Membership:

• As of August 25, 2019: 194 memberships / 340 members.

Unfinished Business:

- Club Bylaws remain at the membership level for review and concurrence. Waiting on a 20% membership participation rate at the next Dinner Meeting in order to cast a formal vote.
- Annual Meet Status: Currently have 77 AACA vehicles pre-registered, 11 Mods & Rods preregistered, and newer Special Display vehicles, for a total of 91. This is

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disappointing based on how many members are in the region. Per Jerry Adams, there are 599 vehicles registered through AACA that belong to our members and, based on this, we should have more members participating not only with their vehicles but volunteering in other areas as well. Judges are needed. For comparison, we have 113 preregistered AACA vehicles in 2017 and 89 in 2018. Java Surf will be onsite providing breakfast and lunch. A P-39 aircraft will be the photo backdrop when attendees get their photo taken. Vintage aircraft will be in the air flying. This year's AACA Zenith Award winner will be in attendance, as well as the Bookmobile from the AACA Library.

New Business:

- 2020 Board of Directors slate of nominees: The slate of nominees for next year are Wayne Milligan (President), Tim Hund (Vice President), Bill Treadwell (Treasurer), Ellen Adams (Secretary), Fred Cole, Charlie Dawson, Doug Grosz, and Dot Parrish (Board Members).
- Club Trailer: For informational purposes, Charlie Dawson has volunteered to be the next custodian of our club trailer.
- AACA Regional Directors and Officers Liability Insurance: This bill came in the mail this week and is for coverage from October 9, 2019, to October 8, 2020. Total due is \$110. Due date October 15, 2019. President Matt asked if we were all in agreement to pay this for the upcoming year. The Board all agreed, and the invoice was given to Bill for payment.

Other Business:

- VPCCC Monthly Meeting Report: Preparations continue for the Virginia Fall Classic. Trying to get more regional car clubs involved with and participating in VPCCC.
- CCCHR Monthly Meeting Report: Report provided to President Matt via e-mail from Skip Patnode. Biggest takeaway was the Coastal Virginia Car Show planned for Saturday and Sunday, November 16 & 17 at the Virginia Beach Convention Center. Looking for 20-25 AACA vehicles in the AACA display area. This was advertised in this month's TRAACA newsletter.

The TRAACA 46th Annual Meet, aka the *Wings & Wheels Car Show*, was held on Saturday, September 28th, at the Military Aviation Museum (MAM) in Virginia Beach, VA. The weather was in the upper-80s and rather humid, especially for being late September, but thankfully it did not rain. Participation was good with 154 vehicles registered on the AACA show field and 62 on the Mods & Rods show field. (We hope to do even better next year.)

Barry Basnight and I were the Co-Chairs for the show again this year, and we could not be prouder of how successful the show was because of our great planning team and volunteers. Our planning team consisted of Ellen & Jerry Adams, Terry Bond, Mark McAlpine, Barry, and myself. The awesome Chairs guiding the various teams of volunteers allowed participants to have a smooth ride (no pun intended) throughout the show. Jim Wood—Vice Mayor of Virginia Beach—and his wife Rebecca visited the show, and Mr. Wood chose the Mayor's Choice Award and presented it to Kit Lawrence at the AACA Awards Ceremony for his 1937 Dodge station wagon.

There were several highlights at the show this year. There was a special display, "Cars by the Decades,"

We had everything from a 1909 Rambler Model 44 to a 2019 Tesla Model 3. The AACA Library & Research Center (L&RC) Bookmobile (a 1955 Chevrolet 3600 truck) from Hershey, PA, was displayed in front of the special display. 

Franklin 66th Annual Franklin Trek Report Franklin July 27—August 3, 2019

After 600 miles of towing for three days, we parked the car trailer in the upper lot of Cazenovia College and drove our 1930 Frankin Victoria Brougham onto the college quad. The Victoria came to about ten Treks from 1972 to 1985, returning in 2018 and 2019. Our 1932 Olympic convertible came to Caz from 1990 to 2017. Franklins are driven and trailered from many directions and distances including one all the way from Washington State.

