TRAACA 42nd Annual Meet

It was that time again—something every TRAACA member looks forward to each fall—time for our annual meet—our annual "Wings & Wheels" Show at the Military Aviation Museum in Virginia Beach. After months of planning, coordination, and preparation, months of securing sponsors and handing out flyers for the show, after club members, museum staff and volunteers laid out the show field and set up the facility, the day—Saturday, 26 September—was finally here. And then it rained.

As many cars shows and other events around the area were cancelled due to the rain, following AACA tradition our "Wings & Wheels" Show went on as scheduled. Unfortunately, the inclement weather took its toll: of 139 vehicles preregistered for AACA judging and 16 for "Rods & Mods," only 44 vehicles came to the show (35 on the AACA show field, 5 "Rods & Mods" including one day of show registrant, and 4 "Best of the Rest" day of show AACA eligible vehicles), well under the 275 vehicles at last year's meet. However, the rain did not dampen our spirits. During lulls in the rain participants & spectators walked the show field to view the show vehicles. During the periods of heavy rainfall, people explored the Military Aviation Museum and appreciate the largest collection in the world of flyable World War I & II military aircraft.

Because of the reduced number of vehicles entered on the show field, judging went quickly and the awards ceremony was moved up two hours to 1:00 PM. (It's definitely challenging to try to record judging scores while the judging sheet is disintegrating in the rain as you try to write on it.) While the judging scores were tallied and awards determined, the Boy Scouts served 40 pizzas the club purchased from Pungo Pizza to feed the crowd after our food vendors cancelled because of the rain.

Shortly after 1:00 PM the owners who braved the rain and brought their vehicles to the show found their efforts rewarded. Meet Chairman Tony Scarpelli thanked the participants for ignoring the weather & bringing their vehicles. He also thanked the TRAACA members and museum staff & volunteers for their efforts, enthusiasm, and adaptability. Jim Elliott, Chief Judge for the meet, presented the AACA judging awards and Mickey McChesney handed out the "Rods & Mods" awards. TRAACA member Larry Wickham's 1935 Ford truck was recognized as



AACA Western Division Fall Tour

Santa Rosa, CA







Dot and I had the opportunity to tour with the AACA Redwood Empire Region in Santa Rosa, California, when they organized and hosted the AACA Western Divisional Tour this past August, and we had a good time. Obviously, because we did not take a tour car that distance, we were offered rides in various members' cars during the week: an award-winning 1939 Studebaker one day, a beautiful 1955 Lincoln Capri and a 1955 Cadillac Coupe de Ville another day. The Redwood Empire Region members were some of the nicest people in the hobby.

During the tour we visited the rugged Pacific Ocean coastline for a clam chowder break rather than the traditional coffee stop. We saw giant redwood trees, California's Old Faithful geyser, several vineyards with complimentary wine tastings, a petrified forest, and many other attractions.

After the tour Dot and I traveled to Reno, NV, to meet with the National Automobile Museum's Public Relations Manager, and we spent several hours on Saturday, August 29th, visiting the museum. This museum is also known as the former Harrah's Automobile Collection, where there are over 200 great cars on display in four main galleries.

The first gallery has cars from the 1890s—1910s, including an 1892 Panhard & Levassor Voiturette, a 1900 Packard B Runabout, and a 1903 Franklin Light Roadster. The second gallery has vehicles from the teens to early 1930s. Brass era and very early cars are neatly segregated. Also in the room are two very rare Chevrolets: a 1917 "D-5" V-8 Touring Car and a 1923 copper-cooled "M" Utility Coupe, the only year for an air-cooled Chevrolet car and this car is one of only two known to still exist—all 729 manufactured were recalled. Somehow this one got away, and aren't we glad it did?

The third gallery contains cars from the 1930s-1940s, including several Duesenbergs, Cords, Wills St. Claires, Chrysler Air Flows, and a 1948 Tucker (#32 of the 51 produced). The fourth gallery contains 1950s-1960s cars, including John Wayne's 1953 Corvette and many other rare and unusual examples. The final room has famous race cars, including the 1907 Thomas Flyer 35 New York to Paris racer, Don "Big Daddy" Garlits' 1974 AHRA & NHRA champion rear-engine dragster, a 1972 McLaren Can-Am race car, and a 1975 McLaren Indianapolis racer.

