Annual Meet is our biggest activity of the year, so let's make it a successful one by registering your vehicle today. As of August 17, there are only 20 vehicles pre-registered, with 8 of those being TRAACA members! Let's break the tradition of procrastination and get your vehicle registered today. Registration Chairman Jerry Adams has made the process quite simple and has provided many reminders about getting your vehicle registered early. For your vehicle to be judged AACA style, your registration form must be postmarked by September 14. postmarked after this date will fall into the Day of Show category. The Tidewater Region has over 300 members and there is no reason we can't support our largest activity of the year by registering our vehicles and getting them on the show field, volunteering to help with show field setup on Friday, and volunteering on Saturday morning to park vehicles and Saturday afternoon to break down the show field.

Our club Bylaws are still under review at the membership level. Wayne Milligan has taken the time to annotate the proposed changes to the Bylaws and created a pdf file making it easier for all of you to see the proposed changes. This file is posted to our website under the library tab with the proposed changes highlighted. I will briefly summarize those changes now.

- The first three pages are simple grammatical corrections.
- Page 4, Treasurer, we removed the responsibility for

- member notification regarding membership dues and placed it under Article V, Section 12 Membership Chairperson.
- Page 4, Article V, Section 2, we replaced Secretary with Treasurer regarding who receives and files membership applications and dues. We removed the sponsorship wording when it comes to members sponsoring prospective new members as we don't necessarily do this anymore. We clarified that the Membership Roster contains personally identifiable information and should not be shared commercially or outside of the Region.
- Page 4, Article V, Section 3, annual membership dues will be due by January 31 of each year for those wishing to be included in the Membership Roster. Those that fail to renew by said date will be considered inactive until they renew their membership.
- Page 5, Article V, Section 4, removed section regarding any member whose dues are more than 60 days overdue as this is covered in the previous section.
- Page 6, simple grammatical corrections.
- Page 7, Article V, Section 12, new section containing content previously under Treasurer.
- Page 8, Article VII, Section 1, added typically Certificates of Deposit will automatically renew unless the Board takes action to the contrary. Added that the Treasurer has a responsibility to monitor all investments and provide the Board with a notice of maturity.
- Page 9, Article VIII, Section 2, wording change from "should not hold any" to "should avoid."
- Page 9, Article VIII, Section 3, previous Section 3 deleted as we normally don't notify National of our activities. Previous Section 4 moved up to current Section 3 and wording changed from local elections to installation regarding when National is notified of our regional elections. We do not have a Roster Committee, so that was changed to Board.
- Page 9, Article X, Section 1, wording change from Standing Committees to Roles/Committees. Replaced

"Welcome to Canada, Eh?" AACA Vintage Tour

This article's title speaks for itself. If you have never been on an AACA National Tour, than you've probably been told, "You need to go on an AACA National Tour. You'll get the tour bug and be hooked." Well, Mark & I took the plunge and participated in the 2019 AACA Vintage Tour in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, on August 4-9, 2019. It was so much fun!

We started our trek to Kingston, ON, on August 3rd, stopping in Binghamton, NY, for the night. A convenient stop near Norwich, NY, home of the Northeast Classis Car Museum (winner of the 2018 AACA national museum award—the AACA Plaque). We visited the museum the next morning; it was well worth the side trip—it has an awesome collection of vehicles. Look for a future *Mudflap* article.

Leaving New York for Canada we chose to take the car ferry to Wolfe's Island, ON, followed by a drive across the island to a second car ferry which goes to the city of Kingston, ON. Both ferry rides were smooth, and we were able to get out of our vehicles and chat with other passengers. After arriving in Kingston, we drove to the Ambassador Hotel in Kingston—the hub location for the Vintage Tour. The evening of August 4th was the Meet & Greet banquet at the hotel. We met a great couple—Dave & Louise Wilson, from Ontario—whom we rode with for most of the tour.

