Still Collecting Stuff BRASS!

Last month we took a fast trip through the history of early automobile lamps. There isn't anything as pretty as a nicely polished brass auto lamp. But, if you want to collect, there are some things to be cautious of.

When these lamps were manufactured, parts were formed by spinning flat brass sheets into round shapes on a lathe and wooden form. "Forcing" brass into odd shapes introduces high stress in the metal. This is lessened during manufacture by annealing. Heating and cooling helps return the brass to a workable softer metal. As it is worked it needs to be continually re-annealed or it becomes quite brittle.

One of the biggest problems with items made in such a manner is they often begin showing age related stress cracking on tightly curved surfaces. Heat and vibration from use and careless handling over the years also helps cracks to form.

Unfortunately for brass lamp collectors, nothing can be done about the cracking problem. Restoring them involves actually remaking some of the damaged parts, which can be a very difficult and expensive task. Some minor cracks can be silver-soldered and buffed so it's hardly noticeable, but they will continue to crack over time.

Another problem with brass is corrosion. Brass is a composition of zinc and copper. Cheaper lamps had variations in the quality of the raw materials used. When stored in damp conditions over the years, or subjected to close association with caustic atmosphere, brass corrodes. Sometimes, the zinc corrodes leaving splotchy copper

spotting. Buffing can sometimes reduce the visibility of these "age spots" but they will always be there and will continue to reappear after a short time.

So, the message here is to collect quality. If contemplating a purchase, inspect it carefully to ensure there are no age cracks and that any apparent corrosion is minimal. It's difficult to fabricate missing pieces, and hoping to find a "donor" lamp at Hershey might be frustrating. Over the years I've learned there are no catalogs listing "repair parts" for brass lamps. As they were generally hand made individually, there will be minor differences between them. Even among the same brand and type of lamp, it's not uncommon to find parts of different size that cannot interchange.

In terms of availability and quality, Dietz was a prolific producer of lamps, but they were almost always of lesser quality and were cheaper. A comparable brand of lamp is Corcoran.

Moving up the scale, lamps made by E&J (Edmonds and Jones) were of better quality and were used on a lot of larger higher priced cars. Atwood Castle, Solar, Gray & Davis, Rushmore, C.M. Hall and Neverout were of much better quality and would command a higher price.

Square side lamps are easiest to acquire. Watch for chipped or cracked beveled glass lens. The only repair is to remove the glass from the framework and have another piece custom cut. Reassembly can be a challenge.

Bail handled lamps are more difficult to find. Often, the curved or beveled front lens can be a problem if missing or cracked.

lamps especially are difficult to find. Remember, there was only one of them on a car. That means half the chance to survive that a pair of side lamps had.

Headlamps are more difficult to find, especially in high quality brands like Rushmore and Solar. Self-Generating lamps of any kind are at the top of the heap when it comes to collecting. By far the best lamps were the Solar Eclipse which featured a movable reflector in them.

Price depends on condition, rarity, quality, and often the potential use. Some lamps were made especially for certain vehicles and had the vehicle "script" or logo on them. Packard, Cadillac,

Maxwell, Pierce, Locomobile, and of course Ford were examples of some script lamps.

Enjoy a few more pictures and enjoy collecting. Maybe you'll find a nice item at our swap meet? How about next time we take a quick look at brass horns-no, they were not all made in Taiwan!

AACA Museum Unveils New Tucker Exhibit Design

The Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) Museum announced its approved design for the new permanent Tucker collection on November 25, 2013. Well known as the world's largest collection of Tucker automobiles and related items, the AACA Museum relocated to Hershey the well-known grouping from the estate of Museum supporter David Cammack after his passing in April 2013.

"Losing our dear friend David Cammack earlier this year was a very sad occasion," noted Mark Lizewskie, Executive Director of the AACA Museum, " but we are honored to be able properly display his passion for the Tucker automobiles in this very compelling exhibit."

The Cammack collection includes three (3) 1948 Tucker '48 vehicles, the factory Tucker test chassis, thousands of engineering drawings and blueprints, original Tucker parts, several engines as well as many other artifacts and displays. The vehicles include Tucker #1001 - the first 'production' prototype, Tucker #1022, and Tucker #1026 - the only Tucker built with an automatic transmission. A total of 51 Tuckers were built by hand in Chicago, of which 47 are known to still exist.

The AACA Museum's future exhibit will be housed permanently in a dedicated 5,200 square foot gallery. Rather than merely displaying the collection in an ordinary fashion, the exhibit will not only showcase the cars themselves, but will chronicle Preston Tucker's life and history before and after the fabled Tucker '48.

