

EyesOn Design Car Show—2023—Part 3 Grosse Pointe Shores, MI Story and photos by Mark McAlpine

This is Part 3 of the series of articles about the 2023 EyesOn Design Car Show held on 18 June 2023 at the Edsel & Eleanor Ford House in Grosse Pointe Shores, MI, to benefit the Detroit Institute of Ophthalmology.

One aspect of the annual EyesOn Design Car Show that makes it so special and makes it stand out from other cars shows—even concours car show—is the variety of vehicles you will see on its show field. Vehicles will include examples from the earliest days of the automobile to the newest designs and glimpses of what the future holds from long-established mainstream automobile manufacturers and new start-up companies. This year's EyesOn Design show had a number of concept vehicles—new and old—on display showcasing emerging technology and advanced design for their eras. Some of the concept cars—like the General Motors Firebird concepts cars from the 1950s and the 1941 Chrysler Thunderbolt—are in the companies' historical collections and are rarely seen in public. Seeing them together in one place is even more rare.

I know the 1941 Chrysler Thunderbolt was included in my second article (featuring Chrysler vehicles at the show) of this series of articles about the EyesOn Design car show, but its design is so unique—especially for its time—that I feel it needs to be included in this article. The Thunderbolt was one of Chrysler's first concept vehicles, and only four are known to survive today. Marion & I have only seen one of them this car—over 10 years ago when it was displayed in the Walter P. Chrysler Museum at then-Chrysler's headquarters building in Auburn Hills, MI. (The museum closed in 2016 and the collection was moved to the former Dodge Viper Conner Avenue Assembly Plant in Detroit and is no longer open to the public.)

Marion & I have seen GM's Firebird concept vehicles a number of times, first when visiting the GM Tech Center in Warren, MI, for "family days" when Marion's father worked there in the design studios as a chief sculptor (chief clay modeler) and then at least two more times when we visited the GM Heritage Collection. The Firebird I, II, and III were very innovative for the time in both styling and technology, and you definitely can see Harley Earl's infatuation with jet aircraft. According to its display placard, the 1954 "Firebird I was America's first car powered by a gas turbine engine, an alternative power source that GM Research first explored in the 1930s. . . Extremely powerful, the promise of this first gas turbine effort was diminished by poor fuel economy and exhaust temperatures of 1250F°." According to the GM

Heritage Collection website, the 1956 Firebird II was another "gas-turbine powered engineering concept car first introduced at the 1956 GM Motorama. . . . The four-passenger Firebird II was characterized by innovations like a titanium body, a regenerative gas-turbine, all-wheel independent suspension with automatic load-leveling, power disc brakes, alternator, magnetic ignition key, electric gear selection, and individually -controlled air conditioning." Also, according to the GM website, the 1958 Firebird III "was the only member of the Firebird trio to have any direct impact on the design of General Motors production vehicles. The 1959 Cadillac featured some of the Firebird III's surface development and its severe rocker panel tuck-under. The 1961 Caddy picked up the Firebird's rear skegs-those stubby fins that hung down off the bottoms of the rear fenders. . . . GM entertained plans for a Firebird IV that went as far as a full-sized wooden frame, but the program's greatest legacy was to give its name to the Pontiac pony cars starting in 1967."

According to its display placard, the 1959 Cadillac Cyclone concept car "was the last 'dream car' created during Harley Earl's tenure at GM. The Cyclone concept contained futuristic features that were untested, untried, and in some ways unattainable, because technology had not yet caught up. The twin cones [check out the impressive "Dagmars"] house proximity sensing units which warn the driver, by an audible signal and flashing light, that a vehicle or object is ahead. A laminated one-piece clear plastic canopy can be retracted into the trunk when not is use. A fully automatic climate control system handles heating and air conditioning requirements."

As you would probably expect, all of the new concept vehicles display were electric vehicles (EVs). on Acknowledging that the transition to EV technology is contentious for some people (even traumatic in some cases), the designs of the vehicles were stunning and their technology innovative (and very ambitious). The 202X Buick Wildcat was first revealed in June 2022. It's a pure concept exercise and will not go into production. That's too bad because this long-hooded, fastback coupe is even more beautiful in person. However, Buick (like the rest of GM) is going all electric by 2030, with the first Buick EV going to be offered in 2024. All of the initial Buick EVs will be SUVs (sport utility vehicles), although other styles are not ruled out for the future-after all, consumer tastes change.