This year we celebrated the 66th Franklin Trek and our 50th at Cazenovia College. The attendance was up to 279 (from over 15 states and Canada) and the number of Franklins that made it onto the quad was 71. There were 33 "red taggers" (new "Trekkers") including a couple from Sweden, 30 children (under 18 years old), and 175 people at the final banquet on Friday evening. The Franklin Trek is truly a family gathering.

This year's Franklin Trek began on the evening of Saturday, July 27th, with the President's reception on the college green near the cars. Touring in the cars happened often during the week. Tours this year included visits to the Northeast Classic Car Museum in Norwich, transportation portion of the CNY Living History Center in Cortland, NY, and a biplane collection that included an exciting flight demonstration. After the biplane landed, several cars were posed in front of the plane for photographs, especially those with the Spirit of St. Louis hood ornaments that were inspired by Lindberg's flight. There were also tours to the Sylvan Beach Amusement Park where Trekkers young and old rode bumper cars and roller coasters, and participated in a scavenger hunt tour and many twilight tours in the Cazenovia area. Several bus tours in years past have been made to more distant locations. This year three filled buses headed to the fascinating Glenn H. Curtis Museum in

Hammondsport, NY (115 miles away), giving us a chance to chat or possibly snooze on the way back to Caz. Most tours included a group lunch at a different location.

Of course, the cars are the primary interest of the guys and many of the gals. Other than driving the cars, they are compared, tinkered with, worked on, and sometimes sold. Speaking of buying stuff, a "parts department" got many treasures to Franklin owners who needed them, and the Franklin merchandise room was open several times during the week. There also was an auction on Friday afternoon that, as usual, had a few surprises and drew a big crowd.

There are many kids' activities during the week including several chances to swim in Cazenovia Lake or the college pool. We celebrated a first birthday this year. The happy little new Trekker (third generation) made a good start at walking. There were other families with three generations present.

Breakfast and dinner are at the college dining hall. After breakfast, mornings when there was no early tour began with tech sessions and other types of meetings. After a full day, we gathered for a tasty dinner. Hospitality started about 8:00 PM and included a concert on the green, an Arcade Night, Andy Wittenborn's slideshow, Trivia Night, and the Vintage Fashion Parade that was followed by learning vintage dancing this year. The Fashion Parade was supposed to start at 7:30 PM, but was delayed by many late additions with forms to be filled out. This year we had the largest number of models ever—a total of 33 models including 10 guys, one who modeled two costumes. The models included several "red taggers."

Friday, our last full day of Trekking, started off slowly with a tech session, kids' activities, and a road rally. For several years, lunch has been a picnic at Lakeside Park

overlooking Cazenovia Lake. After lunch, the car games the Franklin Olympics—were held, and the winner was announced at the banquet that evening. Back on campus, the Annual Auction was held, then the quad went quiet as everyone prepared for the evening that started with cocktails.

The Friday night banquet brought out a lot of nostalgia knowing that we would soon be parting until next summer. The recognitions given during the banquet were Number of Treks Attended, Longest Distance Driven, Trekkers Choice, and the Junior Trekkers Choice. (The Trekkers Choice and Junior Trekkers Choice turned out to be the same car this year: a 1928 Franklin Series 12A convertible coupe owned by Clint Scott.) The gal who has ordered, stored, and set up the Franklin Merchandise at the Trek for about twenty-five years was presented with the Service Award. The highlight of the banquet was the Boyer Report (initiated many decades ago by Doc Boyer) that recognized each Franklin that came to the Trek beginning with the oldest car, which this year was Bevard Hosticka's 1910 barrel-hooded touring car. There have been several Trekkers who have taken up the gauntlet after Doc Boyer, most recently Bill Woodcock, who is also currently president of the H.H. Franklin Club.

After the formal portion of the banquet was finished, there was an hour or more of talking to many friends and saying goodbye to some who planned to leave before the final breakfast. We also now have a new form of "goodbye" suggested by the 2019 Trek Chairpersons (two families—the Whites and Amons—who did a great job): "DOWN THE ROAD!"

Still Collecting Stuff— Cautiously By Terry Bond



Periodically I like to focus on reproduction items and outright fakes. Sharing this information with you may help prevent a costly mistake. I encounter such items all the time. In many cases, unfortunately, the intent is to deceive. In some cases, an honest mistake is made; however, it's all too common for a dealer to try and pass their error along to others. **Buyer beware!**

Tall tales told—I've heard all kinds of stories. Most commonly, I hear "it came from an old collection." While that may be true, it does nothing to add any concrete evidence that the item is indeed "old." Hey, what's your definition of "old" anyway?