For those not familiar with it, the AACA Vintage Tour is restricted to vehicles 1931 and older. The oldest vehicle on the 2019 AACA Vintage Tour was a 1907 Darracq 20/28 HP touring car. The Wilsons' vehicle was a 1930 Dodge Brothers DB 6, a 4-door sedan. Mark & I were "Hoppers," meaning we did not bring an antique car and would hitch a ride with participants having an open back seat. We were grateful that the DB 6 was a hardtop with roll-up windows and plenty of leg room in the back seat. We also rode in a 1930 Cadillac with Joe & Lynne Konarowski, the tour Co-Chairs, and in a 1930 Packard 733 Touring owned by Marty & Dale Roth from Louisiana.

There were 91 people and 37 vehicles (39 were registered) on the tour. Each morning the group met for a buffet breakfast in a reserved room in the hotel. This was a great way for people to mingle with the other tour participants.

The Hospitality Room was open every evening until 10:00 PM. Many of the tour members gathered in the Hospitality Room to visit and, of course, eat snacks. It is easy to see why people enjoy going on tours—there are plenty of times throughout the tour to talk to other participants and get to know people.

On Day 2, the group drove country roads, stopping for a coffee and snack break at the Sydenham Royal Canadian Legion Branch 496. We walked down the street a short distance to Trousdale's, Canada's oldest family-owned general store. Next stop was to the Carriage Shop & Museum, a private antique buggy collection in the quaint town of Westport, followed by some shopping and lunch in Westport. The ride back to the hotel took us through Chaffey's Lock, Lock #37 of the 1830's Rideau Canal System. Some of the swing bridges are still opened by hand.

Tuesday, Day 3, the group drove to the clubhouse of the Upper Canada Region of the Antique & Classic Car Club of Canada (ACCCC) located in the Odessa Fair Grounds in Odessa, ON, for a coffee break and you guessed it—snacks. The tour group drove to the Glenora Ferry, which took us across Prince Edward Bay, then we drove to the Waupoos Winery, Prince Edward County's first winery, for a catered lunch. A fast moving, severe thunderstorm rolled through while we were having lunch. Thankfully, we were under a large tent, but many of the cars were wet inside and out. The sun returned for the trip back to the Ambassador Hotel.

The weather prediction on Wednesday, Day 4, was for heavy storms in the afternoon, so many people in the group, including us, drove our modern vehicles. We drove to Farmtown Park in Stirling, ON, which had a large collection of antique tractors and farm equipment. The highlight was a 1920's era downtown, complete with shops, a dentist office, a doctor office, a chapel with a pipe organ, and a Texaco service station—all indoors. We enjoyed a catered lunch on the cobblestone street. Our next stop was to the National Air Force Museum of Canada in Trenton, ON. Another severe thunderstorm occurred while we were in the museum, making us happy we drove modern (and Dave Wilson didn't

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have to sit in a wet seat).

Thursday, Day 5, the group drove to Gananoque, ON, to enjoy a boat cruise of the Thousand Islands region, where Thousand Island Salad Dressing was invented. The cruise, along the St. Lawrence River, passed through Canadian and United States' waters. We circled a heart-shaped island housing Boldt's Castle, started in 1900 by millionaire George Boldt as a tribute to his wife Louise to be their summer dream home. Unfortunately, Louise passed away in 1904 and Mr. Boldt ended the construction and never moved in.

On Thursday evening the Wilsons showed us Canada's first railway tunnel, which was completed in 1860 under the streets of nearby Brockville, ON. The City of Brockville acquired the tunnel in 1983 and has since paved the floor of the tunnel, lined it with LED lighting, and preserved the walls. People can walk and bike through the tunnel for free







and experience the computerized sounds and a light show depicting a "train" coming through the tunnel. It was a great experience.

Friday, Day 6, the tour group visited the 1830's British outpost, Ft. Henry in Kingston, ON. The tour cars were able to park in the Forward Battery within Ft. Henry's walls. We enjoyed a very educational guided tour and had lunch on the grounds. We proceeded to the Military Communications & Electronics Museum in Kingston. On the trip back to the hotel, another thunderstorm occurred, with many of the tour group getting soaked, including us.

