

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My Alfa Romeo Saga

By Skip Patnode have been associated with Alfa Romeos for about 35 years now. It all started when a friend bought a 1957 Guilietta Spider, started to restore it and got orders to California and couldn't take it with him. So I gave him a hundred bucks for it, dragged it home and put it in my back yard. Then came the fun part. Front brakes with 3 shoes each and no parts available, a convertible top in shreds, one tire with removable treads, etc. I planned on fixing it up and selling it but my wife said, "You keep that car, it's cute and we need two cars!" By that time I had become enamored with the mechanical genius that went into building this car (Chain drive dual overhead cams, hemi head combustion chambers, dual Weber carbs and factory headers), so it didn't take much persuading to convince me to keep it. It became my daily driver and I put a trailer hitch on it and used it to tow my jon boat to Back Bay for many years until it became so rusty it was un-

Then came the box. A 1967 Guilia TI sedan that looks like a Renault. Same fine technology but with a bigger engine, four doors and a roof. I also drove that for many years until a drunk ran a red light and tried to kill my daughter. The little car crumpled just like it was supposed to and she survived. I bought it back from the insurance company, found a 1965 body with weeds growing up through it, made two into one and had another daily driver for many years. The weed seeds never did stop coming out of the defroster ducts. I still have the engine and running gear in my garage but sold the rolling chassis.

safe to be on the road.

At last, the Duetto, the same type car that Dustin Hoffman drove while chasing Mrs. Robinson's daughter in the movie *The Graduate*. I always loved the styling of the "Round Tail". Alfa only made it for four years and imported it into the U.S. only two of those years. The movie made such a hit at the time that a few years later Alfa named one model the Graduate. The kids were now grown and had moved on, so nine years ago I got one! I found it at a Race Prep/Alfa Romeo shop in Raleigh, N.C. It was a sad looking critter! The top was tattered, it had a broken front spring, the paint looked like elephant skin, but it ran great and the price was right. The TI had not gone away at this time and since both cars are 105 series, the TI became a donor and the broken springs went away with the rolling chassis.

Along with the car came a mountain of paperwork. Thanks to computers and spread sheets, I was able to organize all this stuff in chronological order. That's when I discovered the engine and running gear had been rebuilt at 100,000 miles and the car only had 114,000 miles on it 14 years later. I basically had a new car with an ugly body!!

When I had the body work and the repaint done, the body shop discovered why the paint was cracking so badly. Someone many years ago had covered the entire body with a skim coat of fiberglass resin which I guess was a good idea at the time but as time passed and the resin cured, it cracked and took the paint

with it. The only cure was to take it down to bare metal and start over

This little car now has 229,000 miles on the clock and is not perfect by a long shot, but it is my daily driver, my parade car and my show car. I bought it to drive and drive it I do. It is the only Alfa I have owned that does not leak or burn oil. It has been to Hilton Head, Florida twice, Detroit, Nashville and New Hampshire to National Alfa Romeo Conventions, Vermont numerous times and is going to the National Convention in D.C. this summer and then on to Vermont to straighten out some of their roads. It isn't fun to blast down the interstate at 70 mph all day long, but it sure is fun to drive sideways on the interstate ramps and the back roads.

Battery with a Brain

By John Blair While I think of myself as a "Geek" and kind of a gadget sort of guy, I guess I'm just not far sighted enough. There are a lot of gadgets that I just can't justify spending the money for, like an Ipod, a big HD LCD TV to replace my 10-15 yr old functional 27" tube type TV, etc. Now an ODB II scanner or code reader is a different story!

The remote control shut off came in and dad and I went out to install it. Installation was very easy and took only minutes after we got down to the battery. We disconnected the positive lead from the battery, and connected the "Battery Brain" to the terminal with the supplied battery clamp. The positive cable was

then connected to the terminal on the "Battery Brain".

Now when we park the car, dad just hits the button on the remote unit on the key chain, and you hear the relay click open and the battery is disconnected. When we need to work on the electrical system, we push the

button on the remote and isolate the battery from the electrical system.

This unit will also automatically disconnect the battery from the electrical system, if it detects that a leak is draw-


ing the battery down to where

the car won't start.



After using this on dad's Packard, I'm going to get one for the Bricklin! It sure makes it easy to isolate the battery when storing the car or working on the electrical system. The best price I've found on the unit is from Bill Hirsch

GETTING READY FOR OUR "SALT WATER TO FIREWATER TOUR"

ess than 3 months till our "Salt Water to Firewater" tour!

The cutoff date is May 31st. Well, if you have checked your brakes out, now is the time to inspect the cooling system. First I would inspect the hoses and clamps. If a hose is extra hard or has a soft spot in it replace it. We will be traveling during the hottest time of year when the greatest demand is placed on the cooling system. Those cars with pressure cap create a pressure on the radiator which increases the boiling point of the coolant. It also puts additional strain on hoses and the water pump seal. Remember, the heater even not in use is a part of the cooling system and can cause problems. The best test on a cooling system is to use a pressure testing pump that will pressurize the cooling system. If you don't have one of these pumps I have one

that I will be glad to let you use for this test, you can also test the radiator cap at the same time.

Anti-freeze is another important part of the cooling system. It not only prevents cooling system from freezing during the winter it enhances heat transfer, increases the boiling point and prevents corrosion and rust. It is a good idea to replace your anti freeze every few years.

Belts are another item that can fail with no warning. Belts are relatively inexpensive and a good item to replace if there is any doubt about their condition. On cars with multiple belts I would suggest replacing all of them at the same time. I have seen cases where one belt breaks and get tangled with the other belts causing additional damage.

Water pumps usually fail with no warning, however one good test is to grasp one of the fan blades and check for fore and aft play which can indicate a marginal bearing.

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
