# Still Collecting Stuff Something New!

I never expected to discover yet another wonderful automotive collectible when I walked into a Pennsylvania rare book, advertising and ephemera show while enroute to the Hershey Fall Meet. But, there it was, just waiting to light my fire!

After stuffing my bag with the usual automotive collectibles (brochures, post cards, small advertising trinkets, etc) I wandered through the market for the second time, concentrating on searching through the less obvious.

I thought I'd start looking through some of the Stamp dealers there to see if any early automotive related poster stamps might be on offer.



There in the booth of a stamp dealer, I noticed binder opened to display selection of small paper match-box covers, some of which had early auto-

mobiles illustrated on them.

These are very early. Do you remember when matches were made of wood and sold in those little wooden boxes? Well, they all had paper labels on them, and who

would have guessed – some of them had an automotive theme.

I'd seen a few of these on the internet and thought they were great, but never saw much variety. But there before me was a really



wonderful selection of them that I'd never seen before. There were large ones, small ones, different colors, different cars, all very early 1900s! Most of them seemed to be from foreign countries. I guess there was a thriving match business at the turn of the century and most were imported!

Who would have imagined these little paper labels would have survived? The match boxes themselves were not carefully handled, and of course once empty of their contents, they usually got tossed directly into the fire, or thrown away. Some child must have developed a fascination with them and started this collection many years ago.

I thumbed through the display and for a small sum, purchased five full pages containing a wonderful variety of them. It was an instant collection. I have



no way of knowing how many are available, or how rare mine are. Much research to be done, but for me, that's part of the fun of collecting.



I think it's great that these are all in such fantastic condition. They were mounded years ago using good old fashioned postage stamp hinges so there is no glue or tape damage to them. I'll remount them onto proper acid-free stamp display pages.

So, the search is now on for more, although if I had to

quit now, I'd say my instant collection was pretty good as it is.

The lesson here is to keep searching, keep an open mind and don't let your preconceived idea of what constitutes an automotive collectible blind you to all the great possibilities out there.




Maybe you'll find something that "strikes" your fancy!

# So What, and Where on Earth, You Might Reasonably Ask, is the Great Basin?

Seeking to answer that essential question, I and my daughter Sheryl recently headed north from Las Vegas, for a "quick" 8-hour drive to Baker, NV. (type "Baker, Nevada" into your GPS). Sheryl suggested this location for your trip because I "was the only person on earth that would be willing to drive all day through nowhere to get to nowhere."



Baker, Nevada is the closest town to Great Basin National Park, one of the newest (1986), smallest, most remote, and least visited of our National Parks, and damn proud of it! This National Park preserves for posterity a small sliver of the Great Basin, the largest and yet least known geographic feature of the United States.

The Great Basin comprises over 184,000 square miles of the most desolate and most picturesque regions of the Western United States. (By comparison, Virginia is only a mere 42,000 square miles).



The Great Basin dates over 500 million years old and is the largest endorheic area in the US (meaning that all the scant rainwater that falls evaporates or collects in a few lakes (such as the Great Salt Lake in Utah and the Salton Sea in California, and does not travel to the Pacific Ocean, contrary to what our sixth grade teachers told us about the Continental Divide).

It includes most of Nevada, and large sections of Oregon, Idaho, California, Utah and a section of northern Mexico. And who knew? It contains the highest and the lowest points in the continental US (Mt Whitney and Death Valley).

It is both fantastically beautiful and stunningly desolate; no cell service, no internet, three restaurants and one motel at the truck stop on Highway 6 & 50 – named "the loneliest road in America" (no kidding – check your GPS).

During our three days there, we encountered at most ten people, most of them the Park Rangers. At the highest elevations within the park are the oldest living things on earth – Bristlecone Pines over 4000 years old, and still "ticking." Book your rooms early at the Border Inn truck stop (775 234-7300), and gas up before you leave.

What, you might reasonably ask, does this have to do with antique cars? Good question. So, feast your eyes on this photo! Sitting out literally in the middle of nowhere, I find the remains of an early twenties Essex sedan, just waiting for restoration.



But it's difficult to seal the deal - the "occupant" turns out to be the skeleton of a horse, complete with skull, legs and hooves, propped up and alert in the driver's seat! I've included a few photos for any member needing a new project. It's located a few miles west of the NV-UT state line on Highway 6 & 50. Can't miss it.