You must realize that any collector will make mistakes. Often a collector will buy a quantity of items, and that might also include a couple of phony pieces. Collectors are often given items by well-intentioned friends. So, when any estate (or old collection) passes along, there is good likelihood that a number of modern, reproduction, or fake items are included. I've got a box of them myself.

So, when did the collector actually stop collecting? I know collectors who continued acquiring items right up until the time of their passing. Again, "old collector," "long-time-collector," "old collection," etc., mean absolutely nothing.

On-line listings are often downright fraudulent. I see many sellers who advertise items as "genuine" or "original" when they are clearly not. One particular dealer of automotive memorabilia sells nothing but "RARE" items. If only he would search other listings to see just how "rare" his items really were!

Each item must be evaluated on its own merits without the complications of prior ownership or stories about where the item came from and under what circumstances. Provenance is important, and items from notable collections can certainly be of enhanced value, but unless you have documentation that validates what the object really is, anything else is just a good story.

Discussed and shown below are a few items that are often seen today:

Watch fobs and advertising pins flood the market. The vast majority of originals were marked on the reverse with the maker's name. There are dozens of manufacturers, some




fairly obscure, but there should be markings on the back of the item of some kind.

Small advertising pins are still being produced today for many brands of antique automobiles.

They are simply souvenir or novelty items, but are often sold as "salesman's lapel pins" or "automobile"

"automobile show giveaways." Such pins have been available for many years. The firm Pulfer and Williams, known for their quality reproduction early radiator emblems, produced them as miniature souvenirs. Indeed, an entire set of all the emblems they

made was available as a framed "collection." These were of excellent quality and today, with 40+ years of age on them, they are often "mistaken" as old originals.

Some makers of the original small pins used only an item number to identify them, and others are not marked at all.

Clues to their authenticity,

however, can be found in the quality of their production. Good definition and clear, high-quality lettering with crisp images will be the hallmark of the real thing. Quality porcelain and not just paint will be evident. Any such items that have a hashmarked back-side are modern reproductions.


Another clue is the method of attaching the pin. If it has a modern round squeezestyle clasp and sharp pointed pegtype mount, it's a

modern pin. I've provided some photographs to illustrate and help you distinguish the differences.

Watch fobs are commonly reproduced. Shown is a genuine Buick advertising watch fob showing the quality of production expected of an original. Also, note the inscription on the reverse showing the maker's name.

A reproduction watch fob widely available as a "fantasy" items is for the Haynes automobile. You find dozens of them available on eBay every day, most advertised as "vintage," "old," "original." They were produced by the Los Angeles Rubber Stamping Company strictly as novelty items. It uses chrome a give-away to its authenticity.

Haynes went bankrupt and ceased produc-

tion in 1925, prior to the use of chrome plating. Note also the back-side.

There is a similar Ford Model T watch fob and also several

others. You should pay no more than a couple of bucks for one if you really need it.

Another souvenir fob that shows up for sale frequently advertised as "rare" is one for Stanley Steam cars. These fobs were originally produced by the late Art Hart, a noted Stanley Steam car enthusiast. The company he started, Vintage Steam Products, still sells Stanley parts and these fobs are available in their catalog for \$20. I have never seen an original.

Another item that has shown up recently on the Internet is advertised as a **small "Ford" paperweight in the form of an anvil**. It is pure "fantasy" and was never originally produced by or for the Ford Motor Company. Beware!

Branded oil bottles are starting to appear in large quantities with logos on them from about every oil company imaginable. The bottle "blanks" seem to have been reproduced from molds made from original old bottles. They will be slightly larger with less well-defined lettering on them than originals. Be very careful of these as they are difficult to detect unless you are familiar with the originals. Many times, they will have metal spouts that have been artificially aged or logos that have been slightly "distressed" to make them appear old.

