1970 AMC AMX Joe Gentile

In 1984, while living in the barracks at Naval Air Station Norfolk, I needed a car as my daily driver. Checking the *Auto Trader* I came across a



1970 AMC AMX in Sandbridge VA. I had never heard of this car but it was in my price range at \$1800. The car was partially primer gray and brown but otherwise all original. He took me for a test drive down the street. The car had great power and threw me back in my seat; I couldn't get the money out of my pocket fast enough, sold.

This two-seater had a loud exhaust that ended before the rear wheels and was held up with coat hanger wire. Occasionally the car would just stop running. I thought it was the carburetor float sticking because when I tapped on the carb it would start back up. Turns out it was a broken wire from the distributor to the coil that caused it to conk out.

I needed to get the car painted and become more reliable to drive. So in the summer of 1987 I found a garage in Norfolk that allowed me to help out working on the car. But then I received orders to NAS Alameda CA. I had to rush finishing the

car before it was shipped out. While stationed in CA, I wasn't able to work on the car a lot due to going on many deployments.



Then, in February of 1990, I was transferred back East to NADC in Pennsylvania. This time I planned on towing the car across country with our 1985 Buick Regal. I installed a hitch on the Regal and rented a front wheel dolly for the AMX. The Buick didn't last long, about 30 miles into the trip it blew a radiator hose and the car



kept over heating going up mountains so I knew it wouldn't make the rest of the trip. With a new baby in the car and a long trip in front of us we had to stop in Pleasanton CA. I got the AMX running and was faced with the decision on whether to sell the AMX or keep dragging it

across the country. I ended up selling the Regal and buying a 1986 Oldsmobile Cutlass with a V8. I was able to bolt the hitch to the Cutlass and finished the trip. After a long week we finally made it to NAS Warminster PA.

Now that I had a one car garage, I started the restoration of the AMX in my spare time. The car needed to be painted correctly so in 1991 I took it to Tanner Auto Body. By strip-



ping the car down to the bare metal myself, I was able to save on some of the cost. Once the car was finished being painted and buffed, I drove the car home to finish the assembly. But once again I was transferred and we had to move to Virginia Beach VA.



I left the Navy in 1994 and the car sat under a car cover for many years. I started the under carriage restoration in 2003 by removing the enaine and refurthe front bished suspension. I painted the engine compartment and the entire front clip. We moved to a new house that had

more garage space but other things became a

priority and the car sat under a car cover, again, for years.

In 2013 I finally decided to put the AMX on the priority list with a goal to get the car running by the end of the year. By working on the car a



little every day, I was able to get the car running by December of 2013.



Then in the fall of 2014 I attended the Wings and Wheels Car show at the Aviation Museum in Virginia Beach. I was fortunate to have run into John Heimerl who told me he also had a 70 AMX. John was kind enough to help me with a wiring problem that I had with the tachometer. It was at this car show that I joined the TRAACA. I knew my AMX needed plenty of work to get it back to full stock, so little by little I worked on restoring back to original.



At the TRAACA fall show in 2022 I was surprised to have won Best of Show. Harry Park, whom I had met at several local car shows over the years, told me that the previous winner of that show just received his AACA Grand National award and I should follow his same path. He was instrumental guiding me through the process and offered valuable information and sup-

port. Harry even trailered my car to Charlotte, Gettysburg and back to Charlotte to receive my Junior. Senior and Grand National awards.



What I didn't know was at the Spring Nationals in Charlotte 2024, national judges looked over my car. That December I received a nomination for a National Award to be presented at the 2025 AACA Conference. Thanks go out to my wife Gitte for taking such impressive photos that were



sent in for judging. I was informed I won an award but did not know what kind. So Gitte and I attended the AACA National Convention in Charlotte, which was a great experience along with getting to meet so many nice people. My car was awarded the James Melton Memorial Cup given to outstanding senior car for the Southeastern Division.

Becoming a member of the AACA has been such a great experience. The cars are the common bond that's brings us together, but making new friends is the real reward.



Can't wait for Tidewater region to host next year!!!





Report from the Luray, Virginia Pre-War Swap Meet May 8-10, 2025

I love a good swap meet - the old fashioned kind where hobby vendors and club members pull stuff out from under the workbench and lay it on the ground, or pile it up just as it was found - covered with the dust of time and flavored with the patina of ages

I love a good swap meet where old friends get together to really swap stuff around and visit - when they are not trying to help other with just what they need to get their cars on the road again. Where finding a good home for something is more important than making a buck. Where spending time with old friends is the most important part of the day.

Luray checks all the boxes on my list. I've been going to swap meets a long time, Hershey - since 1970 - and as many swap meets (large and small) as I could squeeze into the months between. I consider myself somewhat "experienced." I've been to swap meets all over the country, and Luray has become one of my absolute favorites.

It's oldgood friendly, fashioned, laid-back swap meet where vendors are mainly folks clearing out stuff from their workshops or parts There are alstash. fresh-to-theways market loads of parts

brought in from newly discovered stashes in the country.

Each year I see at least half a dozen trailer-loads or pick-up truck beds full of unsorted things just as pulled freshly out of old barns. The excitement of going through these unsorted items is great, especially knowing they've not already been picked through and over-priced. This event always produces some goodies.

