regular patrons could store their own personal mugs, steins, and flasks. Even back then there was some concern for sanitation. Public-use drinking vessels were not often washed thoroughly, so having your own "private" mug was important for your own personal health.

In Germany, the beverage, of course, was beer. The traditional German "beer stein" was the most popular container. The fancy hinged lids were introduced originally to keep flies from landing on the mouth of the stein or diving in to take a swim. These early German steins were often decorated with elaborate scenes—particularly humorous or witty illustrations. They were often hand-done and painted by hand in colorful glazes. For the early motorist, steins were sometimes decorated with great early motoring scenes.

These early steins are genuine antiques produced by such quality makers as Mettlach. They are quite rare and when found in perfect condition can bring strong prices when appearing at auction.

Of course, there is tremendous crossover interest. Lovers of pure automobilia are competing with collectors of beer steins, and with automotive-

themed steins being so rare an auction can get quite lively when one shows up.

There are only few known varieties, but they turn occasionally. was fortunate to acquire a nice example from an online antique dealer who quite willingly accepted my offer when I pointed out that the requisite hinged lid was

missing. It was a bargain, and I am contact with an individual in New England who professionally repairs these and has an assortment of genuine pewter antique lids he can install for a quite reasonable price. He actually has the correct lid for this particular available. So, although I violated one of "rules collecting" and purchased damaged item, it will be an easy restoration and

the total investment will still be far below actual value.

Be aware that there are several modern varieties of souvenir steins that have been produced. One in particular is an Avon product that is quite common. Avon produced several different versions over the years, but all are marked on the base as Avon products. Another readily found "mug" is produced by the English firm Wade. These are usually a dark orange-golden color and have an image of an early car on them. These are quite common and are worth very little.

There are several varieties of beer "mugs" that never had lids on them and, again, they often feature humorous motoring scenes. Shown below is one from my collection.

Mugs and steins are usually quite substantial. Their bases are thick, as are the sides—done to keep the contents cool. However, such thick materials were prone to cracking during firing, so watch for cracks that would greatly reduce the mug

or stein's value. Check also for areas that have been repainted or filled in with simple "bondo." A blacklight will quickly reveal such repairs.

The AACA's Zenith Award was established in 2016 to recognize AACA's the best restored vehicle of the year. (The restoration does not have to have been completed that year.) A specially selected team of judges consider every vehicle shown at an AACA national meet that year, narrow the field down to a select group of cars, and choose and announce the winner at the following year's Annual Grand National Meet (AGNM). The 2016 Zenith Award winner (announced at the AGNM in Independence, MO, in June 2017) was a 1928 Auburn 8-88 Speedster owned by Richard & Helen Harding from Ohio.

The finalists for the 2017 Zenith Award consisted of 16 beautiful vehicles selected from over 2,900 vehicles shown at an AACA national meet in 2017. After the judging team spent almost six hours examining the vehicles, the winner was announced: a 1935 Packard 1204 Super 8 owned by Gregory & Cheri Haack from Illinois.



There are two more National Meets to be judged this year [one by the time you read this issue of *The Mudflap*], and both are in Pennsylvania—Gettysburg and Hershey. How many times in the past have we had four meets/events in the same state? But there's no need to worry about becoming an automatic resident of PA because you're spending so much time there. He brings a plethora of experience and knowledge to the school presentation. I'm sure I am learning as much from him as he is from me and as you will from both of us.

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
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
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