The evening and tour ended with the closing banquet in the hotel Friday evening. The Konarowskis and their helpers did an awesome job hosting the 2019 AACA Vintage Tour! Yes, Mark & I caught the touring bug, and we look forward to our next AACA tour opportunity.

A Different Car Museum Art Cartopia Museum

Beautiful cars from many exquisite museums around the country have been published here in the Mudflap. I would like to show another side of the automotive museum On our recent International 190SL Group convention in Santa Fe, NM, we toured Los Alamos, NM (the home of the WWII nuclear bomb project), Alamosa, CO, and then drove over a couple of 10,000-foot passes to Trinidad, CO. Here we visited the Art Cartopia Museum. This museum, in a small town in southern Colorado, was a total surprise—it was a museum for "art cars."

What is an art car? Rodney Wood, the creator of the museum, describes an "Art Car as anything that looks good and is self-propelled; everything else is a float." Rodney, a very energetic local artist, was approached by the Trinidad Chamber of Commerce to organize a local art festival to attract tourists to Trinidad. After some thought and research, Rodney proposed an "Art Car Festival" similar to the parades in Houston, San Francisco, and Seattle. With little expectation for success, Rodney was given a little money and the support of the town. In 2012, he created the "AutoCade Art Car Festival," which attracted 35 cars. The parade and festival have expanded every year. Last year, the festival attracted 100 cars and about 10,000 visitors to Trinidad (population 8,000). If you have time, explore the photo gallery on the www.artocade.com website. With its success, the festival won the 2016 Governor's Award for Best Small-Town Festival," and in 2018 Rodney was presented with the "Governor's Leadership Award" for his success in expanding the "art car festival" to a museum with year-round activities.

The museum contains about 30 cars and a couple of in-process vehicles. The cars went from wild, outrageous art to incredible art. Some had political messages, like the "Stink Bug" (a VW Bug covered entirely with cigarette butts) to an SUV covered with art glass tiles where each image was a classic car in perfect detail. There was even a very loud V8powered VW Beetle dragster, which Rodney says he sends down the parade route to wake everyone up because it cannot be driven at the parade's stop-and-go pace.

So, if you want to visit a fun, funky museum, visit the Art Cartopia museum in Trinidad, CO.

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

Still Collecting Stuff— Garage Displays By Terry Bond



I've always loved exploring old garages and auto parts stores. I started back in the 1970s when there were still some great places around. Even in Europe, there were treasure troves waiting to be found. And to think, this was all before the TV shows today that have popularized "picking."

As my collection(s) of memorabilia began to grow, it seemed logical to display things in their natural setting. This led to my own personal recreation of an auto parts store, circa 1915. Filling it with appropriate items has been fun, and each item has its own story—probably enough for several more issues of our Mudflap. [Editor's Note: Probably enough for several years of issues.]

Product displays for these old stores are also known as "point of sale" displays. Even back then, many of them were interactive. As a spark plug collector, the old store idea has proven to be the perfect repository of spark plug-related items that I found to "go with" the plugs themselves. Spark plug display cabinets, countertop demonstration devices, cutaway samples, etc., all formed the nucleus of my "old store."

One of the first items I ever found was a great Champion Spark Plugs display cabinet. While we were living in Scotland, I was able to find the garage where our 1935 Morris was sold new. An older employee there gave me a

guided tour, and this cabinet was given to me as a memento. Better yet, they still had records of their car sales and I was able to contact the first owner of our car. Imagine his surprise when he learned it was destined for America.

Another of my displays is a plug demonstrator for Doering Plugs. Complete with bulbs that flash and a cut-away plug you can actually see operate, you can put your own spark plug on top comparison. It's powered by dry-cell two batteries and a Model T ignition

A similar spark plug demonstration display for National Spark Plugs is not quite as elaborate, but

is probably just as much an attention-getter on an old auto parts store countertop. Pressing a button will cause the bulbs to light up and the plug to spark.

