Thanks to the repeated generosity of Paul Atkinson and Eggleston Corporation, the Region was able to hold a very successful show today at Eggleston's Corporate headquarters building in Norfolk. Meet Registrars Jerry Adams and Ellen Adams did a masterful job of registration and the Eggleston staff assisted with planning, preparation, and promotion. Even the weather cooperated, with clear sunny skies and pleasant temperatures.

The Merritt Horne Award was presented to Tony Miller, who drove his 1925 Model T Ford from Portsmouth. The trophy for Furthest Driven was presented to John and Ellen Haring who drove 67 miles from North Carolina in their 1963 Chevrolet. Oldest Owner (who was willing to put down his age) was Joe Geib and his 1986 Chevrolet El Camino, while Youngest Owner at the show was Tony Miller, who also won the Oldest Vehicle Award for his 1925 Model T Ford.

The 'Most Original' and 'Best' categories were judged by a team made up of AACA National Judges Bob Parrish, Debbie Nolan, and Mickey McChesney. Scott Davies was presented the Best Two-Wheel Vehicle for his 1995 Harley Davidson. The Most Original Pre-1955 honor went to Frank Linse for his 1931 Chevrolet Standard Sedan. Rick Overbaugh received the Most Original 1955-1975 Award for his 1966 Pontiac GTO. The 1991 Jeep Grand Wagoneer of Wes Neal received the Most Original vehicle for 1976-1997.

Best of Show honors went to Joe Gentile for his 1970 AMX. Eggleston Corporation also provided three certificates for a full service auto detailing as a special drawing for all participants. Winners were Jonathan Smith (1976 Chrysler New Yorker), Mickey McChesney (1984 Oldsmobile Delta 88), and Bill Treadwell (1973 Oldsmobile 442). Special thanks to Fred Cole for his outstanding support handling the parking and to Debbie and Tommy Nolan who came all the way from Richmond to share their 1961 Pontiac Catalina.

EyesOn Design Car Show—Part 2 Grosse Pointe Shores, MI Story and photos by Mark McAlpine

This is Part 2 of the series of articles about the 2022 EyesOn Design charity car show held on 19 June 2022 at the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House in Grosse Pointe Shores, MI, to benefit the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology.

The theme of the 2022 EyesOn Design car show in Grosse Pointe Shores, MI, was "Designed for Speed." Last month's introductory article about the car show highlighted some of the classic vehicles displayed in the Indy car, Golden Era of Road Racing, and speed record car categories. This month's article showcases some of the vintage motorcycles displayed at the show. (My only disappointment when viewing these impressive machines was not seeing Terry Bond's 1912 Triumph displayed among them—it would've been right in place alongside the 1914 Harley-Davidson road race motorcycle on display and held its own against any vehicle on the show field. Maybe we can convince Terry to enter his motorcycle in one of the future EyesOn Design car shows so a broader audience can enjoy seeing it.)

There were three categories of vintage motorcycles at the car show: road race, flat track, and motocross/enduro. Model years displayed ranged from the aforementioned 1914 Harley-Davidson to a 1986 Yamaha YZ490. Motorcycle manufacturers represented included well-known names like Ducati, Harley-Davidson, Honda, Husqvarna, Suzuki, and Yamaha to lesser-known names (at least to me) such as Bultaco, Montessa, and Penton. (I apologize to Ducati fans despite trying several times, I could not get a photograph of the 1965 Ducati Desmo 350cc café racer on display because of the number of spectators around it.)

I particularly enjoyed seeing the early Harley-Davidson motorcycles, especially the 1914 and 1927 models. Similar to comparing early automobiles to their modern descendants, while motorcycles from the 1900s to 1920s share the basic components of two wheels, a seat, and handlebars with modern motorcycles, the early generation variants look so different from today's motorcycles that it's like comparing a Ford Model T to a new Ford GT. However, the engineering and craftsmanship of early motorcycles is astounding, especially when you consider manufacturers didn't have the technology and precision machinery we have today. (It's also sobering to think of seemingly fearless riders racing these motorcycles at high speeds on dirt or wooden tracks especially on wooden tracks.)

It was interesting to see the different motocross/enduro motorcycles on display. I remember friends and relatives blasting through the woods and back trails on some of these bikes when I was a young man (boy, that was a long time ago), so it's hard to think of these machines as "classics" or "vintage." They were recreational vehicles—ridden hard and often recklessly (and sometimes crashed)—so it was amazing to see them at all, let alone restored and show room fresh.

As mentioned last month, the theme for the next year's EyesOn Design car show has not been announced yet, but Marion and I will definitely be going to the show and will try to attend some of the associated events earlier in the week. Whatever the theme, I know the show will have an impressive display of outstanding antique vehicles and some special new ones. (And maybe it will include Terry Bond's Triumph or one of Dwight Schaubach's Duesenbergs.)

