NPD Car Collection—Pt 2 Ocala, FL Story and photos by Mark McAlpine



This is the second of two articles about the National Parts Depot (NPD) Collection. This article highlights vehicles in the collection from model year 1960 and newer.

As I mentioned in last month's article, Marion & I were fortunate to be able to visit the NPD Collection when we attended the 2019 Winter Nationals in Ocala, FL. (For those unfamiliar with NPD, it is the largest restoration parts business in the country.) It is an amazing collection of beautiful cars and trucks. For reasons unknown to me, while there are a few long-extinct marques and some Dodge and Chrysler cars in the collection, most of the vehicles are Ford Motor Company (including Lincoln and Mercury) and General Motors models, with a particular emphasis on vehicles of the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s. What is especially impressive is many of the vehicles are unrestored original vehicles and most of the vehicles have low mileage on them.

Last month's article featured vehicles in the collection from 1959 and older. This article highlights vehicles from 1960 and newer. There are too many incredible vehicles to include in this short article, but I want to highlight several that stood out. One is the 1960 Pontiac Bonneville shown below which has just over 43,000 miles on it. The display placard explains that "While the car was a bit 'barn worn,' requiring restoration, the original interior was perfect." The restoration was completed in 1998 and the car is gorgeous.

The 1961 Ford Galaxie "Hi-Po" on display is 100% original and unrestored with only 1,550 miles on it. It's display placard explains that the original owner was a young mechanic at a Ford dealership, and that within the first two weeks that he owned the car he got into so much trouble with the local police that his parents took the car away from him.

The 1961 Ford Galaxie 500 on display has less than 5 miles on it. Its display placard says the car's original owner was Mr. Bob Mercer, the owner of a small Ford dealership in Hickman, Nebraska, who "would 'set aside' one new vehicle every ear to keep for posterity. In the 1990s Mr. Mercer's health declined, and he sold his collection of 9 brand-new Fords, 5 of which (including this '62 Galaxie) now reside in the 'NPD Collection' of Jim and Rick Schmidt."

The gold 1963 Chevrolet Impala SS Sport Coupe shown on the back cover was the 50-millionth Chevrolet built. "It received a show-quality special hue of 'Anniversary Gold,' a 340-horsepower 409 cubic-inch V8 and most available options." After the special ceremony when the car rolled off the production line, the car was displayed at Chevrolet dealers around the country. Despite having only have 92 miles on it, the car received a body-off restoration. (I guess even special cars show wear & tear after being moved around and stored for decades.) It received the AACA James Melton Memorial Cup for "Outstanding Senior Award Car" in 2003.

You may recognize the white 1974 Mercury Cougar XR7. from Mercury TV commercials of the time ("The Sign of the Cat") or may even have seen it on display at your local Lincoln-Mercury dealership. (Chauncey the cougar was usually draped across the hood.) The car is covered with autographs of celebrities and politicians who were photographed with Chauncey and the car. Each autograph is documented with a photo of the car being signed.)

The NPD Collection is not open to the public, but by special arrangement it is opened occasionally to car clubs and other organizations. If you ever have the opportunity to visit the collection, don't hesitate—it's phenomenal.

Still Collecting – More Pandemic Purchases

Hershey last fall was certainly a breath of fresh air for collectors. It's always great to get together with old friends and share our discoveries.

Following that, there remained anticipation of a lull while the holiday season soon ramped up. Now, winter is in its waning moments and the virus seems to be diminishing.

But, until spring breaks and we can get out antique hunting again, spending time at home continues to open other possibilities for collecting. The internet of course is the go-to resource during times like this.

THE FAN

One of my usual resources produced yet another great version of the illustrated advertising folding fan. This great early version promoted perfume. Unfolding it produces a faint whift of some ancient concoction that still remains somewhat pleasant to this day, after over 100 years!

These fans were illustrated by noted French graphic artist Ernest Montaut. This one is in near mint condition and was in its original box. I am fortunate to have two other variations on this fan in my collection. Both of them advertise different luxury hotels, one in Paris and one in New York. The automobile illustrated on this version is slightly larger than the others. Remember-3 is a collection!

WORLD-WIDE EBAYING

Ebay has many different versions of its popular online flea market. There is one for nearly every country on the globe. I frequently watch both the Great Britain and French sites.

Not long ago, a very unusual early spark plug turned up in England. It is a French plug from the 1904-6 era. The first one I'd ever seen was in a major collection sold several years ago. It was purchased by one of

the world's top collectors who spent well for it. The competition was left in the dust as collectors around the world entered the fray.

The plug newly listed was oddly described as an "early ignition plug with window." Nothing about automobile or "spark" was in the listing, so I thought perhaps it might be overlooked by anyone searching for a "spark plug" or "antique automobile" item.

I watched for a week and using a sniping program to automatically place a last second bid, I held my breath (and wallet).

I was surprised to win the auction at less than half what I'd expected to pay! Shipping from the UK was fast and safe and when I announced my acquisition, indeed-many had not seen it listed.

