It'ls a Family Thing!

Boe Bostjancic has had a passion for cars since he was a young boy growing up in Rockdale, Illinois. He has memories of his father's burgundy and white 1956 Chevy Bel Air sitting in the driveway. Boe's older brother had a couple of 1957 Chevy Bel Airs and even raced a few. Boe took a '53 Chrysler to his prom. In his lifetime he has had many cars, a '64 T-Bird, '71 Camaro, and a '73 Road Runner which he sold for the '67 Camaro that he still owns today.

Boe's 1967 Camaro was purchased in October of 1996 and he is the 2nd owner. The Camaro has a rare split bench seat with an automatic on the column. It is a California vehicle that was 29th off of the Norwood, Ohio production line. It is equipped with a factory 327 V8 Turbo Fire 210 horsepower engine and an automatic Powerglide transmission. His son, Casey Bostjancic, can remember his dad having a '71 Camaro and a '73 Road Runner. He grew up and enjoyed the time he spent with his father going to the car show at Jenro's in Haygood Shopping Center.

As a young boy he wanted to know everything about the '67 Camaro. He had to be the one to answer any and all questions. This led him to purchasing his first old car at the age of 16, a 1972 Chevelle Malibu. He continued to go to Jenro's car show on weekends with his father, bringing the Chevelle along. Anyone who knew Casey would see him washing, cleaning, and wiping down the car daily. Many would say he was going to wipe the paint right off. As life progressed, unfortunately he had to sell his Chevelle.

He soon found out that they were going to be reproducing the Camaro and he knew this would be a big purchase. He worked and saved as much as he could to be ready for when the day would come. Casey was able to hand pick details he wanted for his car. He was the first to receive the 2010 Camaro in Hampton Roads in April of 2009. He still owns it and it currently has under 5,000 miles.

Casey and Dani were married in April of 2010. Dani has always appreciated classic cars and the occasional car show. Since Casey's exposure to a more regular attendance of car shows, along with his participation, and the car show community, that appreciation has grown.

Casey and Dani continued to bring the 2010 Camaro, along with his Father, Boe, and the 1967 Camaro to the car shows. They have dash signs "Father" and "Son". They can be found taking the kids to the shows on occasions as well. The kids can spot the difference between a '67 and a '69 Camaro's body style. It has all become a big family fun project for everyone and it makes the love for classic cars a generational appreciation.



At every car show Casey would mention he wanted a classic again. Casey and Dani were on the look out for some time for a 1956 Chevy Bel Air to add to the collection. They came across a Sierra Gold and Adobe Beige 1956 Chevy Bel Air Hardtop Sports Coupe in November of 2023. It was built in the Oakland, California Plant and is equipped with the one piece California frame and bumper. This car has its



stock 265 V8 engine with a 2-speed Powerglide transmission.

So, as their stable of cars expands, their enthusiasm continues to grow. With the younger generations so actively involved and excited, it helps ensure this great hobby will be preserved for the future. They've found the ideal way to have family fun with the world's greatest hobby, and Tidewater Region and AACA are glad to have them in our family too.


TIDEWATER REGION can be proud of what our members do to support AACA

Back in 2012, I worked on a WHRO project for The Barrier Island Center in Eastville, VA on the Eastern Shore. They were losing early island residents to age and water level rise and the resulting abandonment of some communities.

So, before there was no opportunity to save their life experiences in their own voices, The Center inquired if there was a way to semi-automate an easy recording kiosk where older residents could sit down with no technical requirements and record their memories, Sort of a "one button and a mic" recording studio.

I had donated to the Center before and took on the project. One of our technical team came up with a low-cost Raspberry Pi computer and a small open-source program to record guests and save their memories to the Center's main computer. We met with staff and they approved the prototype, which cost less than S500 for everything. It worked well and was a showcase item for them that year.



When we were finished, I thought, I need to mention this to the late Chris Ritter, our AACA librarian at the time, because the same thing applies to people active in our hobby and their experiences which are so often lost as time passes.

I saw Chris at a TRAACA meet, did Hagerty youth judg-

ing training with him and we talked about it; even imagining the Bookmobile as a mobile recording location at meets. He suggested I speak with Steve Moskowitz and Tom Cox. I did and they were enthusiastic. I indicated Lynn and I would support it financially with a gift of \$25,000 to the AACA Library.

It evolved into the AACA National Program for Oral History and the kiosk that exists today in the lobby of AACA Headquarters in Hershey, Pennsylvania. If you have not seen or tried the AACA Oral History Project yet, we hope on your next visit to Hershey you will go to the left side of the Headquarters lobby, sign in and leave us your greatest moments with old cars, and also consider how you might support National programs for the AACA, through participation as well as financial support.

Editor's note - while you are at Hershey this coming fall, plan stop by our fantastic headquarters for a look around. Not only will you be impressed with the facility (and the staff) but you can take a few moments to become a part of AACA's living history. Thanks to John and Lynn for helping spear-head this great project to preserve the collective memories of our great hobby and club.

"CRUISING" to the Dominican Republic

for a look at some classics

During the week of April 24th, club members, Chris Ciccone, Dan Ciccone, Tammy Park and Harry Park, went on a cruise on the Carnival Sunshine from Norfolk to the Dominican Republic, Bahamas and Turks and Caicos.