Spark plug cabinets were found in shop windows and on store countertops, and there are countless varieties of them. I used to find them for around \$150, but today you can add another a zero to that number for a rare, early cabinet in great condition.

Products themselves were often displayed in special racks or in other special countertop containers. I have a never-used display for a "Can-No-Rust" radiator sealing product used for quick roadside repairs of your leaky radiator. The cans are all empty, intended for display only. These probably were for use in a shop window. It was a great find in an Ohio antique mall several years ago and had come from an estate clean-out, possibly from the original auto parts store owner or perhaps a company salesman?

Special automotive paints were always available in old garages, auto parts stores, and even hardware stores. One of my favorite display items is a Model T Ford wheel on a display stand. The individual spokes are all painted in





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
different colors of enamel that were available from the Effecto Auto Enamel Company. I also have assembled an assortment of original tins of Effecto paint to display on a shelf in my store. This paint was applied by brush.

Another great display is Model T Ford specific and shows how reinforcing springs can be used to ensure the throttle return operates as it should. There were more accessories made and sold for the Model T than any other vehicle, and I have a number of product displays related to the beloved "flivver." A Model T carburetor is used to demonstrate how the springs are fitted.



A great Badger Fan Belt display sits on the countertop in my old auto parts store recreation. It was a lucky find on my way to the Carlisle swap meet many years ago. While passing through a small town in Maryland I stopped at an outdoor yard sale, and there it was just waiting for me. The best part was the price—\$15. You couldn't do that today!

An interesting countertop demonstration piece I have is for Indian Shock Absorbers. Yes, it's made by Indian, the same company that produced the motorcycle. As sales struggled in the late 1920s and early 1930s, Indian ventured into other products, even building a few cars of the same name. This countertop shock absorber display is configured so you can "test" to feel the difference with or without attaching their spring stiffener.



Another of my favorites is a Klaxon horn display. operates with six-volt dry-cell batteries. Pressing the buttons demonstrates the sound of the different horns. The lithographed scene of early cars on a country road is great. This is a difficult to find piece that I purchased many years ago at the Carlisle swap meet. It was another "paid too much, but I've got it" acquisition. Of course, the "paid too much" price then is a fraction of its value today. Such items have crossover interest for not only automobilia collectors, but advertising collectors as well.



My great National Mazda Automobile Lamp cabinet held all kinds of light bulbs for early cars and dates to the era shortly after electric lighting was introduced. It was found at a Maryland flea market many years ago. I actually sold it at the Carlisle swap meet, and, regretting my decision, I bought it back again a week later at Hershey. I won't make that mistake again.

Another great cabinet I have is one for NEVA-LOST gas tank caps. I don't know how well they worked, but I've been able to find a few NOS caps to go with the display.

Collecting different tire stands has become popular. They





are branded with not only tire names, but oil and gasoline company names. I have one that advertises an off-brand of early clincher type tires—Braender Tires—from the Model T era. If you did not know, the term for "Hill" in the United Kingdom is "Brae" so this tire is intended to put an end to the hills

Tire displays can be interesting, but those that show early tires cut away are very rare. My 1910 era Pennsylvania Vacuum Cup Tire display shows how the tire is mounted to the rim. Even the special glass stand is embossed with advertising. The "cup-like" tread pattern was supposed to provide suction-cup like grip on the road. I wonder how it worked on muddy dirt roads?

Another of my favorite display items is a giant Schrader Tire Gauge cabinet. The rear door opens to reveal a stock of Schrader tire valve components for sale. These are not rare, but in good condition will command several hundred dollars. There is a more difficult to find green version in a larger size. I purchased mine in a Pennsylvania antique mall years ago. It had been purchased by an individual in that same mall a few minutes before. I spotted it as we passed in the aisle





while he was carrying it back to his car. He had planned to take it on to Hershey to resell. I saved him the trouble of hauling it around and willingly paid his price on the spot.