Lincoln displayed its 2022 L100 (honoring Lincoln's 100th anniversary since Ford acquired the brand) concept car and the Lincoln Star concept vehicle. The L100 first debuted at the 2022 Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. It's a fully

autonomous vehicle—it has no steering wheel, pedals, or transmission control—and is ultra-luxurious harking back to Lincoln's first luxury car, the 1922 Model L. The Lincoln Star debuted at the 2022 Los Angeles Auto Show. It will be one of Lincoln's first EVs and is expected to launch in late 2024 as a 2025 model. It's expected to be ultra-luxurious and, by some reports, start at a price north of \$70,000.

"Ultra-luxury" seems to be the theme for EV concept vehicles. The Cadillac Celestiq is headed for production as a 2024 model, all for a low, low starting price of \$340,000. (I can tell I'm not rich and don't need "ultra luxury" because, for that price, the Celestiq should come with a chauffeur and carriage house.) Cadillac is looking for the Celestiq to reestablish it as "the standard of the world."

The new Dodge Charger EV is expected to be released in 2024. The Banshee will be the top model and is being described by many as the first EV "muscle car." Dodge hasn't announced the Banshee's specifications yet, but it is expected to have two electric motors and power greater than the current gas-powered Hellcat Charger (which is rated at 717 hp; 797 hp for the Redeye version and 807 for the Jailbreak package). Note the EV Charger's return to 2-doors. Prices for the new EV Dodge Chargers are expected to be close to those for the current equivalent gas-powered models.

The theme for the 2024 EyesOn Design Car Show has not been announced yet. However, we know the date—Father's Day, Sunday, 16 June 2024—and that it will have some amazing and rare vehicles. We also know that we'll be there. You should go, too. Just be warned—you'll get hooked.

STILL COLLECTING — Teapots

First a disclaimer – these are not really my "cup-oftea" however they are seen often enough that I get questions about them. The Racing Car teapot was first produced in 1937 by Sadler in England. The company was founded by James Sadler and Sons, in 1882. The company was based in Stoke-on-Trent.

They were initially best known for their "Brown Betty" teapots. They began making novelty shaped teapots in the 1930s, Perhaps best known is their iconic race car teapot, produced beginning in 1938. The early pre-war racing car teapots were usually decorated with silver luster and are marked "Made In England" with the design registration number 820236 impressed on the base. They were glazed in green, yellow, cream, black, blue, grey, pink and maroon. The license plate reads "OKT42".

Eventually, cheaper foreign imports impacted the business. In April 2000 the company went into receivership and Churchill China purchased the company's brand name and designs. Those original teapots are perhaps the most famous novelty teapots ever produced. They came in a variety of colored glazes in.addition to having the silver luster. The most common colors are green, yellow and cream.

Immediately post-war, silver became difficult to get. It was also difficult to apply. A platinum luster was used in place of silver. Eventually, they were produced without the bright glazing and the distinctive license plate. By 1952 the race car teapot line was dropped.

Since then it has been reproduced by a variety of different companies including the well-known company Hall.

Values always depend on age and condition for these. They actually were poor teapots! Hot liquid caused the glaze to crack and that detracts significantly from their value. The earliest examples can command prices well about \$1,000 Most though will fit in the \$200-\$300 range. Perhaps the rarest version is the multi-colored example shown above, with a unique "OK1937" license plate. It is said this version was produced in honor of the coronation of King George V1th. It takes several thousand dollars to acquire one of these if you are fortunate enough to find one.

If you like these there are plenty of look-alikes in the market. They range from \$20 up.

You should be aware that many Sadler produced blanks remained following closure of the company. These blanks have been used by other companies to produced 'Sadler-like' teapots. The majority of them however are marked on the base, showing they are clearly not Sadler products.

There were other automobile themed teapots, some produced by major manufacturers. Hall began producing teapots as early as 1919 and introduced their automobile themed novelty pots in 193i8. Hall automobile teapots continue to be ma\de even today.

To date them the following guidelines might be helpful:



1. ca. 1915-1930. "Made in U.S.A." may or may not be present.

2. ca. 1930-1970. Backstamp, "Made in U.S.A." may be present outside and below the circle.

3. introduced 1932. Usually appears as gold backstamp but also in various colors; active through the late 1960s.
4. ca. 1936 to mid-1970s.

Some early Hall automobile teapots can command prices of \$200 or more.

Automobile teapots come in a seemingly endless variety of colors and styles. It can be fun to collect them, but I recommend buying good quality genuine old pieces rather than newer reproductions made in Japan and China.

As always, happy collecting – cautiously.

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
HERSHEY! October 3-6, 2023 Photos and article by Bob Stein



Cruising And Playing The Radio

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile. In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!" I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone. Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio: --In the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again". -- In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango". -- In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors and car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA". -- In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully". --By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar". -- In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters". -- By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical". -- By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper". Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud...