Once the plug was safely in-hand, I let a few collecting friends know what I'd discovered. Word traveled surprisingly fast, especially among some of the underbidders in Europe who had been watching (or bidding).

It's an amazing plug in brass with two removable glass viewing ports in the sides of the base. A wonderful "Pandemic Purchase" for sure!

VALENTINE's DAY

Since it was getting close to Valentine's Day, I had

decided to begin an internet search for "Automobile Valentines." I've collected these for many years. The early European produced fold-out valentines are the most beautiful you can find. They however are very delicate. Die-cut, embossed and made with nothing more than stuff paper and tissue, survival is difficult without some damage. Finding pristine examples is not easy and prices rise to "stupid" for some of them. My collection includes some great examples picked up over the years and displayed in a nice antique showcase.

About 15 years ago, there was an absolutely fantastic valentine in an auction in London I'd never seen before.

I registered for the auction and was prepared to pay well for it, but all I could do was sit at the computer and watch the bidding go beyond my maximum in just a few seconds. It finally sold for three times what I thought. Add a 15% buyer's premium, a currency exchange fee, shipping and handling....you can see it was just not to be.

Fast-forward to a few weeks ago. I was having an email conversation with a friend who also collects them. I concluded my email with - "well, with Valentine's Day just around the corner, it's time to start watching for them on ebay again." After sending that email, I logged into ebay and typed in "Antique Automobile Valentine." Bingo! There it was!!!! I couldn't believe I was look at one of those same valentines. I'd not seen another one since that 15 year-ago

auction defeat. It had just been listed and had a buy-it -now price of just \$48.00. Compared to the last one I saw, the decimal point was either in the wrong place or it was the bargain of the century. I held my breath and BOUGHT IT NOW!

THE TAPESTRY

This beautiful "tapestry" is just amazing. It came from an antique dealer in New England that I'd bought from before. She thought I might like it. I did not hesitate.



1902 printed tapestry It is printed in beautiful, bold colored ink on linen. While it's just a piece of fabric to most, it's actually an item that could have multiple uses.

Colorful prints like these were sold in turn-of-thecentury dry-goods stores along with other sewing materials. They became decorative pillow covers and sometimes draft screens. Mounted in a wood framework, they would stand in front of a fireplace to shield chimney drafts when there was no fire. Some were actually just framed to become wall decorations. This one has never been used and was carefully folded with ancient tissue paper protecting the printed surface. The name of the printer and the date "1902" is in the bottom right corner.

TWO MORE LADIES DRIVING

I did not purposely collect to a theme this past month, but yet another two pretty ladies driving showed up recently.

This beautiful print came from an unexpected source. My "want list" is posted in many places, including several art and antique galleries across the country. In early December, as Sue and I were having a discussion about how difficult it is to buy gifts for each other, I received an email from an art/antiques gallery in Ohio. We'd stopped on the way home from the Auburn AACA meet last year and I'd left my business card with them. Here was a print they thought might interest me. They sent a small image without any indication of its size. But, it was a striking image I thought might solve the gift problem – so we decided to buy it. Our full intention was to wrap it and place it under the Christmas tree.

A few days later, the UPS truck backed into our driveway, and out came a gigantic box. I had no idea what was in it, but upon opening its many protective layers, out came this fabulous, fully framed lithograph. It was printed in Germany in 1911 and is signed by the artist Hamilton King.

Hamilton King was a prolific magazine and commercial illustrator who is best known for illustrating all those fantastic early Coca-Cola calendars and serving trays with pretty ladies. Most of his work is seen on magazine covers though. I do not know if this illustration ever graced the cover of a magazine, but I do have the same image on a postcard in my collection.

The framing in beautifully done and nicely compliments it. Best of all, it was on sale. Framing alone would cost more than twice what I paid, including shipping. I rearranged some of my "wall-hangers" and it's now proudly on view in our family room. It measures 30" x 24".



LET'S HAVE A BEER!

Decorative beer steins have been popular collector's items for a long time. They originated in Germany. The lids on these tankards were designed to keep flys from swimming in your beer. Yes-that's true!

There are all kinds of steins that were decorated with whimsical humorous scenes. There are also more serious scenes depicting historical events. Organizational steins were issued to members. In the early days of the automobile, a few were illustrated with motoring scenes.

The best of them were made by the Villeroy and Boch potters in Mettlach, Germany during what is considered "the golden age of the stein" -1885-1910.



Few with automobiles were produced and one in particular stands out. Among collectors it is considered the "holy grail" of automobile steins. A rare opportunity presented itself just recently.

Villeroy and Boch Mettlach automobile stein, 1909. This is an organizational stein, produced for the German Automobile Club (*Kaiserlicher Automobil Club*) which was founded in 1899 as the *Atomobilclub von Deutchland*.