Product displays like these were very inexpensive at one time, but now they appeal to not only collectors of automobilia but also of advertising material. Anyone assembling things for their "man cave" or the recreated filling station in the backyard is after these types of displays. Countless varieties exist, and I have quite an assortment including cut-away salesman's sample spark plugs, carburetors, more spark plug testers and display cabinets, and smaller sample pieces like bumpers and headlamps. In fact, it just occurred to me that another article springs from this—I'm going to add "Salesman's Samples" to the list of future stories for *The Mudflap*.

In the meantime, enjoy the photographs, and happy collecting!

The Old Dominion Meet Association (ODMA) is one of the few non-geographical associations of its kind in the AACA. 15 out of 17 AACA regions in Virginia are members of the ODMA. The ODMA hosts a statewide meet each year, which rotates among the regions around the commonwealth. The class structure organization, judging criteria, and awards follow those of the AACA with some local exceptions.

Dwight Schaubach's 1937 Cord 812 Supercharged Custom Berline

What a delight it was to visit Dwight Schaubach in his new warehouse in Carrollton, VA. Dwight and Jane have such a great collection of antique vehicles. Most of them have been meticulously restored, and a few are still undergoing restoration. This article features the Schaubachs' 1937 Cord 812 Supercharged (S/C) Custom Berline. This 1937 Cord 812 is a rare automobile with an interesting history.

The Schaubachs purchased their 1937 Cord 812 S/C Custom Berline from an auction in August 2018 in Pebble Beach, CA. According to the auction house website and an article on this 1937 Cord in *Classic Driver* magazine in 2019, the Custom Berline is the rarest of the Cord 810/812 body styles. There were only 48 Cord 810/812 Custom Berlines produced and just 21 of these were supercharged cars, which produced a 50-hp increase in power. The Custom series in 1937 was designed to fill requests for a more formal vehicle, by adding a 7-inch increase in the wheelbase. The Custom Berlines of 1937 were also slightly taller than other Cord 810/812 models, recognizable by the addition of an eighth louver in the grille.

The Schaubachs' 1937 Cord 812 is even more rare, as it is one of a limited number of Berlines that came with a deluxe rear vanity, which included dual glove boxes, lighters and ashtrays, rear radio controls, and a windup glass divider

window (separating the driver from the passengers).

The 1937 Cord 812 contains a 289 CID Lycoming L-Head V-8 engine, a Stromberg downdraft carburetor, a Schwitzer-Cummins Centrifugal Supercharger, and a 4-speed pre-select manual gearbox (located on an extension off the steering column to the right of the steering wheel). The Cord 812 also has 4-wheel hydraulic drum brakes, front independent suspension, front-wheel drive, and hidden headlights.

The Schaubachs' 1937 Cord 812 S/C Custom Berline has also lived an interesting life, said to be originally owned by Lucious "Lou" Bass Manning, E.L. Cord's righthand man and the Senior Vice President of the Cord Corporation. Unique to this car, Mr. Manning had a custom radio installed in the rear compartment (remember a limited number of Berlines came with rear radio controls), allowing him to listen to music and his driver could listen to a different radio station if he preferred. In the late 1980s this 1937 Cord spent some time in the Imperial Palace Collection in Las Vegas, NV. The car won First Place at the 2017 Classic Car Club of America (CCCA) Event, has been shown at the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, and was driven in the 1,600-mile Pebble Beach Motoring Classic.

This 1937 Cord 812 S/C Custom Berline is a beautiful addition to Dwight and Jane's collection of classic vehicles. It's a stunning car that anyone would be proud to own.



They're Only Original Once—Part 4

This is the 4th in a series of articles about original vehicles—Historical Preservation of Original Features (HPOF) class. The first article was an overview of the HPOF class, the second opened the doors and looked inside, and the third started the exterior series with paint. This time we'll look at tops, trim, glass, wheels, and tires.