## The Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum

Unless you are from the Detroit area--and maybe not even then--you may not know about the Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum in Ypsilanti, Michigan. If that's the case, you've missed something special. Although the museum is small, it houses a collection of classic automobiles, advertising and promotional material, and exhibits on the history of automotive manufacturing in the Ypsilanti area



The museum is housed in a former Hudson Motor Car Company dealership--Miller Motors. Carl Miller opened his Hudson franchise in 1927 and operated the dealership continuously through the demise of Hudson in 1958. (According to the museum's website, Hudson merged into American Motors in 1955, the last Hudson vehicle was produced in 1957, and the Hudson line was discontinued in 1958.) Miller Motors billed itself as "the last operating Hudson dealer," providing service and parts for Hudson cars until Carl Miller's son Jack collaborated with Paul "Skip" Ungrodt, Jr., and Peter Fletcher to convert the dealership into the Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum (YAHM) in 1995.



If you visit the museum, you'll see that it still has a fully stocked Hudson parts department and retains all the dealership's original records going back to 1927 (archived for historical research). Mr. Miller was at the dealership and museum every day, sitting in the manager's chair overseeing everything and greeting visitors, until becoming ill earlier this year.

The YAHM has 30 cars on display, most of them Hudsons, but not all--the other vehicles represent those manufactured in the Ypsilanti area over the years. The "crown jewel" of the museum's collection is the fully restored #92 1952 "Fabulous Hudson Hornet" driven by Herb Thomas when he won his second NASCAR championship in 1953. (The car was immortalized as "Doc Hudson", Paul Newman's character, in the 2006 Pixar Animation Studies movie Cars.)

Other vehicles on display include a 1933 Terraplane "K"-series coach, a 1937 Terraplane Model 71, a 1946 Hudson Commodore convertible, a 1953 Lincoln Capri (built with a General Motors Hydra-Matic automatic transmission manufactured in Ypsilanti and originally sold by Sesi Lincoln-Mercury in Ypsilanti), a 1951 Kaiser Traveler (built at the Willow Run Plant in Ypsilanti), a 1951 Kaiser-Frazer Henry J, a 1953 Kaiser Dragon, 1957 Hudson Hornet Hollywood Custom (the last year it was built), and five Chevrolet Corvairs between 1960-1996 (all Corvairs were built at the Chevrolet Willow Run Plant in Ypsilanti).

The YAHM also features an exhibiting honoring Michi-



gan's native son, Preston Tucker. The display includes Tucker Corporation promotional material and memorabilia. There is also a fiberglass movie prop of a Tucker 48 on display, one of three built for the 1988 movie Tucker: A Man and His Dreams. (The prop car looks great from 20 feet, but as you approach you can tell even the bumpers are made from fiberglass and notice that it's only a rolling shell with no interior.)

One of the highlights of the museum is its display of GM Hydra-Matic automatic transmissions built at the Willow Run Plant in Ypsilanti between 1953-2010. The

plant first opened in 1941 as Ford's Willow Run plant and built B-24 Liberator bombers during World War II. After the war, Kaiser-Frazer purchased the plant, building Kaiser and Frazer cars at the plant and, during the Korean War, cargo aircraft including the C-119 Flying Boxcar. GM bought the plant in 1953. (According to Wikipedia, GM bought the plant after its Detroit Transmission plant in Livonia burnt down in August 1953, and had the production line at Willow Run running nine weeks later.)

During its 57 years of operations, the plant built over 82 million transmissions for GM and 11 other manufacturers including Rolls-Royce for over forty years. The display includes cutaway models of every major model of transmission built at the plant, including the last Hydra-Matic





4L80 transmission assembled at the plant on 15 December 2010.

A trip to Ypsilanti wouldn't be complete without driving by Preston Tucker's home on nearby Park Street, four blocks from the YAHM. The house is undergoing renovation, but it's still interesting to see where Preston Tucker did most of the design and early prototype work for his famous car.

If you are ever near southeast Michigan, make the time to visit the Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum. It's open seven days a week, and is a snapshot of classic American automotive manufacturing frozen in time. (Go to the museum's website for more info: http://ypsiautoheritage.org.)