The job of transforming ideas and concepts into reality was given to Museum volunteer Jim Booth of Jim Booth Designs. Lizewskie was proud to say, "We are extremely lucky to have Jim as one of our many dedicated volunteers. We sat down with him and explained what we wanted, and what he delivered to us far exceeded our goals! ".

Bringing Booth's design to fruition won't be inexpensive. "Obviously to build this gallery properly it will take a great deal of capital", stated Lizewskie. "We will be kicking off a capital campaign using traditional methods as well as web-based crowdfunding programs. We intend to not only reach out to individuals but also corporate sponsors."

While the Cammack Gallery will still be used for rotating exhibits until late April, construction of various components will be created off-site during the early stages. After April, the Gallery will be closed for construction until the Grand Opening in late 2014. Lizewskie commented, "We are targeting the AACA Fall Meet in October for our Grand Opening. The opening reception will be a spectacular addition to an already festive week!"

Following cues from Preston Tucker himself, the three Tucker 48s will not be displayed until the opening of the gallery. "We want to keep everyone in suspense until the big day!"

The Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum

Auburn. Cord. Duesenberg. For many automobile enthusiasts these names represent some of the most beautiful cars ever built. However, unless you attend the one of the large AACA meets like the Eastern Fall Meet in Hershey, Pennsylvania, or a major classic car event like the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance or Amelia Island Concours d'Elegance, you rarely see many of these historic vehicles. Fortunately, there is a museum dedicated to the preservation of these classic vehicles, with over 120 cars on display.

The Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum (ACD Museum) is located in Auburn, Indiana. It opened in 1974 in the former headquarters building of the Auburn Automobile Company. Even the building itself is amazing—three floors of history, from the gorgeous art deco Company Showroom (where new models were displayed for their dealers to view) to the replica of Gordon Buehrig's clay model studio—and was designated Historic National Landmark on 5 April 2005 because it is "one of the few remaining examples of a small independent automobile company. . . . visual reminders of this company's proud past and achievements in automotive history." (Quote from the ACD Museum's National Historic Land-

mark nomination package.)

The museum has a number of galleries and exhibits focused on different aspects of Auburn Automobile Company and automobile history and technology. When you enter the museum, immediately to your right is the restored original, art deco Company Showroom displaying Auburns, Cords, and Duesenbergs from what the museum calls the classic era (1925-1937). Continue through the museum to the Gallery of Classics, which features cars of the highest quality built between 1928-1948 by the Auburn Automobile Company and its competitors.


The Cars of Indiana Gallery, located in the company's former drafting room and records department, displays rare and unusual cars built in Indiana, a leader in automobile manufacturing in the first part of the twentieth-century, including some of America's most luxurious and expensive cars. This exhibit includes a 1916 Premier Model 6-56 Foursome, 1924 Marmon34C, and a 1932 Auburn 12-160A Speedster.

The Early Auburns Gallery highlights the early history of the company from 1904-1924, including a 1900 Eckhart Carriage (Eckhart became the Auburn Automobile Company in 1903) and a 1904 Auburn (the earliest Auburn known to still exist). The Gallery of Special Interest features some highlights of automobile history, including a 1926 Cunningham Sport Touring Car, 1937 Lincoln Zephyr, a 1956 Ford Thunderbird, a

1957 Mercedes-Benz 300SL gullwing coupe, and 1963 Jaguar E-Type.

The Gallery of Auburn, Indiana, Automobiles reminds us that at one time at least eleven different brands of automobiles—many of which you may never heard of or have only read about in books—were manufactured in Auburn. The gallery includes a 1907 Kiblinger, 1909 Zimmerman Runabout, and 1913 McIntyre Imp Cyclecar. (One of my favorite cars in this gallery was the 1911 Metallurgique Speedster, which you may remember from the 1965 Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon movie The Great Race.)

There is not enough space in this article to fully describe everything in the ACD Museum or to do it full justice. Besides the all gorgeous and special cars, there is an exhibit—the Hall of Technology—that highlights Auburn, Cord, and Duesenberg tech-

nology still used in cars today. You can view E.L Cord's office, a reproduction of designer Gordon Buehrig's clay modeling studio with original clay models on display, the Auburn Automobile Company's original conference room, and, as a special treat, men can use the executive washroom.

If you love cars and haven't visited the ACD Museum, you need to make a pilgrimage to this shrine of automobile history. Why not attend the second annual AACA Special Spring Meet in Auburn, Indiana, on 8-10 May and accomplish two special car activities on one trip. (And there are a number of other car museums you can hit on the trip to Indiana or back. Can you say "Gilmore"?) Just allow yourself plenty of time to visit the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum—a couple of hours isn't enough.

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
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
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


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