STILL COLLECTING– the Lady and the Automobile By Terry Bond

There is something special about a pretty lady in an antique car! You've heard me mention that before in other articles. Perhaps you've even seen a few items from my collection. With Hershey just around the corner, perhaps something interesting will follow me home again – hopefully another example of "The Lady and the Automobile."

The early automobile was a strange mechanical marvel when it was introduced. It made loud noises, went fast, slung oil and grease everywhere and was basically a "beast" that only a man could handle. Of course that was proven wrong, but still, it was certainly nothing that a prim and proper lady would even want to get close to! Yet-there were brave women who mastered handling and even taming those beasts!

who even did their own work on their cars. There was a time when women were even "banned" from racing – not for fear that some disaster might injure them but because men could simply not accept being beaten on the course by a lady!

It soon became a popular advertising ploy - if a lady

can handle the car then anybody can! Sex sells, and always has. The age 0f the automobile proved beyond doubt that a pretty lady could do more for marketing than a thousand words.

Of course there were cars specifically marketed to ladies. The early electric cars were popular in big cities. They could not only be more easily handled, their large glass "box-like" carriage-style bodies were perfect to show off a well-dress lady of society. They were deemed "more appropriate" for ladies.

Other cars however took advantage of the comparison between the new-found freedom an automobile could provide, and the new-found independence the ladies of society enjoyed just after the turn of the century.

One of the first automobiles to use a lady in their advertising was the Peerless automobile.

The "Peerless Girl" is the first known use of a pretty lady to help sell an automobile in the USA. Of course we see pretty ladies shown with automobiles used in Europe from the late 1890's but in the case of Peerless, not only was it first in this country, it was the first use of a "dedicated" lady to represent the car anywhere.

The lithographic prints of her were hung in automobile show-rooms. A real "Peerless Girl" also appeared at automobile shows. Prints could be purchased for ten cents each as souvenirs.

The artist was S.B. Crosby, and they were first introduced in 1903. It is believed that ten different ladies were depicted between then and 1905, each numbered. I have been fortunate enough to find four of them.





Unfortunately these were printed on cheap paper Acids from wood frames and cardboard backing quickly stained them. Survival is low and those remaining are often in poor condition.

Postcards depicting lady drivers are common. A frequent theme is a lady learning to drive, with a gentleman using the opportunity to get close.

One of the earliest lady motorists to achieve some level of fame was Dorothy Levitt. At the turn of the century, she was a journalist and race car driver. In 1909, she published a book entitled "The Woman and the Car."

Her image appeared in countless newspaper and magazine articles. It was also captured by noted postcard illustrator Raphael Kirchner, an Austrian artist best known for his Art Nouveau illustrations of pretty ladies. He was among the earliest producers of "pin-up art." His image of Dorothy Levitt at the wheel of a speeding car is one of the most sought after postcards ever.

Images of lady motorists can be found in many forms including bookmarks, and advertisements for all kinds of products.

Often calendars, both large and small used images of ladies driving automobiles, even if the products they advertised were totally unrelated to automobiles. The majority of such prints were simply stock images used by printing companies to illustrated items as a customer preferred.

Here is a great example from my collection.

Lithographs themselves are among the most sought after. This is my favorite. It is a show-room poster advertising the International High-Wheeled automobile. The same image was used on the cover of the 1909 sales catalog. This 36" tall print was a \$25 discovery at an outdoor antique market in Richmond several years ago.

The beautiful illustration shown next is a print done by noted illustrator Clarence Underwood. It is entitled "Lessons in Motoring. This print comes in 3 different sizes (yes, I have all three), and is also done as a postcard. This one was discovered by Susan in an antique shop in Kentucky and was already matted and framed using a beautiful antique oak frame. It was sold as an "antique frame with print" and was a real bargain.

Shown next is a wonderful print of two ladies out for a ride in a very early automobile. This is printed in colored ink on linen It is in perfect original condition and is dated 1900 on the lower edge.

It is quite large and was intended to be mounted in a wood framework and used as a draft barrier in front of a fireplace when not in use. It would keep chimney drafts to a minimum. This one was never mounted or used. It was a chance antique market discovery hidden in a pile of linens.

The beautiful image shown next is actually a small book-mark with advertising on the back side for a hardware store. The image is vivid. It is one of several that I found in an antique market for rare books and is in unused condition.

This small advertising card is beautifully done. These often advertised soap, and other household products. Advertising is on the back. Wish I could speak French!