The initials used on the stein's lid help to identify and date it. When the club was founded originally in 1899, the name was abbreviated as "AvD." In 1904, Emperor Wilhelm II became honorary president and changed the name, using the initials "KAC."

Following WWI, the club reverted back to its original name and once again used the initials "AvD.".

In 1910, a fire destroyed the factory where this particular stein was produced. The base of the stein carries the Villeroy and Boch markings along with an inscribed date 11/27/09.

These turn up at auction on rare occasions and usually command prices between \$1200-\$1500. Mine was a bargain from someone who had bought an entire collection and sought some advice about it. He made a handsome profit, but I've got the stein!

BUT WAIT – THERE'S MORE!

Pins, buttons, fobs have always managed to find me. From a wide range of sources, they continue to accumulate. I'm glad they don't take up much space. Small glass front "trays" known as "Riker Mounts" are perfect for them. Divided compartments keep them somewhat organized and present them nicely. To close this article, I'll illustrate with a grouping of items recently acquired from a variety of sources, including antique shops, jewelry stores, and of course the internet. All were very inexpensive, except the fabulous early Pierce Arrow pin. Yes, somebody else has the money, but, I've got the pin!!!

FORD FOB

As a Model T enthusiast, it's only natural that Ford items would be a big part of my collection. Fobs like this have been reproduced and are actually quite common.

I knew there had to be an original out there somewhere. I was offered to me privately from another collector recently and I did not hesitate. It was reasonably priced and is in fine condition, displaying near perfect dark blue enamel and tarnished silver plating over brass. It also bears the proper markings on the back showing the name of the manufacturer that produced it – Greenduck, Chicago.

The known reproductions have no markings on the back and there is no blue enamel in the early style Ford winged logo beneath the touring car. Looking at the quality of production, the clear definition shown in the spoke wheels, and other tiny details verifies its originality. I'm pleased to add it to my collection after searching for many years.

FIRST LADIES BREAKFAST 2022

. Having gone to the First Ladies Breakfast (FLB) since the early 1990's, I have always enjoyed the programs, seeing old friends from all over the country, and making new friends. The FLB planned by Donna Elliott for the 86th Annual Convention in Gettysburg was amazing.

She hired the Murder Mystery Company out of Baltimore for a fun, challenging, and engaging event. The murder mystery was set in the late '20s or early '30s. The professional actors and many of the FLB attendees dressed in vintage or replica garments of that era, some in what could only be called "Hollywood Glam!'

Money was flowing. Each table had loads of "cash" that could be used to loosen the lips of folks at other tables about clues or tips that they had discovered. These were recorded on a tip and clue list page to be used when each table would reveal their prime murder suspect and be able to give evidence for their choice. The MMCo crew has these items on the table before the doors opened.

The MMCo team of actors played the following parts. Sir Warren Peace, a wealthy magnate, was the lead actor who began the inquiry into evidence of the murder of Miss Peacock, the actress hired for his upcoming production. Jarvis Deedit, his faithful butler, might be a suspect. Professor Purple was a quiet intellectual, but was he involved? Sir Warren Peace had hired a detective, Peter Ness. The basic plot was laid out for the First Ladies Breakfast attendees to ponder as they began enjoying the tasty meal.

The professional actors interviewed some of the folks at each table and offered parts to several of them who were given directions about what to say and do as their parts developed. At my table, Doretta Scott, First Lady of the South Jersey Region, was turned into Dr. Sarah Dippity who was involved with several other characters. As a matter of fact, when we came to the final moments, our table voted to name her to be the murderer. It felt a bit unfaithful to put such an accusation on someone we were getting to know. Luckily it turned out that she was innocent and she was awarded the BEST ACTRESS CERTIFICATE.

AACA First Lady, Donna Elliott, played Oola La, Sir Warren Peace's maid. Oola La knew that Sir Warren Peace was having an affair with Miss Peacock. Was her infatuation with her boss strong enough for her to commit murder? Anne Reeves of the Susquehannock Region played Donna Badthing. In spite of her character name, she played an elegant actress who was hoping to get the newly available part in Sir Warren Peace's production. But she had not been around the deceased so was not a prime suspect. Kathryn Miner from Harrisville, NH played Mary-Katen Ashlee, another hungry actress on the lookout for a good part to play. Was she involved with Sir Warren Peace or Hugh Jego, the pictures financial backer? Cherry Bomb, played by Leslie Scarpelli from the HVPR and TRAACA Regions, played a seductive up and coming actress who snagged the new part after the death of her mentor Miss Peacock so she was a prime murder suspect. She maintained her innocence in spite of her affair with Sir Warren Peace.

The BEST ACTOR CERTIFICATE went to a fellow who played Mr Greenspan. Another guy who played Hugh Jego was linked to Cherry Bomb. He died suddenly at his table. Dr. Sarah Dippity pronounced him dead after he slumped over in his chair. He was quickly removed from the scene of the crime.

After many plot twists and clues were revealed, each table had time to discuss the clues they had verified and how they pointed to different suspects.
