REPORT FROM THE BOARD

October 13, 2009 - TRAACA Board Meeting

The board meeting was called to order at 5:56 pm at Priority Chevrolet. Members present were Linda Pellerin, President, Bob Stein, Vice-President; Linda Pavlidis, Secretary;

Gancel, Treasurer; Board members Don Hobbs, Scott Davies, Bill Wilcox, and Riley Best. Also present were Bob & Dot Parrish, Frank Lagana, Marie Gancel and Bob Hampton.

Don Hobbs reported that he has five new members who will attend a future meeting. The minutes were approved as read via e-mail/regular mail. Treasurer's report was submitted for audit. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

*Activities: The Chili Cook-off on November 14 and the Christmas party on December 5. The November dinner meeting on November 19 will also be the scene of our annual silent auction.

*The installation banquet for the new officers will be held on January 23, 2010, and will cost \$3 more per person – there will be chicken, fish and prime rib. 26 vehicles have signed up for the Fall Tour and it is still open if anyone is interested.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

*The by-laws have been sent to Jim Elliott for a look-over from a legal aspect. Then they will be ready to mail.

*If anyone has anything for the memorabilia case at Hershey they need to get it to Richard Hall. Bob Parrish advised that we have only half a case and Linda Pellerin said she will check on getting us a full case.

*Work continues on establishing a 'private' area in the TRAACA website for the roster and by-laws and past issues of the Mudflap for the members. It was suggested we should keep the current Mudflap in the "public area" as it is beneficial to the club.

The board is still looking into getting a new trailer. A potential trailer is located on Route 17 on the Eastern Shore and will be checked out on the Fall Tour.

NEW BUSINESS:

*The board discussed creating a recognition plaque for 100 year old cars owned by club members, some kind of brass tag with TRAACA recognition. John Gancel will work on a graphic design for board approval.

*An inquiry was made as to who the Club Historian is – Craig Casper was identified. It was suggested that he might bring out some of the items he has a couple of times a year at a dinner meeting for the members to look at.

*The board approved a motion to have a "hard luck" trophy, sponsored by Bill Wilcox and Ken Talley, for tours (members must be driving an old car). It would be passed on to the next "hard luck" member. People on the tour will vote on the "winner" and the "winner" will be required to attend the next tour.

John Gancel provided financial reports from the Friday Night Social and the Wings and Wheels and suggested we might consider raising the cost per person for the Friday Night Social. A suggestion was made to have an 'After Meet Meeting' to compare notes and get ideas while everything is still fresh in people's minds.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:58 pm.

More than 200 antique vehicles participated along with a terrific display of vintage aircraft. Many of the aircraft were rolled out of the hangars and parked on the tarmac. Conditions were also favorable for two of the old biplanes to take off and fly over the show field area, much to the delight of the crowd.

The automotive display included antique and special interest cars for AACA class judging; open event for day of meet registrants, including Hot Rods and Modified vehicles; and the annual

Brits on the Bay Show for British marques. The oldest antique cars included a 1907 Orient Surry and 1909 Oakland Touring. Many fine cars that were built by companies no longer in business, along with other popular cars between 1910 and the



1980s, were also on display.

Participants and patrons to the show were greeted by Tidewater Region AACA members dressed in period costumes. Participants received door prizes and raffle prizes were awarded throughout the day. Visitors enjoyed not only the cars and planes, but presentations on the history of the Model T Ford, free popcorn from a 1929 Model A Ford Cretor's Popcorn truck, music from a band atop an English double-decker bus, visits to a number of vendors, and good refreshments from the food tent.

Attendance was up this year over last year and everyone agreed it was a tremendous success which can only get better in the years to come.

FALL TOUR Not Getting Lost with Bill and Ken

Barbara Talley tried to keep dry while Ken Talley and Bill Wilcox gave us our start-up instructions for the Fall Tour.

Il of the days we've said ":Rain, rain go away" to get nice weather for club events finally caught up with us - the Fall Tour turned out to be the 'another day' that the rain came back on. So what do you do when the whole weekend of your Fall Tour turns into a two-day recreation of Noah's flood? If you are in the TRAACA, you go anyway! All of the folks who signed up for the tour showed up at 7:45 AM, most in vintage iron - it rained back when the cars were new, right?

Twenty-six cars and nearly 60 people showed up, with sixteen antiques. Ken and Barbara Talley's 1939 Mercury was the oldest, with a mix of cars that went all the way up to the 1978 Thunderbird owned by Bob and Dot Parrish. After a quick briefing by tour planners Ken Talley and Bill Wilcox and the handing out of magnificent tour books created by Dot Parrish, participants rolled out across the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel to the first stop in historic Cape Charles on Eastern Shore.