Pocket watches with automobile logos on them have

started to appear very frequently on the Internet and in flea markets. In some cases, genuine old Elgin pocket watches have had these logos silk-screened onto the faces. True, some watches were made as salesmen's retirement gifts or incentives, and there are some that exist, but they are high quality watches, not the dime-store Elgins you see in today's marketplace. Shown below is a genuine gold gift watch presented to a company executive in the 1920s. It is nicely engraved on the back. The delicate logo is superb.

The silver vesta (matchbox) shown in the photo continues to show up on the Internet. It is patterned after an original.



These are made from cast brass and are nickel- or silver plated. Some are even enameled in colors. They are all made in Asia of heavy cast brass. Their quality is rather poor compared to the finely crafted thin brass, silver-plated originals. Lifting the lid will show the fake in an instant. The inside of the originals was as well made as the outside.

"1907" calendars advertising the J. & M. Haffen Brewing Company continue to show up on the Internet and in antique markets. They are fantasy items never actually produced in 1907, but have been artificially aged to look old. Looking at them carefully you'll see the image was generated by modern techniques—look for small dots evenly spaced that comprise the image.

Sadly, those fake **Ford plant security badges** continue to deceive. They still show up on the Internet, in junk shops and flea markets, and sometimes at auctions. Here are some clues: Ford never produced their logo in a circle. Many of these fake badges are for locations where Ford never actually had a facility. Although cleverly aged to appear old, they are probably among the worst fakes to ever have been offered. Unfortunately, I know of collectors who have paid above \$200 for them.

Lastly, those cast-iron Michelin tire (or tyre) statues continue to deceive. I recently saw one listed in an auction summary report in a well-known professional antiques journal. It sold for \$2,000 at an auction of quality antiques. There were never any original advertising pieces like this made by or for Michelin. They are patterned after an original piece that was made of chalk-ware (plaster) and, because of their delicateness, very few have survived. These recent fakes are artificially aged and you'll see them all over eBay listed from a few hundred dollars to thousands. Auctioneers will seldom speculate on their authenticity in their catalog listings. Internet sellers will state they come from "... an old collection." You'll see them at Hershey, and no doubt there will be some interesting stories to go with them—but don't waste your money unless you want something to decorate your garden or serve as a door stop. No matter what it looks like, it's only \$25 worth of modern cast iron.

If you are looking at something you are not sure of, don't hesitate to contact me for an opinion. Although there is always room to learn more, I'll always be glad to share what I know with you. Nobody likes to get "burned" buying a fake, so hopefully this will give you a little more info to make your collecting more fun. So, enjoy your trip to Hershey this year, and enjoy collecting, but please do so cautiously.

3rd Annual ODMA Fall Tour



Friday-Saturday, November 1-2, 2019

Hosted by the Crater Region AACA

Come join your fellow AACA and ODMA friends on the ODMA's 2019 Fall Tour. The Tour is being hosted by the Crater Region on Friday-Saturday, November 1-2, 2019, and we'll be touring the beautiful Petersburg, VA, area. This will be a slow-paced driving tour suitable for most Pre-WWII cars. Newer antique vehicles will be able to easily keep up.

Check-in for the tour be at the Keystone Truck & Tractor Museum (880 W Roslyn Rd, Colonial Heights, VA 23834) in Colonial Heights, VA, on Friday afternoon November 1st and Saturday morning November 2nd. Free trailer parking is available on the museum's grounds, courtesy of the museum. The driving tour begins on Saturday morning with our group departing the Keystone Museum for a drive through the old town Petersburg and Petersburg National Battlefield Park. Our first stop will be at historic Blandford Cemetery, whose oldest marked grave dates to 1702.

No host hotel has been identified yet, but there are four reasonably priced hotels in the Southpark Mall area within a mile of the museum. 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
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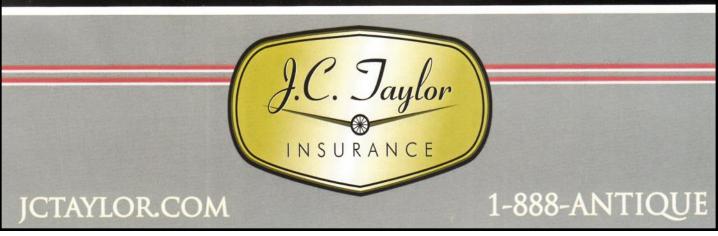