Convertible tops are another item that if not properly cared for can contribute to the deterioration of other areas. A leaky top can cause rust in the fender wells, floor boards, and other areas. The sun can take its toll on fabric so if it's dry rotted it needs to be replaced. If it's done so in a professional manner and with period

correct materials, there should be no deductions.

What about chrome and stainless trim items? If the part serves the purpose for which it was intended, then it's okay to an extent. But, if that chrome bumper has holes rusted through and almost no chrome is left, then it's time for trip to the salvage yard. The same goes for badly damaged trim items.

If the windshield and/or glass is damaged or starting to have that foggy appearance, then it's time to replace it. If possible, use the correct glass for the era of the vehicle. Either way, there should be no deductions because glass is considered a safety issue.

And last but certainly not least is the controversial area of wheels and tires. The vehicle has to have the correct wheels and covers. Even though those nice Cragar mags on your '69 Chevelle SS are period correct, they aren't what the factory installed so there would be a deduction. And then there is the area of tires. If radial tires weren't available for the year of the vehicle, then that would also be a deduction. One sometimes confusing area is the 1972 to 1978 alpha numeric radials on American cars and light trucks. Most of these size tires are not available and using a bias ply tire would definitely be incorrect so a P-metric radial can be substituted in most cases by making a written request for exemption to the VP of Class Judging. Please keep in mind that proof of authenticity is the responsibility of the vehicle owner. When in doubt, remember these three things: documentation, documentation, documentation.

Remember, they're only original once.

We will have a small sign in front of each vehicle with information about the vehicle and some historic information from the time the car was

produced. We even plan to have a 2020 Tesla. Mark Evans (757 Auto Events) and John Herbert (Clear Shine) will again be helping with the Mods & Rods judging, and their companies will be sponsoring several of the Mods & Rods trophies that will be awarded.

There will be things for the youth at the show as well. We will have ~ 30 young "judges" on the two show fields, with hats, lanyards, t-shirts, and judging sheets supplied by the Hagerty Insurance Youth Judging Program, learning how to become car show judges and presenting their own special First, Second, and Third Place ribbons on each show field.

We'd like to continue the recent tradition of giving a free Hot Wheels toy car to every child that attends the show. Please bring new Hot Wheels toy cars to the next TRAACA event and give them to Ellen Adams or myself to give to young attendees of the show.

The Boy Scouts will be out in force selling popcorn and demonstrating their Pinewood Derby cars. There also will be a Valve Cover Racetrack set up, using simple race cars made from valve covers and rollerblade wheels. (People enjoy trying to pick the winners.) There also will be flying demonstrations by vintage WWI and WWII aircraft.

A great deal of work has been going on behind the scenes for the upcoming TRAACA car show. If you have not yet done so, please sign up to volunteer for the show and register to bring your vehicle/vehicles. You have heard it several times, but we can't have a car show without vehicles or people to help run it. Please come out and help make the TRAACA's 46th Annual Meet a great success!

3rd Annual ODMA Fall Tour Friday-Saturday, November 1-2, 2019

The Tour is being hosted by the Crater Region on Friday-Saturday, November 1-2, 2019, and we'll be touring the beautiful Petersburg, VA, area. This will be a slow-paced driving tour suitable for most Pre-WWII cars. Newer antique vehicles will be able to easily keep up.

Check-in for the tour will be at the Keystone Truck & Tractor Museum (880 W Roslyn Rd, Colonial Heights, VA 23834) in Colonial Heights, VA, on Friday afternoon November 1st and Saturday morning November 2nd. Free trailer parking is available on the museum's grounds, courtesy of the museum. The driving tour begins on Saturday morning with our group departing the Keystone Museum for a drive through the old town Petersburg and Petersburg National Battlefield Park. Our first stop will be at historic Blandford Cemetery, whose oldest marked grave dates to 1702.

No host hotel has been identified yet, but there are four reasonably priced hotels in the Southpark Mall area within a mile of the museum. 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
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
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