The tour wound through scenic country roads at a leisurely pace as navigators (and sometimes the drivers) looked for answers to questions scattered throughout the tour book. What will you find hanging on the side of the old house? (A wreath). How many columns on the old school? (Four).

Our first stop, predictably, was for breakfast at the Cape Charles Coffee Company. Many of the local shops and galleries had opened early for us, and time had been allocated to explore the main street. Cape Charles was also the setting for a couple of events involving President Linda Pellerin. While checking the local theater for the answer to a tour book question (How many seats – 410), she discovered a wanted poster in the ticket window with her name and face on it! Ken and Bill had placed the posters (created by Dot Parrish) all over town, accusing Linda of crimes such as 'Stopping at Stop Signs' and 'Forcing TRAACA Wives to drive Stick Shifts'. That was not the end of it – as she and husband/accomplice Bob (Tooth Fairy) paid for their coffee,

a local police officer wrote her up for driving an 'obscenely ugly' car (their 1964 Volvo).

The tour continued to the town of Eastville, VA, home of the oldest continuous legal records in the country (the first record dating back to 1632, another trivia question). The old courthouse was opened up special for the tour, with guides to provide the background of the restored facilities. Linda Pellerin seemed a bit nervous when the tour reached the Debtor's Prison.

Leaving Eastville, we rolled through more back roads, eventually arriving at Franktown United Methodist Church where we – of course – ate again. The Church Choir had put together a terrific lunch with homemade soups, sandwiches, and desserts. Franktown Methodist dates back to 1793, and the current sanctuary was completed in 1893.

Rolling out from Franktown, the tour changed course from the past to the future with a visit to the NASA Wallops Island Flight Facility visitor's center. Used extensively for unmanned research and exploration missions, Wallops Island plays a key role in many ecological and environmental studies. Members were able to explore the visitor center at their own pace, with movies running continuously on the Facility's history.

Leaving the Flight Center, the tour headed for Ocean City and the Comfort Suites hotel. Once everyone was (finally) checked in, the group broke up for dinner on their own and a chance to freshen up before heading back out to the Ocean Jamboree Theater for a musical variety show called "Summer Song." The talented cast kicked off with a comical magic act, then moved on to a string of vignettes featuring popular songs from the 1950s and 1960s done in costume, and sometimes with a good bit of tongue in cheek. Bob Pellerin was called out from the audience to participate in a second magic display, where the magician apparently drained water from Bob's brain out though his forefinger. The show also presented reenactments of some classic old television scenes, such as the 'Vitameatavegamin' commercial from the 'I Love Lucy' show.

The next morning found most of the tour group gathered in the hotel breakfast area, enjoying a surprisingly complete continental breakfast. Then the group walked to the first activity of the day, a visit to the Wheel of Yesterday automobile museum located literally next door to the hotel. Opened especially for our tour, the museum boasts a wide variety of vehicles ranging from a 1905 curved-dash Oldsmobile to a 1964 Amphicar. The museum coordinator gave us a private tour of the collection, sharing

stories about some of the more prominent vehicles. He also 'auditioned' Shelia Gurney for the role of Gun Moll to stand with a classic Lincoln touring car set up as a gangster's getaway car. Despite a fearsome scowl as she posed with a machine gun (pointed at hubby George), she did not get the job.



The next event scheduled for the tour was a visit to the Furnace Town Living Heritage Museum, was cancelled because rain was still falling and the attraction is all outdoors, so the decision was made to skip Furnace Town in favor of a more relaxed departure for our final stop - Parksley, VA. Webmaster Bob Stein provided comic relief for this leg of the trip, sinking one side of his 1951 Studebaker almost to the axles in mud when he pulled off the road to get photos of other tour cars passing. Happily, photos got taken anyway, and four truckloads of local young men stopped to push the Studebaker back up on the pavement. Although there was a nice railway museum and some antique railroad cars to explore, the main attraction was lunch provided by the Parksley Volunteer Fire Department. Well-known for their Bar-B-Que chicken, the Fire Department didn't disappoint. In fact, they surprised most of us when they dropped HALF a chicken on each plate! There was also excellent potato salad and baked beans, followed by homemade cake.

After everyone was done eating, there was a final event that wasn't in the tour book. A local police officer was recruited to drag Linda Pellerin up to the front of the room, where a table and chairs had been set up. Then, to the chant of 'Here Come De Judge', his Honor (?) Neil (the Hammer) Sugermeyer stepped out of a supply closet in white wig and black robes to preside over the prosecution of our 'criminal' president.

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
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
