Please, someone step up to the plate and help out with this critical need. We need to fill this position soon – if it is not filled by the end of this month, I will recommend to the board that we cancel next year's show due to lack of interest on the part of membership.

#### **EDITORIAL**



#### ODMA and the Old Dominion Trophy

G oing to the Old Dominion Meet is a major tradition for Tidewater. It is among the first memories I have of participating with TRAACA. In 1980, we loaded up our kids in our 1930 Franklin Victoria and headed for northern Virginia with the TRAACA caravan. Once there, the starter on our car died. Luckily a Franklin friend lived nearby and came to our rescue.

Since then we have made almost every ODMA meet with the exception of the years our kids graduated from college. When our daughter wanted a May instead of a June wedding in 2001, we asked her not to schedule it for the ODMA meet weekend. We would have been there this year except for a small medical problem. You can bet we'll be working hard to get ourselves in shape to make the 2013 ODMA meet.

The first TRAACA plaque on the trophy is 1971. After that there are sixteen more, 1976, 1980, 1981, 1989, 1990, 1993, 1994, 1998, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008, 2010, and 2012. (Thanks to Bob Stein for the dates of our plaques.)

The Old Dominion Trophy dates to 1953. (Thanks to Richard Hall for the details.) Over the past fifty-nine years, we hosted the meet in 1958 (6<sup>th</sup> Annual), 1966 (13<sup>th</sup>), 1977 (24<sup>th</sup>), 1987 (34<sup>th</sup>), 1995 (42<sup>nd</sup>), and 2005 (52<sup>nd</sup>) which made us ineligible to win the ODMA trophy in those years.

We were so proud to bring the trophy home again this year. Winning the trophy is based on points given to each region by the following formula: Best in Show - 7 points, 1st Junior or Senior- 6 points, Preservation - 5 points, 2nd Junior - 4 points, 3rd Junior - 3 points, HPOF - 4 points, DPC - 3 points, Pre 1927 - 1 point, Each car (non-winning) - 1 point, Each Judge or Admin (no more than 6 points) - 1 point

The Best in Show Trophy won this year by Ken and BarbTalley for their excellent 1929 Buick. Cars from other states can be shown but are not eligible for the Old Dominion Trophy. It will forever stay in Virginia.

Last year Richard took the trophy to Virginia Arts & Metal to

have it restored and another layer with eighteen more plaques added to take us most of the way through the next two decades.



Hen I was in Junior High and High School, my best friend Robert 'Chief' Deal and I often got rides from his sister Kitty to take us places in 'Becky' - a 1951 Studebaker Commander Land Cruiser that their parent's had bought new, and which had been passed down through the six daughters. In a time of GTOs, Camaros, and Mustangs, Becky was definitely 'uncool.' She was ponderous, had a strange bullet nose with pontoon-like fenders that jutted forward. Her rear package shelf had been removed so that kids could sit in the trunk and stick their head up inside the passenger compartment. Wonder what the safety folks would say about that?

I was fascinated by the car - being pretty 'uncool' myself in those days, and madly in love with anything that had four wheels. I didn't care that it had no headliner, that the seats were coming apart, or that it was at least four different shades of black. However, it was destined to go to Robert, youngest of the Deal brood, when he turned 16. So when Mr. Deal called and asked to talk to my father on my birthday, I didn't think anything of it. Until I was handed the phone back and Mr. Deal said "When are you coming over to get your car?"

It turned out that 'Chief' wanted nothing to do with the car – he'd been riding in her all his life, and was determined to make his first car a new Plymouth Road Runner (Which he did!). With no more kids of their own left, Mr. and Mrs. Deal had decided to pass it on to me. I don't think my feet touched the ground for a week afterwards. Mr. Deal drove the car to our house, where she was immediately ensconced in the back yard. Both the pictures of her were taken by me that very day. Of course, there were a lot of strings attached, all by my parents. Grades couldn't drop, and I had to pay for everything myself - repairs, insurance, etc. I was already working by then and started saving up.

Becky needed some work - a new right rear spring, a tuneup, and various small repairs. It took a year to get her ready for the road, and to set my own insurance policy. Once I got her going, the car proved to be wonderfully reliable for the next two years. Then a mishap with a 1965 Ford tore up her left front fender the summer I went off to college. Unable to keep her at home, I ended up giving her to a Studebaker Club member who

combined her with a totaled 51 Land Cruiser to make one good car. My current 1951 Land Cruiser is a great trip back in time – though it's quite a bit prettier than Becky was.



You can see a picture of the show field in the email sent recently. W-C would like to have us show our cars in a Grass Field behind their Main Buildings off Shore Drive. This will be a fantastic venue as there is a patio area for their 700 residents and a gorgeous view of the Chesapeake Bay. W-C will have refreshments for their residents and TRAACA participants.

Note: this is a upscale retirement facility, and most residents are independent living and will want to walk around the cars and talk to you about your car. There is an assistance living center too, and those residents will be helped to see the cars. The show field and the area designated for the Cars is actually a grassy Fire Lane between the beach/seawall and W-C. As the Fire line is narrow, it was suggested they we line up each car one behind the other car and parade onto the Field, park for the 2 hours and parade off of the field at the end of the show.

This would support about 20 some cars, so I'm optimistic of the Clubs participation. If we get more to participate we will adjust. I suggest that we gather by 12:45 sharp and parade the cars onto the field at 1PM on June 3 with an announcer identifying and describing each car as it comes on the field.

Key Summary initial information:

1) Date: Sunday June 3, 2012 Rain Date: June 17th 1-3

- 2) Time: Tentative 1-3 PM. Note this could move a ½ hour to 1:30-3-30 if we need more time to stage and parade the cars onto the field.
- 3) Location: Westminster-Canterbury (W-C), 3100 Shore Drive, Va. Beach, Va 23451Enter off Shore Drive to Ocean Shore Ave. as if you were going to Lynnhaven Fish House. We can stage the cars on the service side of W-C. There is room for a small amount of Trailers and on Sunday there should not be contractors in the W-C Service Area.
- 4) Fire Lane requirements. All cars must remain on the Fire Lane. All drivers must remain near their vehicles in case there is a need to move the vehicle from the Fire Lane. The avoid ruts in the grass, W-C has requested a broad/plywood square under each car wheel.
- 5) Please have a small info sheet of your car for the announcer to highlight your vehicle to the crowd.
- 6) The Entrance to the Field is from a staging or service area/ parking lot to the east of the W-C facility. There is no curb at the entrance to the field, but the exit has a curb that can be supported with boards for easier exiting of lower cars.