It's obvious that pretty ladies and early automobiles are a fascination and major part of my collection of artwork. I wish more wall space was available to display everything, but I do periodically rotate items so I can enjoy them all (eventually). Many other small items like postcards, bookmarks, trade-cards, etc, fit nicely into albums where they are well protected and can still be enjoyed. This last item is a print acquired from an auction a few years ago. I'm searching for just the right frame for it. It's a spectacular print!

SILENT AUCTION SURPRISE

TRAACA recently received a gift from Laura Jordan, Merritt Horne's daughter, a collection of vintage purses. The collection was started by Laura's grandmother and mother and she added to it also. Laura's grandparents, Frank and Evelyn Blanchard, and her parents, Merritt and Evelyn Horne, were among the founding members of TRAACA. Both ladies enjoyed collecting vintage clothing and accessories and wearing them during club events. Laura's grandparents had a 1917 Buick. Her Dad had many cars over the years. Two that will be fondly remembered by some of our more senior TRAACA members were the _____ Model T and a 1940 Packard.

Here are pictures of the collection that will be available for bid at our Silent Auction in November.

The first picture includes a rectangular sterling sliver coin/ dance purse that is beautifully engraved on the front side but never monogrammed -that's good value wise. There is a tiny makers mark next to the word STERLING. The original chain is attached. Inside are two coin slots for dimes and nickels - big money in the 1920's and 30's plus a clip that could hold a few dollars or maybe a couple of cigarettes. There is also a beautifully polished sterling mirror, everything a flapper could need. The oval coin/ dance purse is made of metal embellished with many tiny cut crystals. A crown like emblem tops the black ovals on front and back. The tassel and chain are original. Inside are a beveled mirror in a silk pocked and on the other side a pocket with a tiny pouch probably meant to carry a ladies dance card. The smaller rectangular purse is metal that makes a frame for a picture of a peacock on a branch. Actual feathers were used for the tail. The chain is original. Inside are a disc of perfumed powder, rouge, and a lipstick. The other two purses in the first pictured are metal mesh on frames. The smaller one might have been a coin purse or for a child.

The second picture has two beaded bags. The black beaded bag is attached to an inverted V shaped frame that has engraved edges and lovely filigree and open work attached plus an acorn twist clasp and chain handle. The base of the bag features a heavy looped beaded fringe. The tan crochet thread of the other bag has round and faceted metal beads worked into the pattern. The bag is attached to an accordion style frame that is held closed by an oval cap with lovely open work embellished with cut crystals. The frame is opened by a pair of matching cord pulls that double as the handle.


The third picture has five purses. The upper left one is covered in off white, beige, and gold beads in a very Art Deco design embellished with rhinestones. There is a simple zipper closure and a beaded handle at the back. Inside a label identifies the purse and the produce of Jacqueline Mode. The purse in the middle on the left is also covered in beads in an Art Deco design. A pentagon shaped handle is attached to the back that has the same design with less contrast in the bead colors. Inside the zippered bag is a pocket with a small original mirror. The pocket is labeled with MADE IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA. The lower left purse is covered in black, white, pink, and blue beads in a pattern that looks more Art Nouveau. The frame has some lovely openwork that closes with a beautiful ball and socket. The purse on the upper right is labeled Whiting Davis inside the very Art Deco frame that closes with a twisted ball clasp. The chain is made of interesting shaped extended links. The mesh body of the purse is printed with an striking pattern of coral circles and black lines. The purses on the bottom has a floral petit point pattern. The frame is encased between the outer layer and lining and is opened ball drops on front and back. This purse may have been a homemade one which many were following patterns and instructions in ladies magazines.

The fourth picture has some more unusual purses. The largest purse on the left is made with a brown thread that is woven and linked together tying in small tufts made of a yarn that is the same color for the body of the purse and using the thread around the sides and bottom to make a thick fringe plus a tassel. The handle is made by braiding clusters of the thread and linking them at the top in an unusual knotted form. Beige rings surround the opening. The purse on the upper right has a Bakelite frame and clasp. The body of the purse is made of an unusual pile fabric with geometric prints of red, blue, beige, brown and black. Inside the purse an original mirror and charge purse are attached to the lining. The purse on the lower right is the most unusual. It is made of horn trimmed with bronze tips and central band with an openwork clasp in front and a matching hinge in the back. The chain is a double ringed and the tassels are shaped of solid brass. A pair of beige crochet gloves was also included in Laura's gift to TRAACA.

The fifth picture is of an alligator bag. This probably dates to the late 40's so was meant to go with a 40 Packard appropriate costume. The clasp is gold bar that slips under a loop and ball and over a bar that is finished in cross hatching. The inside of the purse is lined and leather and has an attached change purse and an original mirror.

This extra picture shows the inside of the rectangular sterling silver purse and the oval metal purse trimmed in crystals.










