TRAACA Tour of Abacus Racing Saturday, March 18, 2017 Okay, all you race car fans—or just car fans—mark your calendars for the long-mark your calendary for the long

Okay, all you race car fans—or just car fans—mark your calendars for the long-awaited tour of Abacus Racing in Virginia Beach. Fellow TRAACA member and owner of Abacus Machine & Automotive Services Bill Thumel has graciously offered to host the TRAACA on Saturday, March 18, 2017, for a tour of his machine shop and vintage automobile collection.

We'll start the morning at 9:00 AM at the Abacus Machine Shop (located at 1372 Baker Rd, Virginia Beach, VA 23455) with coffee and donuts generously supplied by Bill Thumel. The tour of the facility will last about one hour. From the machine shop we'll travel down the road to Abacus Hampton Roads (located at 410 18th Street, Virginia Beach, VA 23455) to leisurely view Bill's car collection from about 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM, followed by lunch at the facility. Lunch will consist of catered sub sandwiches, chips, cookies, soft drinks, and water. The club is subsidizing the lunch, so the cost to club members is only \$5.00.

A little history from the Abacus website: Abacus, established over twenty years ago, began building motors for British sports cars participating in Sports Car Club of America (SCCA) and Sportscar Vintage Racing Association events. That experience carried over to the development of 4- & 6cylinder Nissan engines for SCCA GT-2 and GT-3 events, culminating in numerous national championships. The machine shop and repair facility services and repairs exotic and foreign automobiles such as Rolls-Royce, Jaguar, Porsche, Ferrari, and even Honda. They can tune and test the vehicles on their Dynojet chassis dynamometer. Check the Abacus website for more details on their engine shop, repair facility, and chassis Dynojet.

Please plan to tour Bill Thumel's Abacus Machine Shop and car collection on Saturday, March 18, 2017. This event will be a great way to learn more about racing and exotic vehicles, visit a wonderful collection of cars, show support for fellow TRAACA member Bill Thumel, and enjoy a free breakfast and discounted lunch. - Several lower priority items tabled until next meeting.

At least 35 TRAACA members came from throughout the East Coast to attend this year's AACA Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, PA, on Thursday-Saturday, 9-11 February 2017. 

Still Collecting Stuff — Letter Openers By Terry Bond

Before the advent of e-mail, we used to lick postage stamps and envelope flaps. Opening the mail was best done with a letter opener, which was a perfect medium for advertising. Over the years, a lot of automobile dealers, garages, parts stores, and every imaginable automobile-related business used letter openers to advertise. Letter openers are great things to collect, and they naturally fall into several categories.

First, I'll talk about specific vehicle advertising. The prolific manufacturer of all things advertising-related was Whitehead & Hoag. In business from 1892 to 1953, the company was a partnership between Benjamin Whitehead, a well-known printer, and Chester Hoag, a paper and twine distributor. Together they became the world's most prolific manufacturer of advertising and political buttons, pins, fobs, and advertising novelties of all types. However, this article focuses on letter openers, and Whitehead & Hoag was one of a large number of companies in that business. They were among the first to produce a flat-stamped, knife-like letter opener with engraving on it, and, eventually, one with an enameled representation of the automobile emblem itself.

You can find letter openers advertising almost every car made. I recently acquired a nice one for the Briscoe auto. Buick, Cadillac, Chalmers, Pierce Arrow, Overland, and so many more

letter openers are out there waiting to be collected. Shown below is a selection of a few including an interesting one advertising Marmon automobiles. It must be Marmon-specific as I know of no other car manufacturer names displayed on a similar style of letter opener.

The next category I'll call automobile product and service-related advertising letter openers. In addition to automobile manufacturers, you'll find letter openers advertising motor oils, gasoline, piston rings, spark plugs, tires, and just about anything related to an automobile.



An especially rare piece is this opener advertising the *Automobile Trade Directory*, a popular automobile-related publication that was produced as a very thick catalog filled with news of automobiles, products, and parts. The advertising in these publications is tremendous. Yes, there will be a future article or two on motoring publications!



The next category, and one of my favorites, I'll call automobile images. These are letter openers that actually depict an automobile. There are general automobile-themed items, then there are automobile brand- or model-specific items. A letter opener with an image of a specific car will command a rather hefty price, especially a high-end car like a Pierce-Arrow. These products are quite scarce as auto manufacturers tended to produce items with only their emblems. Those never went out of date when the next year's vehicle model was introduced.

The more allegorical type of automobile image is often found on celluloid letter openers. Early motoring scenes on the handle or even the complete handle shaped like an automobile are quite difficult to find. Celluloid itself was very fragile, and finding these letter openers in good condition is extremely difficult.

The heavy bronze letter opener shown below is a part of a desk set that includes a book rack, letter rack, thermometer, and calendar. We'll talk more about "desk-top" items in another article sometime in the coming year (or two).