Puerto Plata Classic Cars

In the Dominican Republic, Puerto Plata classic cars offer a unique experience for enthusiasts to experience this old charm town from the vintage style and historic perspective of classic cars that once roamed this city during its glorious Victorian period.

Puerto Plata founded was by Nicolás de Ovando at the beginning of Spanish colonization, around 1502. It was one of the cities devastated in 1606 and it was not repopulated until 1736.

In the early 1970's the city was chosen for its coastal

characteristics as a tourist destination by presidential decree. Today Puerto Plata has one of the most important historic centers in the island,

with many landmark museums, buildings, beaches and attractions.

While in the Dominion Republic, we took the classic car tour in Puerto Plata. A personal driver drove everyone in a 1953 Chrysler Saratoga

with a Toyota Supra engine and vintage air conditioning through the city of Puerto Plata. The first stop was at the Macorix House of Rum to sample some of the finest rums in the country. The next stop was on Umbrella Street.

Umbrella Street is located on Calle San Felipe where colorful umbrellas hang from the rooftops to aid in some shade from the sun's rays. We walked along Pink Street which was created where the Paseo hotel. de Dona Blanca, once stood.



The following stop was at the Dominican Amber Museum. We learned about the process of creating amber pieces. Afterwards, we headed to the Tobacco Experience for an interactive cigar rolling demonstration and learned the history behind tobacco.





The day ended at the Melençon (waterfront). Here, we took in the beautiful ocean views and stopped at a road-side market where Dan and Harry bought some souvenir license plates.

The "classic cars" in the Dominical Republic are much like those in Cuba. They are older cars that have been kept alive by talented mechanics and creative metal-workers. In many cases, rusted body panels have had



newer metal welded in, but as seen on the Barracuda the result is not always "stock original." In other cases, different engines and drive-train components have been substituted in place of items where parts are no longer available. In more than one case, a former hard-topped car has been converted into a top-less sight-seeing vehicle. It's amazing to see what has been accomplished to keep history alive there.

STLL COLLECTING

- some recent additions

I was asked not long ago whether I was still able to find things for my various "collections." Of course it prompted another column,

Earlier this year, the watch-fob collection saw some new additions. An unusual Nash advertising fob surfaced on the internet and I gladly added it to my collection.





Shortly after, there was another one that I consider very rare. The King automobile was produced between 1911 and 1925.

Charles Brady King built his first car in 1895 intending to enter it in the Chicago Times-Herald race in November that year. It wasn't finished, though, until

March the following year. It was reported to be the first gasoline powered vehicle to be driven on Detroit streets and was followed by a young Henry Ford riding on his bicycle! King's car was disassembled and parts were sold to others planning their own cars.

King worked for various other companies but eventually established his own company in 1911. He produced a quality vehicle with many innovations but, in the 1920-21 depression, the company was sold to investors in Buffalo, NY. It survived briefly and by 1924 production ceased and the company was bankrupt. Unfinished vehicles and parts were shipped to England where reportedly an additional 100 cars

were built before the name "King" was no longer seen on an automobile.


Yet another watch amazing fob was sent to me by a friend from England who found it in an antique shop. beautifully enameled and depicts an early motorist taking his lady-friend for a ride in an automobile.





This delightful silver plated desk calendar came from England thanks to a London antique dealer who listed it for sale on the UK version of Ebay. A wonderfully detailed print by noted British artist Gilbert Wright is under the glass. Cardboard tabs printed with month, day, and year can be turned around as needed. It's a wonderful desk piece.

This 1904 issue of MoToR Magazine is one of their earliest and is in the finest condition I've ever seen. I don't have large collection of these but their covers are spectacular and this one is fabulous.



There is always room for more small stuff, especially as nice as this little Winton advertising pin. It was produced by Whitehead and Hoag and the car shown is 1908.





These bronze trays were the subject of an earlier article. This early ash tray is a piece that, has been on my radar a long time, but never before have I seen such a fine

example. It was purchased in an on-line auction and, despite the buyer's premium and cost of shipping, it was still a bargain.

One of the real "stars" recently acquired is this fantastic table piece. It is over 13 inches long! It is made of heavy ce-



ramic. It was produced in Austria circa 1907 and is pictured in several reference books on automobilia. I've seen a few of these sold at auction both, here and in Europe, but all have had signif-



icant damage on them. This one is near perfect. The lid comes off for access to a compartment that probably held candy or mints. The

umbrella basket on the rear of the car probably held tooth-picks. The other compartments at the front probably held either small utensils or perhaps some flowers. It was an unbelievable Ebay buy-it-now!

This cute novelty souvenir item is made of celluloid. It is in the shape of an eardriver's l۷ chauffeur's head. His cap comes off and inside is a tiny table-top bowling set. It is a souvenir from





Washington D.C. It is most likely an America made piece circa 1910.

The last item I'll share this month is a beautiful porcelain enameled tin cup with a great early automobile image on it. It could

have been part of a larger set of children's dishes. There is no makers mark on it that would enable me to determine country of origin, but I feel it is American made. From the car, it would be 1905-10 era.



Quite a variety represented here, but all great artifacts from the early days of motoring. Yes, obviously I'm "Still Collecting."