2025 was one of the best in the years I've been



attending. The field was full of over 100 vendors. This year I found some nice Model T parts including a great brass hub fan for my 14T that will become a spare. It was just \$20! For me, odd-ball spark plugs were few this year, but heck, when

you have as many as I do, it's not surprising. Still, I managed to snag a handful of nice plugs



at very affordable prices.

Others reported buying early brass carbs for different cars. There were several boxes full of them to pick from and, if you knew what you were looking at, bargains were there. Brass lamps, oilers, rare coils, magnetos, and other interesting items were laid out on tables or tarps spread on the ground. Yes, it's predominately a Model T lover's paradise, but there are always other early items mixed into some of those loads that only the guy who needs it can really identify.

In the past I've seen single-cylinder Caddy parts, EMF, CDO, Saxon, Maxwell, and other

early items sold there. Everything from a Pierce Arrow mascot to a NOS Firestone inner-tube was available. Last year I bought an selfamazing generating gas headlamp. Undiscovered treasures abound at Luray and it's always a



real scavenger hunt - just the way a swap meet

should be.

Those who supply needed services for the hobby were well represented. If you needed new wood wheels, transmission parts, coils or carburetors rebuilt, starters or generators, or even new



top bows or horsehair stuffing for your seat cushions, the right people were there to help. If you just needed parts you'd have enjoyed the thrill of the hunt and the excitement of discovery.



Set-up day is later on Thursday for many vendors, and eager buyers descended early snagging bargains as they were uncovered. Friday is usually the busiest day but, with many hiding from the ear-

ly rains, it was a slower than normal start. But, once the skies cleared, it was going strong. Friday PM and Saturday were beautiful with light cool breezes and plenty of sunshine.

The VFW is a great place and they run a concession there with delicious reasonably priced food. There is also a wonderful Friday fried-chicken dinner for vendors who buy tickets when they register for the event. They wave the flag here, and the VFW benefits



from hosting the event. It's all about the veterans and it's obvious the VFW enjoys having the event there. We salute them for their hospitality and honor their service.


Raphael Tuck and the Automobile

Since 2013, my collecting series has focused on a particular theme each month. Occasionally, there has been mention of a specific artist, but generally I've not explored much art history aside from identifying or dating objects. Now, it's time to open the books and look at one of the most prolific publishing firms that ever existed, and learn how the automobile was an influence on their work.

The company, Raphael Tuck and Sons, began in London in October 1866.


Raphael Tuck was born in Prussia in 1821. He originally worked as a carpen-In 1848, he married Ernestine Lissner and raised four boys and three girls there. In 1864, as refugees from the Second Schleswig War, they moved to London and started a furniture making that business soon



evolved into a specialty picture framing operation. The company quickly became well-known as a distributer of graphic art prints, including reproductions of popular art. Raphael Tuck had received training in graphic arts in his home country and although he was not an artist himself, he had a flair for commercial art that prompted his interest in this new field. Using contacts in their native country, they were successful in bringing the latest advances in lithography and printing to the British and American markets, chiefly through the rapid growth in popularity of the postcard. They produced their first Christmas card in 1871.

The entire family was involved in expanding the business. Ernestine was a savy businesswomn, while the children provided more help. Raphael sent out his sons, Herman, Adolph and Gustave, to bring in more business. Herman and Adolph also went on selling trips, and at the end of the day they would check the results of the day's work. The one with the higher sales would have the bigger egg next morning for breakfast.

Raphael Tuck also quickly made a name for himself in publishing novelty books and other specialty paper items such as calendars, cards, puzzles, and paper dolls. Among the most popular items they produced were children's books under the title Father Tuck.













Tuck also was among the first to publish movable books that first appeared around 1890. Father Tuck's Mechanical Series featured several different

movable parts which unfolded to reveal multilayered, three-dimensional scenes. Other books contained pull-the-tab and peep-show mechanisms. Tuck & Sons produced another series of movables, each featuring overlays designed to be raised out from the pages, thereby giving scene with a three-dimensional effect.

By the turn of the century, the rapidly growing popularity of the automobile was starting to gain momentum. The image of the automobile quick-

ly became representative of the dawn of a new age and was used to create a feeling of adventure, wonder, and amazement. The future was now, and driving a car quickly became popular graphic imagery. The Tuck firm was quick to use that to bring new life to their products including childrens books, calendars, puzzles and, yes, even postcards that would include Santa driving his automobile while making his rounds at Christmas time.

Although Raphael died in 1900, his sons carried on the business. It grew and continued to enjoy great success world-wide, eventually opening offices in Paris. Even during the First World War, the business thrived, especially through export to the US. It was World War II however that would nearly close the business. Their offices were completely destroyed during bombing in London in 1940. All of the company records and archives were turned to ash.

Although they rebuilt and were moderately successful, things were never the same again.

When the last of the Tuck sons retired in 1959, the company was absorbed into The British Printing Corporation (renamed British Printing & Communications Corporation in 1982). Later, it became part of a larger multi-media company named Maxwell Communications. The company went bankrupt in 1991 and parts of what remained were sold to other media companies including Time-Warner, McGraw Hill, and Simon & Schuster.

Although new and previously unknown items are still to be discovered, what remains today is largely in museums, libraries and private collections as a memory of an age long ago.

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
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


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