Collectible letter openers run from quite inexpensive to ridiculous. Here are some guidelines:

Stamped flat brass openers advertising products or garages can be found from a few dollars to \$50-\$75 depending on the theme. Those with simple engraving on them are least expensive. Those advertising specific gasoline or oil products are also sought by collectors of petromobilia. Any type of image aside from just writing or script increases the value tremendously. The plain, flat, brass openers with attached enameled logos can range from \$50 to several hundred depending on the car. The heavy classics like Packard, Pierce, etc., command the highest prices.

Openers with automobile images on them, either embossed into the handles or as an applied piece, can range from \$50 to several hundred dollars, depending on the image. Shown below are a couple of high-end letter openers in sterling silver.



There are modern versions of letter openers in plastic or even cast metal. Some are very good quality, but most modern pieces can be found for \$10 or less.

You'll find collectible letter openers in flea markets, antique shops, malls & galleries, yard sales, in box lots at auctions, and just about anywhere. It's fun to find them in a box among a lot of other letter openers advertising beer, insurance, or the local funeral parlor. It pays to go through the pile of them sticking up in a coffee mug at a vard sale. I have delighted in making some great discoveries that way.

Enjoy the photographs. You know, I think this is one collectible you could actually use!

How Can Youth Afford This Hobby?

I've never actually counted, but I know I've attended hundreds of car shows. One question that always bothers me is "How can I afford this hobby?" My answer is standard—there are many affordable collector cars available. No one has to start with a perfect Full Classic to enjoy our hobby.

I started with a 1966 Chevrolet Corvair convertible that my parents bought new as their first "second car." While being reliable, inexpensive transportation, Corvairs are regularly available for sale.

Chevrolet's "waterless wonder" came in multiple body styles including a two door coupe, four-door sedan, convertible and station wagon, as well as the passenger van, ramp-side pickup and panel truck. Engines and transmissions can be swapped among all models.

Options included turbo-charged engines, power convertible tops, telescopic steering wheels, and automatic transmissions.

Most of the mechanical parts needed to restore a Corvair are being reproduced and can be purchased on the Internet and delivered to you within days. Even the most difficult to find trim parts can be located at the Hershey flea market.

Corvairs can be purchased in average condition for slightly more than the original 1960's list prices. They are an excellent entry-level car for a young person to actively participate in our hobby. The Corvair's large trunk provides ample storage room for touring.

The timeless Corvair styling is always noticed so the Corvair owner must be ready to enjoy discussing his car with others. It seems everyone used to own one or had a relative who did.

If there wasn't a Corvair in your past, maybe there will be one in your future.



Paperwork for Judges Records

We all know that when a meet is over there is some paperwork that must be turned in to Judges Records. The Assistant Team Captain is responsible for verifying that he/she has all the paperwork prior to coming into Judges Records. This paperwork is very important for both the VP of Judging and Judges Records.

The following four (4) items are required when turning in paperwork:

- 1 Team Captain's Reporting Form (will be in envelope)
- 2 The team's evaluation of the Team Captain
- 3 The worksheets that the team completed on the vehicles that were judged
- 4 The participation cards of all the judges on the team (needed to get your credit for the meet)

Items 1-3 are used by the VP of Class Judging to answer member inquiries regarding judged vehicles that were not presented with awards. The VP of Class Judging will use the items to review the judged vehicle and provide the member with a response to their specific inquiry.



TRAACA Boy Scout Training Session

Thanks to five TRAACA members, six members of Boy Scout Troop 36 recently received their Automotive Maintenance Merit Badge. The 2-hour training session took place on Saturday, February 4, at the Military Aviation Museum in Pungo. Troop 36, of Carrollton, VA, camped on the museum grounds Friday and Saturday nights (in 40-degree weather—burr!). The boys were accompanied by three Scout leaders.

In a nutshell, to be awarded the Automotive Maintenance

Merit Badge the boys are required to know how to properly and safely maintain a modern car, everything from checking the oil and tires to completing the many service requirements. The essence is to carefully follow the vehicle's owner's manual.

Sam Kern, Bob Parrish, Bob Stein, Bill Treadwell, and Jim Villers served as the instructors, each covering different topics. Bob Parrish used his 1958 Chevrolet Corvette as a backdrop for cooling systems; Bob Stein used his 1989 Buick Reatta for understanding dashboard instruments; Jim Villers jacked-up his 1967 Mercedes Benz 230SL to demonstrate how brakes work and how to safely change a tire; Bill Treadwell described engine, drive train, ignition and electrical systems with his 1969 Chevrolet Camaro; and Sam Kern covered general maintenance and safety, allowing the boys to actually do the checks on his 2010 Ford Fusion. Using vintage cars helped maintain the boys' attention, exposed them to the mechanical fundamentals, and gave them a sense of how much easier (but no less important) it is to maintain new cars than older ones. We followed an outline Jim Villers prepared to cover all of the required topics. The Boy Scouts were truly interested & engaged for the full 2-hours. We concluded by inviting Troop 36 to our 44th Annual Meet to be held at the museum on Saturday, September 23, 2017.

The TRAACA has been asked to provide another Automotive Maintenance Merit Badge training session at the museum on Saturday, March 18th. Please contact Sam Kern if you would like to be an instructor.