The National Automobile Museum is ranked in the top five automotive museums in the country by Autoweek magazine. If you are ever in the Reno area, I would say a visit to this museum would be well worth your time. 

Corvette Assembly Plant and National Corvette Museum Bowling Green, KY

While in Louisville, KY, for the AACA Southeastern Fall Meet (July 15-18, 2015), we traveled to Bowling Green, KY (about a 1½-hour drive south of Louisville), to visit the Corvette Assembly Plant and National Corvette Museum. The guided, 1-mile walking tour of the plant lasts an hour and is reasonably priced (\$7.00/person, with special deals for active duty military, seniors, etc.).

Every Corvette produced since 1981 has been made at the Bowling Green Plant. The plant employees about 400 production workers and runs a daily 8- or 10-hour shift Monday-Friday. The day we visited (Thursday, 16 July) the production goal for the day was 170 vehicles.

In 2013 the plant underwent a \$131 million renovation to accommodate the changes in the newest generation Corvette—the C7 Stingray. During the plant tour you will see robotic parts carts following a painted line on the floor. If something or someone is in the robot's path, it will stop until the passage is clear. We were impressed when we witnessed a technician spot a boy in our tour group, stop what he was doing, grab a Corvette *Hot Wheels* toy car out of a large box, walk over to the young man and give him the toy car. The worker then returned to his workstation and resumed his job.

One of the tour highlights is seeing the car body and chassis "come together in marriage." An even better highlight (at least in my opinion) is the "drive off" at the end of the assembly line: the vehicle is driven quickly over several raised metal strips and into a bay to have its instruments checked by a computer calibrated against the "golden" Corvette, which sits on the plant floor. (This car was 100 percent perfect when produced and is used as the benchmark for all other Corvettes produced.) Every Corvette produced goes through these quality checks before it is released to the purchaser, not just one of every several hundred vehicles like at most auto factories.

If you order a new Corvette, for an additional fee you can opt to watch the vehicle's production, help build its engine (if ordering the Z06 model with the LT4 650-hp engine), and/or take delivery of it at the "Nursery" located in the National Corvette Museum.

The National Corvette Museum opened in 1994 and is located across the street from the Corvette Assembly Plant. The museum has a great collection of vehicles, including special ones such as the one millionth Corvette and one of each Indianapolis 500 Pace Car Corvette. The museum offers VIP tours, which include the museum and assembly plant. It also houses the Corvette Café, which looks like an old diner and serves pretty good burgers.

The museum has five of the Corvettes on display that were damaged when a sinkhole swallowed eight of the historic vehicles on February 12, 2014. Chevrolet and the museum originally planned on restoring all eight, but some were too far gone to be salvaged, so only three are being restored. The sinkhole was repaired and is outlined with a painted line (resembling a police body outline).

If you have not taken a tour of the Corvette Assembly Plant and/or visited the National Corvette Museum, add them to your bucket list. They are fantastic places to visit.

Still Collecting Stuff —

Photographs — A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words By Terry Bond

Throughout my collections of collections, a common thread is the automotive image. The photograph itself is the most exciting of all automotive images. They represent slices of time that stand still. History recorded for the eye!



I'm not technically astute in the art of photography itself, and couldn't remember an F-Stop from a U-turn, but I know a great photo when I see one. The advent of the automobile and developments in photography overlap. There were no clear-cut end dates for certain types of photography, so you will find automotive images in a variety of differing formats. The old tintypes, glass plate images, or even albumen silver nitrate prints can all be found with early automotive scenes on them. Remember, photography itself predates the Civil War!

I guess I could try and categorize them and logically they fall into three basic groups: cars, motoring scenes, and garage scenes. For me, the earlier the image, the more interesting it is.

There are some great websites that are there for your enjoyment if you like stepping back in time and looking at early cars in their natural habitat, early gas stations or garages, or even old junkyards filled with ancient car hulks. www.shorpy.com is a wonderful archive of early photos that includes a great transportation-related section. Of course www.oldmotor.com is another resource dedicated strictly to early motoring.

I find early photos everywhere—garage sales, antique shops, flea markets, on the Internet, and especially at the book, paper and ephemera shows I mentioned in last month's article.

Large-size, card-mounted photos can command the highest prices. Clear images with great detail and specifically identifiable cars can command prices in the hundred dollar range. Wonderful automobile scenes are equally as valuable as long as the car is the primary subject in the picture. Equally as pricey can be early garages and service stations with brand named gas pumps. Collectors of petromobilia will pay a lot for nice ones regardless of the car, so there is plenty of competition for that crossover type of collectible.

Smaller format photographs are going to be much less expensive, down to a few dollars for simple snapshots.


A great interior view of an early auto parts store. These kinds of photographs are an inspiration for my own recreation of just such a place in my own garage.

Quite surprisingly those early tintypes are not that expensive. Most that I've seen are staged photos of families posed in mock-up studio cars. It was popular to see such photos done in resort areas where an early car would be set up on a beach somewhere, or in a studio, providing the perfect setting for a vacationing family and their souvenir photo together.

Pictures of early races or race cars command a premium, especially those from known events with recognizable drivers. I'm proud to own an original photo of "Old Number 16" actually being raced in the 1908 Vanderbilt Cup Race. The car still exists today.

Among my favorites are motoring scenes, images taken of people with their cars, pretty ladies driving, proud chauffeurs,

cars in action or scenes of cars actually being driven. Since I love Model T Fords, I've accumulated a number of great images of Model Ts with their proud new owners.

There are bargains out there, but it takes a lot of looking. Beware of reproductions. They are easy to detect as the photo paper they are printed on will be clean and new looking on the back. Flaws in the original photo or negative will be reprinted in them, so study them carefully. Beware of those commonly found sepia-toned, mass-produced poster-type photos. A quiet evening browsing the Internet, ebay in particular, will provide a good foundation of knowledge for you on what is commonly found and currently being reproduced.

As you read this, I probably will have managed to find a few more treasures up in Pennsylvania to add to my photograph collection, so watch for my annual "Hershey Discoveries" column to see what I've found. Until then, enjoy collecting, and enjoy the pictures!



It is important that each AACA vehicle owner must do their level best to get their vehicle ready for an AACA meet. Owners take this task very seriously. In AACA, it is the owner's responsibility to restore the vehicle correctly. This is done by using factory documentation, owner's manuals and AACA's judging standards. AACA's

statement is that we, as judges, are looking for a vehicle as it was delivered from the factory to the dealer.

The above is fairly simple, but where some of us are falling short is the issue of tires. I have asked our Tire Consultant, who also serves as a CJE Instructor on tires, to draft an article for the next issue of *Antique Automobile* that will give valuable information to our members who

do not understand the basic tire situation. Many of them have been led astray and have purchased the wrong tires because they have been told that these are the replacement tires for their vehicle. With the publishing of this article we can do justice to our members in preparing their vehicle to be judged at a National Meet.

Each of you please read and pay attention to the upcoming article in *Antique Automobile* magazine. The right tires are available for your vehicle. I am asking each editor to publish this article in their region or chapter newsletter, suggesting that every member read this tire article. Once this article is published, the plan is to reprint it in the Rummage Box so that it can be used in Regions' and Chapters' Newsletters. We've got to get the right message out!

Rockefeller, Jr., and his wife Abby Aldrich Rockefeller during the 1930s & 1940s when they financed the restoration of Colonial Williamsburg.

Those who wish to go to dinner as a group on Saturday will meet at 4:45 PM across the street from the museum and walk to the nearby Seasons Restaurant and Bar (which is located at 110 South Henry Street) to enjoy dinner together in its private meeting room. Reservations are required, so please tell us if you intend to join the group for dinner. (Dinner is pay for your own.) Please only sign up for dinner if you intend to go.

After dinner we will go to either the Kimball Theatre (428 West Duke of Gloucester) or the Williamsburg Players community theater (200 Hubbard Lane) to enjoy a performance. 



Happy 60th Anniversary TRAACA!

Since then, the club has grown from 10 members to over 170 families & the AACA has grown to 366 regions. Each issue of *The Mudflap* this year will highlight some of our history.





This is the program for the first AACA national meet ever hosted by the TRAACA. It was held on June 11-13, 1976, at the Barry-Robinson School in Norfolk. The TRAACA President at the time was Kurt Schleicher. The Meet Chairman was Robert Vann; the Chief Marshall was Al Mercer; the Chief Judge was L.M. "Winks" von Schilling.

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
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
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
